## GETTING READY FOR THE BIG LIBERAL CONVENTION

Premier Martin May Not Allow His Name to be Put Forward for the Leadership—Hon. A. B. Hudson Likely Out of the Running—Hon. W. S. Fielding's Chances are Improving—Delegates Already Arriving at Ottawa.

Ottawa, July 29—Hon. W. M. Martin premier of Saskatchewan when in Ottawa last, informed two prominent Liberals that he had no intention of allowing his name to be put forward for the Liberal leadership. This surprising news, today, was backed by a further assertion from a leading Liberal that on account of pressing private business Hon. A. B. Hudson, of Manitoba, will not be at the convention. This appears to remove at one stroke two names which were expected to figure largely at the convention. The little doubt that Premier Martin will be nominated in spite of this assertion and an outright speech is expected from him at the convention giving the Western view as to what the Liberal platform should be, even though he refuses to allow his name to be put forward.

This news will make a complete change in the chances of various candidates for leadership. Bulking largest now in the talk of minor prophets at Ottawa are Hon. W. S. Fielding, D. D. McKenzie, Hon. George P. Graham and Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King and the order of their mention differs with the prophets.

Delegates to the convention have already started to arrive, one of the first to put in an appearance being Hon. Frank Oliver, former minister of the interior. Premier Oliver, of British Columbia, is looked for within a day or two and the other provincial premiers and ministers, it is said, will be here before the end of the week. All the provincial premiers have signified by letter their intention of attending the conference.

The official agenda for the convention may not be made public before next Monday night. It will be proposed by the Liberal advisory committee at meetings to be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week, but it must be approved by the Liberal caucus of members and senators to be held on Monday evening, August 4.

The convention will be formally called to order Tuesday morning next by Mr. D. D. McKenzie, after which the chairman—or joint chairman—will be named.

Subsequently the striking committee which will name the general committee to deal with various resolutions, etc., will be named. Apart from the sittings of the committees the deliberations of the convention will be open to the press. Accommodation is being provided for sixty newspaper men.

### Financiers Called to Ottawa

On Friday prominent financiers of Canada will come to Ottawa to consult with the finance minister and officials of his department on details of the next Dominion loan. As it was understood that the new bonds will not be exempt from taxation it follows that one of the duties of the conference will be to decide whether this will entail the giving of a larger rate of interest or the selling of the bonds below par.

The establishment of a Canadian publicity bureau in New York city under Colonel John A. Cooper gives rise to the report that a campaign will be conducted in the United States as well as in Canada.

### Consider Wheat Purchasing Board

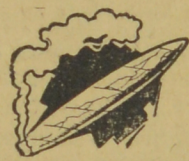
Regulations for the proposed wheat purchasing board were under consideration at this evening's meeting of the cabinet council. There will be further consideration tomorrow, in all probability, before any official announcement is made.

The creation of such a board was first suggested in the course of the

conferences which took place between men interested in the grain trade and representatives of the government shortly before the close of the session. The board was then pressed, however as the impression was current, that the imperial government would guarantee to purchase the whole exportable surplus of Canadian wheat. This course has not been followed by the imperial government, however and action is regarded as urgent.

Suspension of trading in futures on the Winnipeg Exchange is in line with the proposed creation of a purchasing board. The feeling is generally expressed further that the forcing up of prices in Winnipeg was engineered from sources interested in closing European markets to Canadian wheat.

## A LIBERAL CONVENTION AT ANDOVER

Delegates Chosen to Attend the National Convention at Ottawa Next Week.

Andover, July 29.—The Carleton-Victoria Liberal convention, called to choose delegates to the national gathering at Ottawa next week, was held today in the Specialty Theatre and was representative of both counties, and in character harmonious.

John R. Flemming was elected chairman and C. E. Gallagher secretary of the meeting. It was moved by Andrew McCain, seconded by G. W. Upham, that a committee on resolutions be appointed. The motion carried and the Hon. W. P. Jones, Hon. J. E. Tweeddale, Frank Gillespie, John W. Bohan and Dr. Griffin were nominated and on motion were unanimously elected as members of the resolutions committee.

A nominating committee to select delegates was appointed and a resolution on the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and another expressing sympathy with those who lost relatives in the great war were adopted.

The report of the nominating committee was received as follows: Delegates to Ottawa—James Burgess, Dr. F. W. Griffin, Albion R. Foster; substitutes, Frank Gillespie, John T. Flemming, Chas. E. Gallagher.

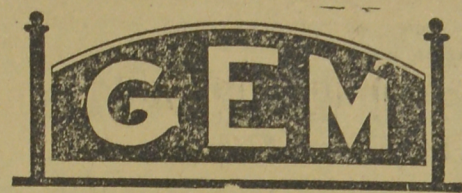
The report was received and carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned.
