GERMANS MUST PAY WELL FOR INSTIGATING THE WAR

Peace Treaty will be Handed Over at Versailles on Wednesday Afternoon—Differences Among Allied Nations Over Fiume and the Dalmatian Coast in a Fair Way of Being Settled—Premier Orlando Returning to Paris.

New York, May 5—The Associated Press tonight issues the following: The peace treaty formulated by the Allied and associated powers is to be handed to the German delegates at Versailles Wednesday afternoon.

Definite announcement of the time when the Germans are to be made cognizant of the price that once Imperialist Germany must pay for having instigated the world war at last has been made.

With peace measurably near by reason of this fact, there now also seems to be good basis for the belief that the differences between Great Britain, France and the United States and Italy over Italy's claims regarding Fiume and the Dalmatian coast may yet be settled with full accord.

Return of Italians

Signor Orlando the Italian premier and his foreign minister, Baron Sonnino, are returning to Paris from Rome where they have been since they quit the peace conference more than a week ago owing to the inability to obtain what Italy considered concessions which would satisfy Italian ambitions.

With the Italian question settled almost complete unanimity of sentiment would prevail in the Peace Conference. The obstacle represented by the protest of the Belgians has been surmounted by the Belgian crown council having decided unanimously to sign the treaty, it having been pointed out by the head of the Belgian delegation that the document gave honorable and satisfactory terms to Belgium.

China's protest against the award of Kiaochow to Japan and a number of smaller items are yet under discussion. The council of three sat Monday afternoon in an endeavor to settle the minor ones.

A plenary session of the peace conference is to be held Tuesday afternoon, at which the peace treaty is to be presented to the smaller powers.

Situation Relieved

The announcement that Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino the leading Italian delegates to the peace conference had left Rome for Paris and the further news that the Belgian crown council had given its assent to the signing of the peace treaty by the Belgian delegates regardless of the unsatisfactoriness to Belgium of the financial arrangements have resulted in relieving the embarrassments of the peace conference.

These developments had the effect of producing a call for a plenary session of the conference to be held tomorrow for the purpose of laying the peace treaty before all the participating nations. The treaty may be presented to the Germans on Wednesday or Thursday of this week.

Regarding the railway in the province of Shang-Tung, which is to become a Sino-Japanese joint undertaking Baron Makino said today that the owners would use special police to ensure the secrecy of traffic and for no other purpose. The force would be composed of Chinese. Such Japanese instructors as the railway directors should select would be appointed by the Chinese government.

Clemenceau Did His Best

Paris, May 5—"I have done my best. I think it is a good peace." This declaration was made to the editor of the Figaro last night by Premier Clemenceau. The editor adds that from the details he has been able to learn, he is convinced that all France is weighing well the immense advantages she will gain from collaboration with

Fiume Issue Settled

London, May 5—According to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Paris, the question regarding Fiume has been settled in full agreement with the Italian government on the basis that Fiume shall remain autonomous for two years when it will be assigned to Italy.

Arrangements have been made for some forty journalists to be present at the ceremony of handing the peace terms to the Germans at Versailles Wednesday afternoon, according to Reuter's Paris correspondent.

FIREMEN ARE PLACED ON NEW SCALE OF PAY

saving if he could get suitable men to take the places of those who would not be there. It was decidedly unfair to give a new man the same rate of pay as a man of experience. As far as the call-men were concerned they should get their increase. Some time ago he had asked for increases for the Assistant Chief and himself. For the latter he would say that he had been getting only \$100 for fourteen years and was worth all of the \$200 he asked. For himself it was his thirty-fifth year in the department and fifteenth year as Chief. He asked for a fifty per cent increase but if he did not get it he would not strike. No head of a department should take that attitude and should uphold his subordinates in it either. As far as he knew the firemen would retire on the 7th unless given the increase.

Assistant Chief Clark

Assistant Chief Clark said that he like many of the citizens believed that the call-men should receive the increase they asked for. The Department was recognized publicly by Peter Clinch secretary of the New Brunswick Underwriters as that with the best fire record in the Maritime Provinces. Credit was due the water supply and the luck of the city, but the men of the Fire Department deserved much more. There were several misconceptions concerning the Fire Department. One was that the motor truck alone responded to still alarms. Usually half a dozen men responded with the truck. It is not expected that the men would ask for another increase next year. Work at a fire continued long after the "all out" sounded. That signal was merely for the pumping station to reduce the pressure. He opposed any reduction in the Department and pointed out that the members of it furnished their own uniforms and bicycles.

Discussion

The delegation withdrew and the matter was considered.

Mayor Hanson said Moncton was paying call-men \$140 per year each. Truro had a purely volunteer department free of poll-tax.

Ald. Young said the Fire Committee had met but had reached no decision. Ald. Cooper favored Chief Rutter's suggestion for a sliding scale and the weeding out of some members.

Ald. Young favored giving the firemen the increase requested. He moved that hereafter the firemen be paid as follows: First year men \$50; Second year men, \$75; Third year men, \$100; that all callmen now in the department be paid \$100 irrespective of length of service; that former members returning from overseas be reinstated at maximum salary.

Ald. Barker seconded the motion which was carried.

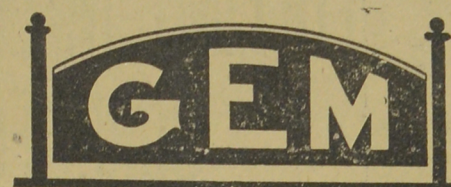
Ald. Reid suggested that a gong be installed in the residence of each callman.

Assistant Chief's Salary

Ald. Young moved that the salary of the Assistant Chief be \$200.

In amendment Ald. McKay moved seconded by Ald. Wilkinson that the salary of the Assistant Chief be \$175. The amendment was carried.

Both Ald. Barker and Ald. Wilkinson said that that meant the Assistant Chief would resign.
