

DISHERS "AU GRATIN."

Means Cooked With Cheese in America, But Something Else to the French.

What Americans usually mean by "au gratin" is that a dish is cooked with cheese, though anyone who knows French knows that this expression has quite a different meaning to the Frenchman and that a dish "au gratin" is really a dish prepared with bread crumbs. Perhaps the reason this expression has come to be used as it is, is that often a dish served with bread crumbs is topped with grated cheese, and the reader of bills of fare came to think of the "au gratin" as having reference to the cheese rather than the bread crumbs.

Now these cheese dishes—and we may, as well use the term in its American sense—are easily made and are liked by most everyone.

Potatoes au gratin are just a modification of scalloped potatoes. Owing to the presence of the cheese, which is a logical meat substitute, they form a good whole meal dish. That is, a dish of au gratin potatoes may be served for lunch or supper where you have no other main dish and no meat. To make this, begin by having ready two cups of diced cold boiled potatoes.

Make a cream sauce from a tablespoon each of butter and flour, a half teaspoon of salt and a dash of pepper and a cup of milk. Butter a baking dish and place in the bottom a layer of the potatoes, then a little cream sauce and then some cheese—you should use a little over a quarter of a cup of grated cheese altogether. Now lay on the rest of the potatoes and top off with a half cup of buttered bread crumbs mixed with the rest of the cheese crumbs. Pour over the rest of the cream sauce and bake until the crumbs are browned slightly.

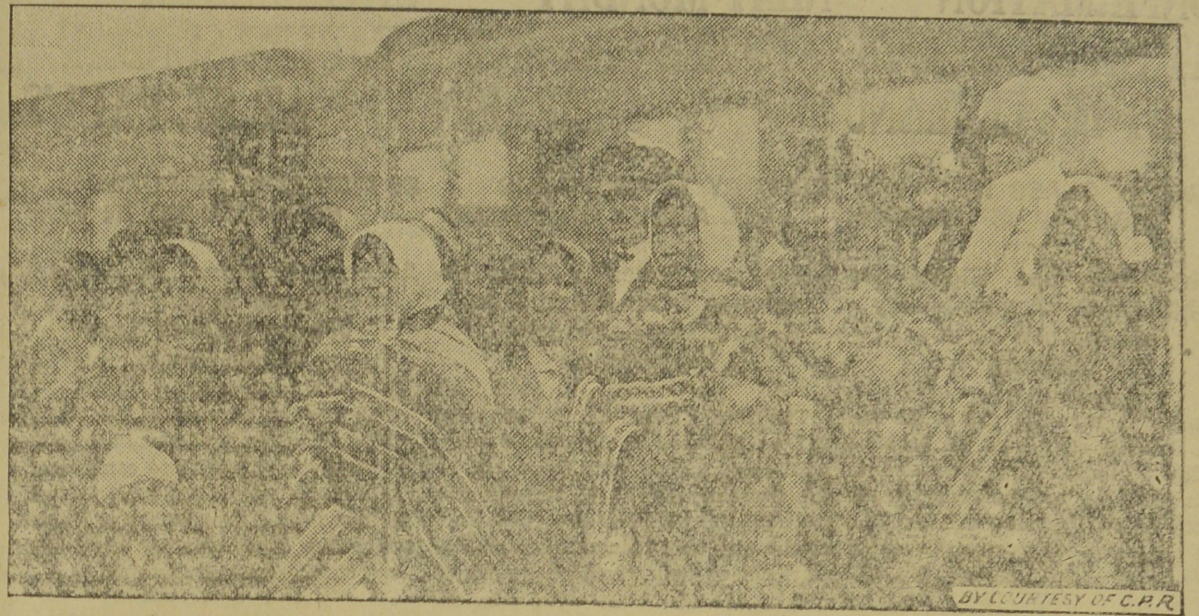

Chicago, Oct. 16—Two judges of the Circuit Court who have heard more than 7,000 divorce cases have now inserted in the record their judgment on the type of girls who make successful wives. Judge George Barrett, said:

MUST CLEAN THE CHIMNEY

Cooler weather demands the lighting of heaters and furnaces. Before this is done, however, chimneys, flues and stove pipes should be thoroughly cleaned out and made safe. This is not a difficult matter, and is much preferable to being turned out of the house on a cold night by a fire caused by dirty pipes or chimneys.

Some surprise might be caused to the owner of a building damaged by fire from such a cause if the insurance company declined to pay the loss. This the company has a perfect right to do, as it is distinctly stated on all fire insurance policies that the company is not responsible for fires caused by negligence on the part of the assured.

The "Act to Amend the Criminal Code Respecting Prevention of Fire," passed at the last session of Parliament, distinctly states:

"Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years'

imprisonment who by negligence causes any fire which occasions loss of life or loss of property."


With the possible loss of insurance and two years' imprisonment as a penalty, it is not wise for the household to neglect his stovepipes and chimneys.
