

BEFORE STARTING TO SEW.

This is Certainly the Time to First be
Sure You're Right, and
Then Go Ahead.

Most of the serious mistakes that the housewife makes when she undertakes to do her own dressmaking are made before her task is really begun. If she starts right the rest is fair sailing. In the first place there is the choice of the pattern. Be sure you select one that is not too difficult, one that is suitable to the material you have on hand, and suitable to yourself. Then be sure that you have the right size. If you are not sure, get the saleswoman at the pattern counter to measure you. It is false economy to use a pattern that is not your size just because you happen to have it on hand or because a friend can lend it to you.

Study well the goods. Remember, that with most goods there is a right and wrong side and with some even an up and down. There may be even a right and left.

Sometimes this is not easily noticed so, no matter what the material, examine it with this in mind—to see whether it has up and down, right or wrong, left and right.

Velvet and Velveteen.

Velvet and velveteen and corduroy have an up and down in the weave or the fabric, although it is not very apparent. Well, you should always cut these fabrics so that when you stroke the goods it is smoothest from the hem of the skirt to the waist or from the cuff of the sleeve to the shoulder. This makes the fabric appear richer and darker. Sometimes with panne velvet, however, you use it just the reverse way—it depends on whether you want to have the material appear lighter or darker.

But, whatever you do, remember to have all the pieces cut the same way of the goods.

Different With Broadcloth.

With broadcloth the rule is reversed. As you stroke downward it must be smooth. With these materials there is a right and wrong and an up and down, so think twice before you start in cutting.

Now arrange every part of the pattern on the fabric before you cut it out. Don't say to yourself "I may as well get this piece cut out; it has to be cut some time and when I get it cut then I will know how much more material I have on hand."

Be sure you make the right allowance for hems and seams and also that you have the right skirt length. If you are short and can wear a skirt shorter than the pattern provides for, don't make full allowance for the hem. It is foolish to make the pieces any longer than you require them.

These are the things you should do before you begin to sew.

BRIEF REMINDERS.

Creamed potatoes with cheese make a pleasant change.

Egg stains may be removed from spoons by common salt.

Cold slaw may be improved by a cupful of chopped celery.

If curtains do not draw easily, rub the pole with paraffin.

Onions stuffed with minced ham are a good luncheon dish.

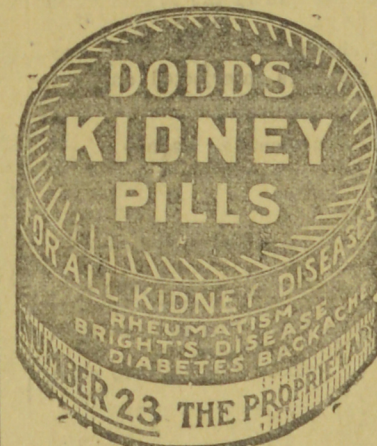

WHY BELGIANS
STILL NEED HELP

"In travelling through Belgium with the Belgian armies, I have been able to see the country recently tenanted by the Bochs in the condition in which they left it, and never was there such desolation anywhere. One cannot get away from signs of destruction, no matter where one goes, along the country roads or in the city streets.

Not only has property been destroyed and every means of livelihood taken away from the people, but the peasants, especially in the country districts, have been left destitute both of home and food. We travelled twelve miles yesterday through open country and as but one small instance of the vast plundering of the Germans, let me state that in all twelve miles not one solitary live animal did we see, and practically every tree had been felled, so you can imagine the dreary aspect of the scenery.

All the peasant women and children we met on our way, said a news correspondent, while they greeted us with cheers and received us into their homes with open arms, those that had homes, showed the greatest suffering from insufficient food and nourishment. They did not complain, but merely stated as a fact that they had not tasted meat for two months and had lived largely on soup and coffee. The cry of the Belgians today is for food and clothing and those who would help, no matter how little, should send their contributions to their committee, or direct to the Central Committee, Belgian Relief Fund 59 St. Peter street, Montreal.

London, Feb. 26.—P. M. Draper, official representative of Canadian Labor at the peace conference, sails for Canada tomorrow on board the Mauritania.


