THE PRINCE'S QUARTERS ON  
THE BATTLESHIP RENOWN

Described in an Interesting Manner by a Lady Correspondent  
of the Boston Post—No Royal Monograms on the Bed-  
Clothes—How the Royal Suite is Furnished—Located in  
the Forward Part of the Ship.

Ruth Bodwile staff correspondent  
on the Boston Post wires that paper  
as follows:

Halifax, N. S. Aug. 17—There are  
no royal monograms on the royal  
bedclothes that cover his Royal High-  
ness, the Prince of Wales, when he  
stops aboard the flagship of his fleet,  
the giant battle cruiser Renown, the  
pride of the British navy and the ship  
whose commander, Captain Taylor of  
the Royal Navy, was chosen for the  
responsible task of bringing the sol-  
dier-prince from England to this  
country and back again.

At least they were not visible when  
personally conducted through the  
royal Prince's private apartments  
aboard the Renown this morning by  
Lieutenant-Governor McCallum Grant  
of Nova Scotia, and Captain Taylor  
I was given an intimate idea of how  
royalty is catered to en tour in the  
largest battle cruiser afloat.

## No Royal Insignia

Captain Taylor assured me that the  
royal bunk or bed was ready for its  
royal occupant who was at that mo-  
ment nearing Halifax from St. John,  
aboard the Dragon, proudly flying the  
royal ensign, to be in readiness for the  
city's welcome tomorrow. Later in  
the day the ensign was transferred to  
the Renown for the prince came  
aboard his flagship.

The royal bedclothes are very fine  
and white sheets, blankets, down puffs  
and all, but there is no ostentation  
about them. I patted them and turned  
them back hoping to find a tiny royal  
monogram modestly embellishing the  
hem of a royal sheet, but there was  
none. No personal belongings were in  
evidence in the sleeping cabin, but it  
may be that a turkish bath towel,  
striped in red and white, upon a chair  
in the bathroom, leading from his  
sleeping quarters, was a royal one. It  
was fit to be.

Being born to the purple has many  
drawbacks from my viewpoint, but it  
also has its compensations, and luxury  
is one of them.

## Color Scheme of White

The royal suite, which is the admiral's  
headquarters ordinarily, but is  
Captain Taylor's on the Renown, has  
been adapted for the royal prince's  
needs and uses. The apartment con-  
sists of four rooms. The drawing-room  
and dining cabin are very spacious  
ones, while the sleeping cabin and  
bathroom are much smaller, but large  
when you compare them with like ac-  
commodations in a modern apartment  
at home.

The color scheme of the entire apart-  
ment is white, of a satiny texture, and  
this is relieved by vivid splashes of  
turquoise blue, effected by plump sofa  
cushions in evidence everywhere. All  
the woodwork which is of "service"  
mahogany, has been treated to a coat  
of enamel paint, with the exception of  
the table tops in the dining cabin and  
these are of polished mahogany.

## Covers are Changeable

One enters this ocean home of the  
Prince of Wales through the dining  
cabin, the whole being located in the  
forward part of the monster ship.  
There is a room without portholes or  
windows, lighted by three overhead  
electric lamps of great power and bril-  
liancy, and shaded in pure white ac-  
cordion-pleated material matching the  
removable furniture covers. These  
lamps are distributed the length of  
the table, up to which are drawn 10  
not too heavy, yet substantial, dining  
chairs, with backs of enamelled white  
and their stuffed seats covered with  
an immaculate white fabric, satiny in  
finish, but plainly washable neverthe-  
less and doubtless changed daily when  
his Royal Highness honors the ship  
with his presence.

There is a long built-in sideboard,  
or lowboy, it might better be termed  
running more than a third the length  
of the room. On this gleam several  
plates and dishes of sterling silver  
bearing the royal coat of arms, and  
only in this one touch, which is very  
unobtrusive, is there any hint that  
royalty abides here.

## Portraits of Royalty

Above the sideboard is a decorative  
touch arranged by means of a row of  
framed prints of kings and queens  
and lesser personages in English his-  
tory, all neatly framed in gold, which  
run the length of the sideboard. These  
are small and about 12 in number. All  
the walls are white and each of the  
three rooms has as decoration rare  
prints and engravings picked up in  
different parts of the world by Cap-

tain Taylor, who occupied these quar-  
ters himself when he is not piloting  
royalty, and whose wife, a member of  
our party this morning, is largely re-  
sponsible for the selection of the fur-  
nishings of this part of the great bat-  
tle cruiser.

There is a round dining table at the  
head of the long table and the infer-  
ence is that the prince is served here  
accompanied by such guests as he  
may choose or have chosen for him,  
while members of his staff sit at the  
table on his left. There are four more  
dining chairs against the wall at this  
point and nearby a short overstuffed  
sofa in a covering of white, with a  
pillow of turquoise that shows like a  
jewel against it.

## Only a Small Mirror

The prince's sleeping cabin leads  
out of this and has a window looking  
upon the sea, under which is built a  
stationary dressing case with a mir-  
ror, not by its size encouraging to  
royal vanity. There are closets in the  
room which hold portions of the royal  
prince's wardrobe also several uphol-  
stered easy chairs with the turquoise  
pillows lending their brilliant color.  
The single bed or bunk is built at  
the side of the room and the upper  
portion of it forming the head is of  
decorative brass work, while the base  
is of enameled white, probably mahog-  
any beneath. It resembles nothing so  
much as a giant size baby's crib.

## Doesn't Carry His Tub

Back of this is the bath of his Royal  
Highness tiled in white with the usual  
porcelain tub and bowl, with closets  
for shower and other tub arrange-  
ments. The Prince of Wales does not  
carry his own portable tub, once a fad  
of an older generation of royal and  
noble English gentlemen. He prefers  
modern convenience, apparently and  
looks it. There is little of the affect-  
ed Englishman about the Prince of  
Wales. That seems to be left to some  
of the lesser members of his suite.  
Leading from the dining cabin at the  
other end is the drawing room, all in  
white and blue, with a series of win-  
dows, semicircular in arrangement,  
that give a view out to sea from many  
angles. Great chairs and divans and  
bookcases and tables are here, making  
it a princely room, but it is not one  
that the British heir-apparent spends

He likes better a portion of the  
deck in this vicinity which has been  
reserved for him and is partitioned off  
by means of canvas sides, with a can-  
vas roof overhead. Here, to points  
close outside come the ship's officers  
and even the midshipmen, to try their

## Fans and Stoves

The royal suite is supplied with a  
number of electric fans of tremendous  
power and with several electric stov-  
es which are very artistic in design.  
The dining cabin has two of these and  
also the drawing room, while the  
sleeping cabin has one. The carpet for  
the royal feet is velvet, nearly white  
in certain lights, but really cream  
color, and in both drawing room and  
dining room there is always a profu-  
sion of fresh-cut flowers.

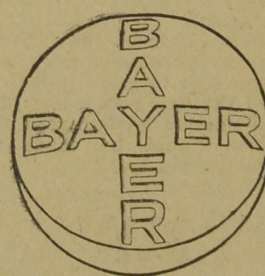
There were two immense flat bowls  
of pond lilies between a fine fern on
