Governments, that, by reason of the scarcity of shipping, the long voyage to the Argentine, together with the submarine dangers, the scarcity of the food supply, presented a serious aspect to the fighting forces at the front as well as for the sustenance of the civil population overseas; as fast as bottoms could be obtained, the wheat was shipped from the elevators of Canada and the United States, which greatly reduced the quantities in the elevators of both countries.

As a result of a conference held at Ottawa of all the Provinces, the Department put on a campaign for Increased Production; we were assisted in the work by the Municipalities, favored by Divine Providence and raised a million bushels of wheat in New Brunswick.

Wheat Production

In order to encourage the continuance of wheat production, I recommended an increase of the amount of bonus to be paid to encourage wheat mills from \$1000 for a 25 barrel mill to \$2000 for a 50 barrel mill. This increase was granted and six new mills will have been erected by next year, which will thoroughly equip the Province with modern flour mills.

Sheep Campaign

To relieve the high cost of wool and meat, a campaign to place sheep on every hillside was started, and the first line of credit given to farmers by the Government was provided, to assist those farmers to finance new flocks. As a result, this Province is carrying 10,000 more sheep today than it did three years ago, and we want to see this increase continue until our export will be not car-loads but train loads, as they are profitable stock and increase, with proper care, rapidly.

Improved Dairying

We have also made marked improvement in our dairying products. Three years ago local dealers would not buy New Brunswick cheese, except from one or two factories. Today, with proper supervision, we have brought the standard up to that of Ontario product and our dealers are giving prices for New Brunswick cheese equal to that obtained for the product of other provinces.

Our fruit crop this year is more abundant than for a number of years past.

The Honey crop, a sample of which will be seen in our Departmental Exhibit, has been increased over a hundred per cent under the skillful and

SALE OF STANDING TIMBER

A sale of Standing Timber on about 247 square miles of Crown Land in various parts of the Province, will be held at the Crown Land Office, Fredericton, on the 17th day of September, 1919, beginning at 2 o'clock, Daylight Saving Time, under the following conditions, viz.:

Berths to be sold on a straight stumpage bid rate per thousand superficial feet, the upset rate of which will be announced at the time of sale, conveying the right to cut and carry away the merchantable lumber as advertised for the term ending August 1st, 1921. Ten per cent of the bid stumpage price on the estimated quantity of merchantable lumber standing on the berth to be paid as each berth is sold.

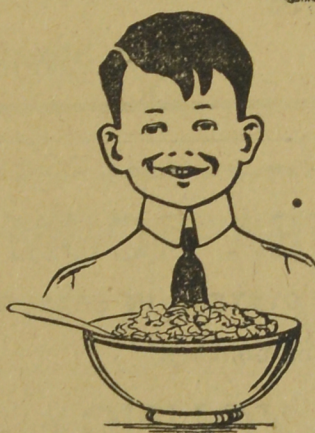

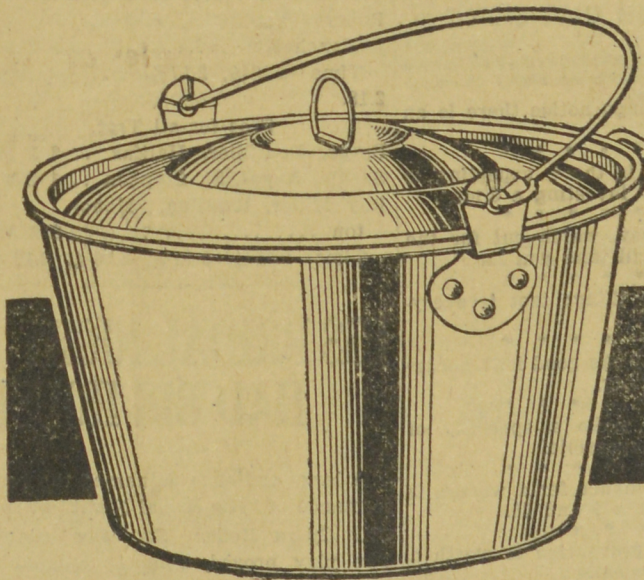
