## NATIONAL RAILWAY BILL BEFORE PARLIAMENT

Hon. Mr. Fielding Moves an Amendment That Clause 16 be  
Struck Out—Was Rejected by a Majority of 51—Govern-  
ment Made Statement That Peace Treaty is Not Likely to  
be Ratified Until August.

Ottawa, May 6.—Hon. Arthur Meighan  
this afternoon announced at the open-  
ing of the House of Commons that the  
bill to extend to the end of the present  
session orders-in-council passed under  
the war measures act, would not be  
proceeded with. The intimation had  
been received from the Premier he  
said, to the effect that arrangements  
as to the treaty of peace were such  
that it was unlikely any peace treaty  
would be formally ratified and the ces-  
sation of war formally proclaimed by  
the king approximately before the first  
of August. Consequently there was no  
object in going on with the measure  
at the present time.

The announcement to drop the bill  
was received with opposition cheers.

C. N. R. Bill

Hon. Martin Burrell then moved the  
third reading of the bill to incorporate  
the Canadian National Railway Com-  
pany.

Hon. W. S. Fielding said that he had  
hoped the government would see fit to  
amend the bill in such a way as to  
bring it in line with Canadian parlia-  
mentary principles. One of the prin-  
ciples of the Canadian parliament was  
that all matters connected with the  
expenditure of public moneys should  
be vested in parliament. He proposed,  
he said to make a motion which he  
trusted would not be treated as one  
of non-confidence in the government.  
Every member should be free to vote  
upon it purely on its merits.

The resolution on which the bill was  
based said Mr. Fielding had been an  
extremely long one and the minister of  
railways had asked that the discussion  
on it should not be protracted, intimat-  
ing that plenty of time would be  
given when the bill was in the commit-  
tee stage. On the principle of owner-  
ship as applied to all railways, but in  
this case he wanted to see public own-  
ership get a fair chance. Under the bill  
now before the house, it would not get  
a fair chance because it started out  
with two handicaps.

#### Opposed to Closure.

The first handicap, said Mr. Field-  
ing, was that the bill had been forced  
through by closure. Closure was a  
prerogative which should be used as  
rarely as possible. The house had not  
been given sufficient time to discuss  
the bill properly.

The second handicap was that the  
bill disregarded all safeguards recom-  
mended by parliamentarians, notably  
control of the public finances.

By so doing they were giving the  
principle of public ownership a black  
eye. That power which would give  
the House of Commons absolute author-  
ity over the public purse was to be  
disregarded. While every other branch  
of the public service had to pay its  
revenue to the public treasury, parlia-  
ment was going to give some gentle-  
men in Toronto, estimable, no doubt,  
power over immense sums of money  
which they could use without any par-
