

NEW COMPANIES INCORPORATED IN PROVINCE

DORCHESTER TO HAVE ELECTRICAL COMPANY

New Shipbuilding Co. Organized in St. John—Large Mercantile Company at Port Elgin.

The Royal Gazette today contains the notices of the incorporation of a number of new companies in this province.

Frank H. Copp, Courtney B. Copp and William Grant of Port Elgin, Fred T. Tingley, Edgar M. Copp, and Albert E. Wry of Sackville, A. Cavour Chapman, John L. MacDonald, and Joseph A. Marvin of Moncton have been incorporated under the name of F. H. Copp, Limited, to carry on at Port Elgin a general mercantile business, a wool buying and selling business and a garage. The capital stock is \$49,000 and head office will be at Port Elgin.

Development Company, Limited

John H. Hickman, Fred Clinton Palmer and W. Hazen Chapman all of Dorchester have been incorporated as the Dorchester Development Company, Limited, with head office at Dorchester and a capital stock of \$5,000. The Company is authorized to generate and sell electricity in the town and parish of Dorchester, the parts of the Parish of Sackville, known as Woodhurst, Fairfield and Fairview and the works and property of The Intercolonial Copper Company in the Parish of Sackville.

Ship-building Company

Major Hugh Havelock McLean Jr. Oscar Ring and Martin Gerald Dolan all of St. John have been incorporated as Alma R. Company, Limited, with head office in the City of St. John and capital stock of \$9,000. The company is authorized to engage in business of building, operation and sale of vessels, lumbering and mercantile pursuits in general.

Mr. Fred Kelley of Kingsclear has purchased the Belvoir Hotel from Mr. Frank Gunter and is moving to the hotel to take charge. The Belvoir was formerly known as the Empire House. Mr. A. D. Gunter has retired from the hotel business.

Furniture and Instruments

City Engineer McDowell has applied for instruments and furniture for the office which has been assigned him at the City Hall. The instruments will be supplied by the Street Committee and the office furniture by the City Hall committee.

Grant for F. B. Band

On the motion of Ald. Cooper seconded by Ald. Baxter the City Council last night voted a grant of \$500 to the Fredericton Brass Band under the same conditions as were in force last year. Ald. Baxter, Ald. Cooper and Ald. Young were appointed the Music Committee.

Died Early This Morning

The death occurred at an early hour this morning after a lingering illness of Miss Gertrude MacKinnon. The deceased was a graduate nurse of Corey Hill Hospital, Brooklyn, and the Victoria Public Hospital of this city. About fifteen months ago she gave up her profession on account of illness. She is survived by her mother, Mrs. William MacKinnon and by one sister and three brothers. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock from the late home at 291 York Street. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery, Rev. Z. L. Fash conducting the service.

SALARY OF CHIEF OF POLICE AS LIQUOR SUB-INSPECTOR WAS AGAIN DISCUSSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL

By Resolution the Council Decided That Committee Should Take Matter Up With Police Commission and Provincial Government—Ald. McKay Resents Motion as Interference With Police Commission—Says Province Cannot be Compelled to Pay More Money.

The City Council last night passed a resolution to the effect that a committee be appointed to wait upon the Police Commission and the Provincial Government with a view to making a more satisfactory arrangement with the Provincial Government in the matter of the proportion of the salary of the Chief of Police to be paid by the Province for his duties as Liquor Sub-Inspector for Fredericton and vicinity. Ald. Reid introduced the resolution seconded by Ald. Wilkinson which brought on a lively discussion the opinion being expressed that the Province should pay \$750 or else entirely separate the offices of Chief of Police and Sub-Inspector. The opinion also was expressed that in spite of the statement of Chief Finley that he devoted but one-tenth of his time to the enforcement of the Prohibition Act, the Chief devoted much more of his time to it. Ald. McKay resented the resolution as an interference with the Police Commission.

The Resolution

The resolution was as follows: Whereas the enforcement of the Prohibition Act in the City of Fredericton and vicinity is a duty imposed upon the chief of Police of Fredericton by virtue of an agreement made between the Police Commission and the New Brunswick Government acting through its Chief Inspector.

And whereas the Police Commission of Fredericton has stated to this council that, according to information given by the Chief of Police he devotes only ten per cent of his time to the enforcement of the said Prohibition Act in the City of Fredericton and vicinity.

And whereas the Chief of Police receives an amount equal to thirty per cent of the salary from the Government for the ten per cent of his time which he devotes to the enforcement of the Act,

And whereas the City of Fredericton supplies the said Chief of Police with office accommodation and with the assistance of the Police Force, to enable him to carry out his duties and

whereas the City of Fredericton pays the balance or seventy per cent of the salary of the chief and pays all the salary of said police officers who assist him,

Therefore, resolved that it is the opinion of the Council that the service of one man who devotes nine-tenths of his time to other matters is not sufficient for the enforcement of the Prohibition Act, should the Chief Inspector be desirous of enforcing the same in the City of Fredericton and vicinity.

And further resolved that in the opinion of this council the Chief of Police by virtue of that office is in a better position than any other properly to enforce the Act in the City of Fredericton and vicinity, should he be able to give sufficient time to its enforcement.

And further resolved that in the opinion of this Council an arrangement should be made with the Government and the Police Commission if possible whereby the Chief of Police would be able to give practically his entire time to the enforcement of the Act.

And further resolved that if such an agreement cannot be made that this Council request the Government to appoint an inspector for Fredericton and vicinity with such assistants as may be necessary, who shall devote their entire time to the enforcement of the Prohibition Act.

And further that the council do appoint a Committee to interview the Police Commission and the Government, with an object of carrying out this view of the Council as expressed in this resolution.

Ald. McKay Objects

Ald. McKay wanted no interference with the Police Commission. The Commission was willing to separate the offices of Liquor Inspector and Chief of Police but such separation would mean an increase in the salary to be paid the Chief. The arrangement with regard to salary was the best that could be made with the Chief Inspector who as all knew was not an easy
