

DRUGGIST HAD CONSIGNMENT OF LIQUOR SEIZED

DEFENDING PROHIBITION
CASE IN POLICE COURT

**Liquor Sub-Inspectors Allege
Barrels Which Came From
Montreal Were Im-
properly Marked.**

The hearing of a case against a local druggist charged with the illegal sale of liquor between September 1st and November 1st began in the Police Court this morning before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick. One witness who was called knew nothing about the case so with the consent of the counsel it was adjourned until tomorrow afternoon at 2.30 o'clock when another witness will be called to give evidence. Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared for the prosecution and E. Allison McKay appeared for the defence.

Seizure of Liquor

A seizure of five barrels of intoxicating liquor was made from the same druggist by the liquor sub-inspectors. One barrel was seized on Saturday at the store while the other four barrels were seized this morning at the C. P. R. station, the inspectors alleging that while they had the name of the consignee they did not bear the name of the shippers. It is stated that the shipment came from Montreal. The liquor seized was taken to the Police Station and was put in "cold storage". It will probably be used as evidence later on.

The fire department motor-truck responded to a still alarm yesterday morning from the home of Miss Ladds, Aberdeen Street. A chimney blaze which had resulted from an overheated pipe was put out with the use of one extinguisher.

City Council Meeting Tonight

The City Council will meet in committee tonight in preparation for the regular November meeting Tuesday night. The matter of regulation of retail prices of milk probably will be taken up. It is possible that application for a session of Commissioner O'Connor's court may be asked for.

REV. Z. L. FASH SPOKE
ON LOCAL SITUATION

**Delegation to Wait on Govern-
ment re Additional Regis-
tration of Women—Too
Many "Pers."**

At the various Evangelical churches in the city yesterday Temperance Sunday was observed and spirited addresses were made by the various pastors.

Rev. Z. L. Fash

Rev. Z. L. Fash preached to a large congregation in the George Street Baptist Church Sunday morning the subject being the "Rise and Progress of the Prohibition Movement." In the afternoon temperance lessons were taught in the Sunday school and in the evening an address on "The Drunkards Lost Kingdom" was given by Rev. Mr. Fash. The pastor referred to the splendid victory for prohibition in the United States and in Ontario and urged all present to prepare themselves for the prohibition referendum in this province. He referred also to the fact that a delegation had been appointed to meet the Provincial government in support of a resolution passed by the recent Baptist District Meeting at Woodstock that a separate day be set for the registration of all women who had failed to register as voters.

Local Liquor Situation

The pastor also made reference to the valiant work of his predecessors in the George Street Baptist Church and stated that too much liquor was being sold in the backyards of Fredericton and by bootleggers and that prescriptions issued by the physicians and filled by the druggists were becoming too numerous.

Sections Excellent.**

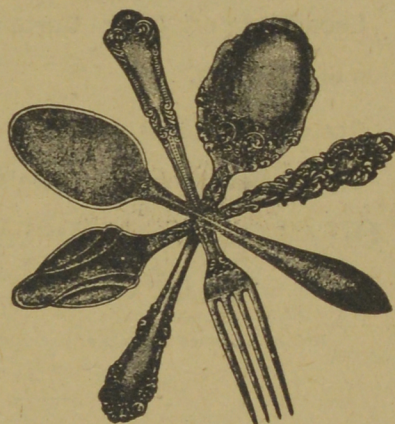
The Victory Loan Campaign through the city and country districts is waxing strong and good reports are coming into the local office from all outside points. Dr. D. W. Roberts of the district headquarters visited several of the country districts yesterday and reports that the interest in the districts visited is so great that Victory bonds is all one hears talked about. At the local office applications are still coming in strong and there appears to be no let up to the enthusiasm of the people's interest in the campaign. The city of Fredericton is doing well and the country is showing up in a splendid manner.

Douglas "Over The Top"

One other district, that of Douglas including the Nashwaak and Tay Settlement has gone "over the top" and is still going. The objective of this district was \$20,000 and that amount of Victory Bonds has already been subscribed. "The country", to use the words of Dr. Roberts, "is taking to the Victory Bonds like hot cakes," and its attitude in certain sections is proving that fact beyond all doubt. Up to Friday evening the standing for the whole district including this City, the County of York and the parishes of Lincoln, Gladstone, and Blissville in Sunbury County was as follows: number of applications recorded, 286 with a total of \$223,300 subscribed to the fund.

Majority Report Forwarded

His Worship Mayor Hanson has returned from St. John where he was on Saturday attending a meeting of the Board of Conciliation on the dispute between operators and miners in the Minto coal region. A majority report was prepared by Chief Justice H. A. McKeown, chairman of the board, and Mayor Hanson representative of the operators. That report was forwarded to the Department of Labor at Ottawa. It is understood that a few of the demands of the miners are met in the report but that the majority are not. Mr. J. R. Walker representative of the miners has presented a minority report.



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
