### THE PROHIBITION QUESTION

The Toronto Saturday Night thinks that most of the public men in Canada wish that the prohibition question was at the bottom of the sea. At Ottawa, it says, they are looking for signs in the sky and tremble when they look back over Ontario's recent by-elections.

Referring to conditions in the west, Saturday Night has this to say:

"Out in Alberta the Stewart government has, in utter desperation, abolished the commission created to enforce the Prohibition Act, and has 'passed the buck' to the Hon. John Boyle, Attorney General. In turn the Attorney General also takes a pessimistic view of the situation. For instance, in a speech on the floor of the Legislature the other day he remarked that out of the 100,000 estimated male adults of the province 60,000 of them were guilty of some infringement of the Liquor Act during 1918. That the violation of the Liquor Act in British Columbia is the chief form of popular amusement in that province is too well known to require further comment, other than to remark that it is estimated by British Columbians of unquestioned standing that fully eighty-five per cent. of the male adults in that neck of the woods have in some form or other broken the Prohibition enactments."

In New Brunswick the prohibition law was placed on the statute book by the late government, the members of which no doubt thought that it would be the means of covering up their many administrative sins. The duty of enforcing the law fell to the lot of the present administration, and it will be generally conceded that they have made a pretty fair job of it. As announced by Premier Foster a few days ago the people will be given an opportunity to pass on the act at a referendum after the soldiers return from overseas.

A feature of the debate in the House on Friday was the able and well-considered address of Hon. Dr. Roberts, Minister of Public Health. He devoted considerable attention to the Public Health Act, and roundly scored Mr. Baxter and other members of the Opposition for playing the game of politics at the expense of the most sacred interests of the province. Hon. Dr. Roberts is an able and conscientious minister who is striving honestly and intelligently to bring about a betterment of conditions in this province. What he has accomplished so far has been in the face of strenuous opposition of the men who sit on the left of the Speaker.

Although Mr. Frank Potts, M. P. P., poses as an independent member of the House, his associates on the Opposition side cannot very well evade responsibility for the fanatical harangue which he delivered on Thursday evening. Mr. Potts is chief whip of the Opposition party and presided at the caucus held here on the day preceding the House opening. The big guns of the party are having their own troubles at the present time and cannot afford to repudiate the windy member for St. John, much as the better element would like to do so.

Nearly all the speakers who have participated in the debate on the address in the House have complimented Speaker Hetherington and have expressed the opinion that he would discharge his duties with dignity and impartiality. It is needless to say that His Honor is fulfilling the most sanguine expectations in regard to his fitness for the office. He is not only dignified and impartial, but he has another virtue, patience, which was well exemplified Thursday evening when he had to sit for two hours and listen to a phonographic exhibition by Mr. Frank Potts.

St. John Telegraph: Hon. Mr. Veniot distributed hot shot impartially and with deadly aim among the opposition yesterday and the casualty list when he finished was a long and grievous one. Like many others in the House,

the Minister of Public Works was represented at the front—two sons in his case—and he paid his compliments to those gentlemen of the opposition who are boasting of their loyalty and their services to the Allied cause, referring to some who got into uniform but remained at home. Mr. Veniot's handling of opposition criticism was a most workmanlike performance. He carries the fighting to the enemy early and late.

It is quite evident that if some members of the opposition in the House of Assembly had had the choosing of a generalissimo for the Allied armies, that great military genius, Marshal Foch, would never have landed the job.

Mrs. P. A. Edington, formerly Miss Daisy McKenzie daughter of the late P. D. McKenzie of Fredericton died last evening at her home in Vegreville Alta. The deceased was ill for a short time with influenza which was followed by pneumonia. She was aged twenty-seven years and is survived by her mother Mrs. P. D. McKenzie, her husband, one son Donald and two sisters Mrs. Arthur K. Limerick and Mrs. Lankford Good of Edmundston. While a resident of Fredericton she was well known as a musician and was very popular. Word of the death was received by Mrs. Limerick. Interment will be made here.

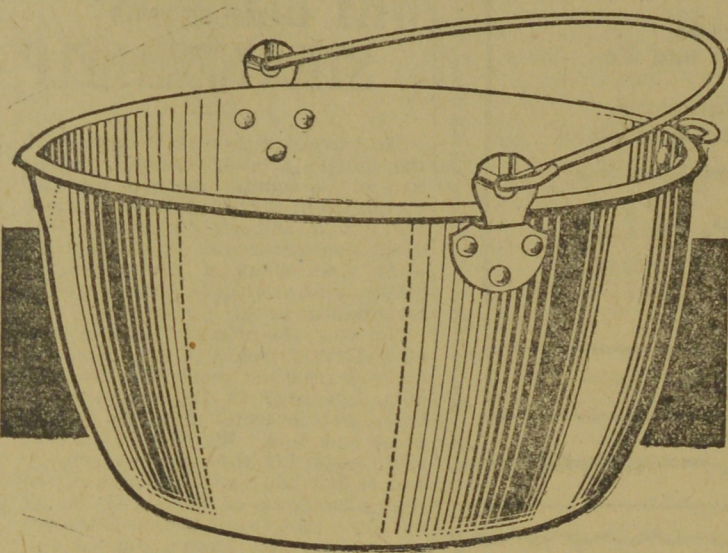
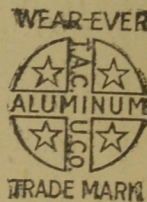

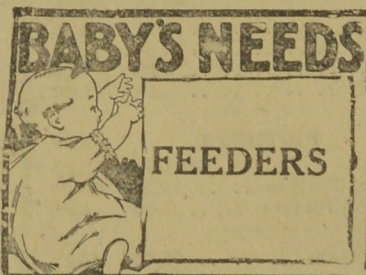
