

## QUEEN STREET PROPERTY FOR LABOR COUNCIL

### ADAMS PROPERTY FOR CO-OPERATIVE STORE

**Reported That Transfer Has  
Been Made—Price About  
Four Thousand  
Dollars.**

It is reported that the Fredericton Labor Council has purchased the R. B. Adams property in Queen Street and will remodel it for use as the co-operative store which it is the intention of the Labor Council to establish in this city. The property is a brick building with soil-right.

#### To Build Labor Temple

Report also has it that the Labor Council has purchased the so-called Christie property in Regent Street which is at right angles to the Adams property and which recently was sold to Mr. Charles L. Dougherty and will erect a building to be used as a Labor Temple.

#### Price About \$4,500

Mr. A. R. Slipp, K. C., who is solicitor in connection with the properties stated that he was not in a position to make a definite announcement concerning the transfers. It is reported on good authority however that they will go through. The price for the Queen Street property is about \$4,500. Mr. Harry Ryan, president of the Labor Council is acting in the matter.

#### Higher Cigarette Prices

## REAL ESTATE ACTIVITY NEAR NASHWAAK MTH

### AMBITIOUS SCHEME FOR BARKER'S POINT

**Awaiting Announcement of the  
Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co.  
as to the Erection of  
a Pulp Mill.**

Real estate activity in the near future is expected at Barker's Point and in that section of Devon near the Nashwaak River. This is on account of the reports that the bank of the Nashwaak in Devon will be the site of the pulp-mill which the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company will build within a short time.

#### Subdivision with Concrete

One of the most ambitious schemes is reported to be the subdivision of a considerable area of land in Barker's Point with the construction of concrete streets through it. Mr. R. W. McIellan of this city who is the owner of a considerable area of property in Barker's Point when asked concerning this stated no developments had taken place or were likely to take place until there was a definite announcement from the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company concerning the erection of the new pulp-mill. After that it was quite possible that there would be real estate development.

The property of Mr. W. C. R. Rickard in Barker's Point has been under option to Mr. Arthur Noble of Fredericton for some time.

#### Values in Devon

Real estate values in Devon are reported to be stiffening on account of the reports of pulp-mill construction.

#### Gave Wrong Name

## EVIDENCE IN THREATENED SHOOTING

### ETERNAL TRIANGLE CASE BEFORE POLICE COURT

**Accused Remanded Until To-  
morrow—Informant Denies  
Being Unduly Familiar  
With Wife.**

John Smith, the returned soldier, charged with threatened assault came before the Police Court this morning. G. T. Feeney appeared for the defence. The complainant Frank Delong was put upon the stand and examined by counsel for the defence. It was revealed in the evidence that the defendant who was a returned man had made no threats to Delong previous to the incident complained of. On this occasion the informant while walking out York Street was called back by Smith and told that he had a week to leave town. Delong told Smith that he would meet him that evening and talk it over. Later Smith called to see him but he was not around. Delong admitted to have been familiar with Mrs. Smith but claimed that he was not unduly familiar. On several occasions he had seen Mrs. Smith on the street and stopped and spoke to her. He had been frightened by what the defendant had said because as he stated he thought that the witness was not responsible for anything he might do under the influence of drink.

Smith stated that recently he had heard that his wife and Delong were better acquainted than it appeared. He further stated that when he began to serve a jail-term he knew his wife was preparing to leave him and that when he was released he found her gone and connected her disappearance with Delong, who he considered had brought it about. He stated when asked if he still felt inclined to do Delong bodily harm that he had no such intention. He had not threatened to shoot Delong full of holes. G. T. Feeney then summed up for the defence and on his concluding Magistrate Limerick remanded the prisoner until tomorrow morning.

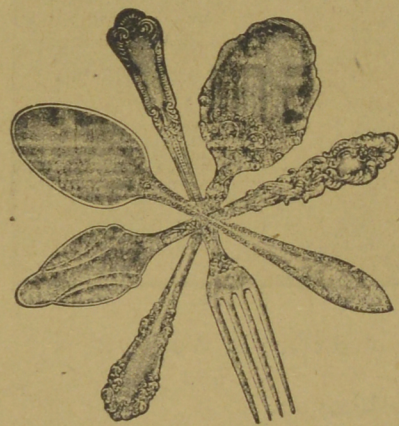
#### Military Clearing Office

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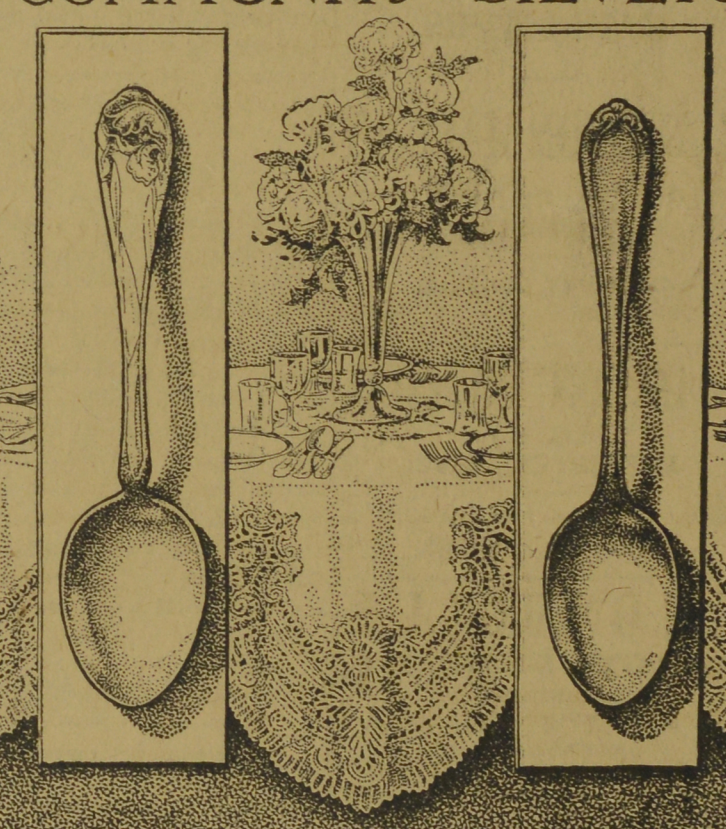
