EXHIBITION AWAY TO GOOD START TODAY

WEATHER CONDITIONS IDEAL: MANY IN THE CITY

Midway Attractions to Arrive Today—Airplane Flight This Afternoon if Weather is Favorable.

The Fredericton Exhibition of 1919 began its first day this morning with crowds of people in the city and weather conditions almost ideal. With fine weather during the balance of the week all attendance records should be shattered. As was expected motorists will form a large proportion of the crowds at the fair. Many already have arrived. The hotels of the city have made preparations for extra large crowds and it is likely that hotel accommodations in neighboring towns and villages will be called into requisition. Hotels a few miles away from the city can easily be used by motorists and probably will do a good business.

In the main building and in the new Transportation Building also booths and other exhibits are assuming the regular appearance which they present at all fairs and outside the attractions which are to form the Midway, are almost all doing business.

More Livestock Arrived

On Sunday evening twelve or fourteen cars of livestock, including cattle, sheep and poultry, came in from the Woodstock fair and were put in their quarters. Some fine looking cattle and sheep were present. One large bull which is on exhibition is reported to have tramped from Woodstock arriving here on Saturday morning and covering the distance in about thirteen hours. Some exceptionally good looking sheep were also among the exhibits with some fine prize-winning poultry. The exhibit of the Agricultural Department is calling forth much favorable comment. Both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia apples are on exhibit the former contrasting favorably with the Nova Scotian fruit. The farm produce in what was formerly used as the poultry house is excellent some of the products exceeding even the fondest hopes of some of the spectators.

Amusements Here Today

Latest advices concerning the midway state that it is coming here over the C. N. R. on the Ocean Limited but the time of arrival in this city is not yet known as it figured in a train wreck which held it up for some time. The airman of Truro has also been heard from stating that if the weather is favorable he will fly from Truro to this city arriving here late this afternoon. Should the weather prove unfavorable he will wait till the morning before making the flight which he expects to do in two hours or less.

PHYSICIANS AND DRUGGISTS DEALT WITH BY PASTOR

REV. FATHER CARNEY SPOKE OF PRESCRIPTIONS

Little Better Than Old-Time Liquor Sellers if They Furnish Liquor to Drunkards.

Rev. F. L. Carney, pastor of St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic Church in this city during the course of a sermon yesterday, made pointed reference to the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 and some features of its enforcement. The pastor was referring to the necessity for men to be devout and difficulties which sometimes stand in the way.

Rev. Father Carney dealing with the matter of prescriptions for liquor said that the physician who prescribed liquor for a man whom he knew to be an habitual drunkard was responsible for all acts which that man might commit while under the influence of that liquor and the same was true of any druggist who would fill a prescription for such a man. Neither was any better than the old-time liquor-seller.

The pastor also made reference to the use of Jamaica Ginger and lemon extract as beverages warning against them as things which killed. He further in the course of his remarks took exception to the opinion sometimes expressed that drunkenness is a disease. It was not a disease but a controllable habit.

Smallpox in Gloucester County

The Department of Health has been informed by the Secretary of the sub-district Board of Health for Gloucester County, that a case of smallpox has been reported from Inkerman. The usual precautions have been taken.

That the conversation directed to him was direct and pointed is further supported in the fact that he had to purchase a ticket before he could gain entrance.
