## REVALUATION TO BE DEALT WITH AT SPECIAL MEETING

City Council in Session Until a Late Hour Last Night—Expenditure to be Made on Road to New Maryland—Tenders for Coal will be Called for Again—Much Routine Business.

The City Council met until a late hour last night and transacted much routine business as well as some important matters. A special meeting to be held at an early date was decided upon for the purpose of discussing the revaluation of the city for purposes of assessment and the appointment of suitable men to act as valuers. It is probable that a man from outside, well qualified to act, will be one of those appointed. Coal tenders were again up for discussion. It was decided that there had been too much jockeying among the tenderers and that the best course would be to call for new tenders. The question of improving the road to New Maryland also was discussed in connection with the petition from the residents of that parish and it was decided to authorize the Street Committee to expend up to \$500 on condition that the Provincial Department of Public Works does likewise.

### Municipal Home

For the Municipal Home Committee Ald. Barker reported a total expenditure for the month of \$715.03. On his motion a cheque for \$350 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

### Tax Collections

Ald. Reid for the Finance Committee reported on tax collections as follows: April, 1919, \$2735.14. April 1919, \$788.07.

By resolution of Ald. Reid the arrangement entered into in 1918 with the Town of Devon with respect to assessment on income, was continued.

### Sales of Fees

Reporting on the sale of city weigh scales fees to James I. Atherton Ald. Cooper stated that a different arrangement should be made as Mr. Atherton was not physically fit to perform the duties of public weigher. However, no person had bid against Mr. Atherton and he must be appointed.

Mayor Hanson stated that in the event of Mr. Atherton becoming incapacitated the City Council could act. Mr. Atherton was appointed public weigher and Harry C. Mackey was appointed harbor master and collector of anchorage and wharfage fees and tolls.

land praying that the city improve the highway leading to that parish, said that he was in communication with the Minister of Public Works with a view toward obtaining a substantial grant. He pointed out also that the land along the road was chiefly owned by the University of New Brunswick and was not assessable.

Ald. McKay said the Minister of Public Works had promised to take into consideration the claims of the City of Fredericton for substantial expenditure on the highway between the Dominion Experimental Station and the Sunbury line.

On motion it was decided to refer to the Street Committee with power to expend a maximum of \$500 on the New Maryland Road on condition that the Provincial Public Works Department expend a like amount.

### Matters of Wages

In connection with an increase of the wages of Samuel Rawlings Ald. Cooper moved that the wages be \$2.15 per day.

Ald. McKay said that if this increase was made to the amount named other employees must be given the same. He did not think the Street Department had money to use in general wage increases.

Ald. Cooper withdrew his motion and the increase was made to \$2.00 per day.

On motion arrangement was made for payment of City employees twice a month instead of once a month.

In response to Ald. Cooper Ald. Young said he had conversed with several firemen who had said they were satisfied with the arrangement suggested. The sliding scale of pay for the Fire Department was adopted on motion.

### Tenders for Coal

Ald. Burpee moved that George H. King, M. P. P. be given a contract for 1,500 tons of run-of-mine coal at \$4.50 per ton f. o. b. at the mine.

Ald. Baxter objected that the Minto Coal Company had tenders lower than that. It had not been fair the way the whole matter was handled.

Mayor Hanson said he was a director of the Minto Coal Company and felt he could not preside while this discussion was taking place. He withdrew calling Deputy Mayor McKay to the chair.

The Deputy Mayor was given a hearty reception upon taking his place. Ald. Wilkinson said that the understanding was that new tenders were to be called. Ald. Reid was of like opinion.

Ald. Burpee said he had no objection to new tenders being called.

Ald. Camp said it looked fishy for the Minto Coal Company to tender the second time and a few cents lower than the other tenders.

Ald. Burpee withdrew his motion and moved that new tenders be called for coal for the Pumping Station and Lighting plant. Carried.

Mayor Hanson resumed the chair.

### Purchase of Hose

Ald. Young reported on the purchase of hose. A large number of tenders had been received and the committee had been guided largely by the advice of Chief Rutter.

Ald. Wilkinson stated that Ald. Young as chairman of the Fire Committee had acted properly.

Ald. Cooper said it was true that hose had been offered at \$1.37 or \$1.36 but it was inferior to that selected.

Ald. Young said the samples of hose were there to be seen. The report was received and adopted.

### Chestnut Canoe Company

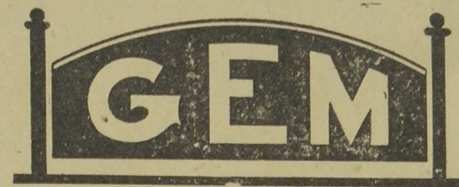
On the matter of the lease of the land used by the Chestnut Canoe Co. Ald. Reid reported that he had spoken to a member of the firm and had suggested that the Company give the city that portion of the lot next, the C. P. R. tracks for use as a city yard in exchange for an extension of the other lot.

Permission for the removal of the Monitor Manufacturing Co., building via Northumberland, Argyle and York streets was given the Chestnut Canoe Co. under certain conditions.

The question of the Chestnut Canoe company's lease was referred to the Finance Committee.

### Revaluation

On the motion of Ald. Reid it was decided to hold a special meeting of the City Council to discuss the matter of revaluation of the city for assessment purposes and appointment of revaluators.
