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



TWO PRACTICAL RECIPES.

Rice Pudding.

Wash four tablespoonfuls of rice in warm water, then place in baking dish and add one cupful warm water. Cook until rice is soft. Add one pint of milk and five tablespoonfuls sugar. Stito mix, bake slowly, stirring frequently. Flavor with cinnamon or nutmeg.

Tea Biscuits.

Two cupfuls of sifted flour, one teaspoonful salt, four level teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

Sift to mix, then rub in two level tablespoonfuls shortening and mix to dough with a three-quarter cupful of milk and water. Work to smooth elastic dough in the bowl then roll out on flour-dusted board three-quarters-inc thick, cut, brush tops of biscuits with shortening and bake in hot over for fifteen minutes.






