WOMAN AND MAN HELD ON A MURDER CHARGE AT MONTREAL

A Second Inquest Into the Death of a Man Who Perished in His Burned House Results in the Arrest of His Wife and a Man Who Claimed to be Her Protector.

Montreal, Sept. 15.—The jury under Coroner Trepannier on Saturday rendered a verdict holding Mrs. Cleophr Dubeau and William Lussier criminally responsible for the death of Jim Dubeau, husband of the former, who was burned to death in his house in the middle of July at Ste. Melachie, near Ormstown. Immediately after the inquest Coroner Trepannier made out a warrant for the arrest of the pair, and Detective Rioux, of the Provincial Police, executed it and the man and the woman were taken to the Valleyfield jail.

Many of the citizens of Ste. Melachie felt that the evidence heard at the first inquest was not complete and that the case was not as accidental as it had at first seemed, owing to the fact that Mrs. Dubeau had slept in one of the outhouses of the farm and that Lussier had slept outside her door, watching over her. It was then that a petition was made and sent to the Attorney General asking for the reopening of the inquest.

Dubeau's body was exhumed and for a time it was thought that the bones found in the coffin were those of an animal, but this was later found to be wrong.

MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE OF BRITAIN FROM LLOYD GEORGE

London, Sept. 14.—Premier Lloyd George has issued a message to the people of Great Britain in "The Future," which will be distributed free throughout the country on Monday. The Premier says: "Millions of gallant young men have fought for the new world. Hundreds of thousands died to establish it. If we fail to honor the promise given, then we dishonor ourselves."

Winston Spencer Churchill, Minister of War, also is a contributor. His article deals with the army, which he says in the future will not be substantially larger than the pre-war army. "We are not going to be a conscript nation," says Mr. Churchill. "We are going to make the Germans abandon conscription and are going to abandon it ourselves."

WHEN BISHOP INGLIS WAS IN FREDERICTON

Bishop Charles Inglis arrived in Fredericton, on the occasion of his second visit, on the 19th July, 1792. Some further extracts from his journal will be of interest. He came up the river in a small boat and when he had nearly reached his destination, the Rev. Mr. Cooke sent his son to invite him to lodge with him, as Fredericton was much crowded at that time by officers of the army and the sitting of the Supreme Court. "I accepted the offer," writes the Bishop "and sailed up the river to his house, two and a half miles above Fredericton," on the opposite side of the river.

"Friday, July 20—After breakfast crossed the river with Col. Robinson and Mr. Cooke to Fredericton in my boat. Called on Governor Carleton, who received me with much kindness afterwards I engaged a lodging with Mr. Stephen Jarvis, to which I am to go tomorrow. Viewed the church, which is nearly in the same state that I left it four years ago. There was some mismanagement in the building by which the money was injudiciously expended, particularly in regard to the cellar under it and in placing pillars under the roof for its support. Portland Chapel in London, was absurdly taken for a model. The chancel and steeple are inside and the building a uniform square so that it resembles a Conventicle. These things arose from a mistake; the architects are worthy men.

Saturday, July 25—Rode out five miles before dinner with Mr. Michael Cooke to view the country. Came to a new settlement of five families. The principal settler, Mr. Reed, was formerly my tenant in the 'Nine Partners' New York, who told me that he owed me on note, the sum of £10, New York currency, which I desired him not to pay until he found it quite convenient. He had erected a good grist mill and is a useful inhabitant.

"Sunday, July 22—Prepared to preach, and transcribed some prayers to be used in the morning and evening services by the clergy—that for the Governor being the one now used in Ireland for the Lord Lieutenant. Also adapted the prayer for the High Court of Parliament in England to our Legislature to be used during their session. Preached to a numerous audience on Confirmation.

"Sunday, July 29—I preached this forenoon at the church in Fredericton and after sermon confirmed 32 persons, some of them from the Rev. Mr. Price's parish of St. Mary's."

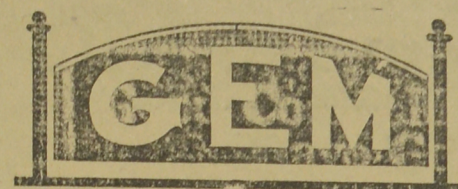
BACON IS TOO HIGH IN PRICE
