## GENERAL ALLENBY'S IM- PRESSIONS OF PALESTINE

Says it is a County With a Future—British Commander-in-  
Chief Held in High Esteem by the Natives—Is Spoken of  
With the Deepest Feeling—Jewish Colonies are Prospering  
in the old "Land of Promise."

Gen. Sir Edmund H. H. Allenby com-  
mander in chief of occupied Palestine  
and Syria, received me at his headquar-  
ters here today. He had just come from  
Cilicia which military necessity is add-  
ing to the enemy territory now under  
his administration, from the frontiers  
of Egypt to the village of Adana.

Gen. Allenby is continually covering  
"Oeta" as his occupied enemy territory  
administration is abbreviated here, in  
tireless trips from his headquarters at  
Haifa. Everywhere he is hailed with  
enthusiasm, for his powerful figure  
commands attention. The Moslems in-  
sist that his name spelled backward  
means "The Son of Allah." Jews and  
Christians speak of him with the  
deepest feeling. Haifa and Jaffa and  
other settlements have renamed  
streets in his honor.

Because of his intimate knowledge  
of the country I asked Gen. Allenby his  
impressions of Palestine.

"It is a country with a future," he  
replied, "The terraced hills show that  
even they were once cultivated. Our  
Australian troops have been so impres-  
sioned with it that many of them are in-  
terested in obtaining land here."

"And what of the Jewish colonies?"  
I asked.

"The Jewish colonies are prosperous,"  
he told me, "but those who would de-  
velop the country must prepare to  
spend a great deal of money with little  
return for some time, just as America  
did in Panama. The greatest difficulty  
is fever."

Rumors are afloat here that may  
reach the United States that the Jew-  
ish battalions in Palestine never saw  
action. These Gen. Allenby denies. The  
38th and 39th battalions did good ser-  
vice in the Jordan valley, he said, al-  
though comparatively untrained troops.

The man in the street, too, sees a  
political significance in the scheme of  
"Oeta". There is "Oeta South," Pal-  
estine under a British administrator,  
with headquarters in Jerusalem; "Oeta  
East" centering about Damascus, has

local Arab rule; while "Oeta North,"  
extending to Adana, is administered  
by the French from Beirut. With the  
addition of Cilicia under Turkish offi-  
cials, Syria will be known as "Oeta  
West", while the new district will be-  
come "Oeta North."

These divisions, according to their  
commander in chief, are purely mili-  
tary. Political settlements are to be  
left entirely to the peace conference.  
The arrangement is simply a matter  
of control to maintain order.

The commander in chief is fond of  
tossing Americans about our coun-  
try's relations with Turkey. "Let me  
see," he will jest, "you are not at war  
with Turkey yet, are you?" I asked  
him during one of these passes if he  
was a Zionist.

"I have no politics," he smiled. "I  
am just a military man."

Perhaps it is because he knows all  
there is to be known about war that  
Gen. Allenby favors a league of na-  
tions to secure permanent peace.

"The engines of war are getting  
rather too much for us," he said. "Man  
will soon have reason to fear his own  
deadly inventions and destroy all ma-  
chines of destruction."

"Yes indeed. I should like to send a  
message to America," he responded  
readily to my request. "I should like  
to thank America for the invaluable  
work of the Red Cross. It helped me  
in every possible way. I never met an  
American in this country who was not  
out to do all he could to aid us. I am  
very grateful for it."
