Beans—8 to 10 hours.
Beef—Sirloin, rare, per lb., 8 to 10
minutes; well done, per lb., 12 to 15
minutes; rolled rib or rump, per lb.,

20 to 30 minutes.
Bread—Medium loaf, 40 to 60 min
Cake—Plain, 20 to 40 minutes.
Biscuit—10 to 20 minutes.
Sponge Cake—45 to 60 minutes.
Chickens—3 to 4 lbs weight, 1 to
one and a half hours.
Cookies—10 to 15 minutes.
Custards—15 to 20 minutes.
Duck (tame)—40 to 60 minutes.
Fish—6 to 8 lbs., 1 hour.
Gingerbread—20 to 30 minutes.
Graham Gems—30 minutes.
Lamb—Well done, per lb., 15 min.

BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a
sponge moistened with turpentine.
Drive Away Anns.—A little quick
lime placed in the infested places.
Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it
with turpentine till every trace is
removed.
Make Leather Waterproof.—Satur-
ate it with castor oil; to stop shoes
squaking, drive a peg into the middle
of the sole.
Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a
mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda
1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.
Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with
common salt.
Clean Gloves.—Pour a little ben-
zine into a basin and wash the gloves
in it, rubbing and squeezing them un-
til clean. If much soiled, they must
be washed again through clean ben-
zine and rinsed in a fresh supply.
Hang in the air to dry.
Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a lit-
tle soda in warm water and pour in a
small amount of ammonia. Hold the
brushes with the bristles downward
and avoid wetting the back as far as
possible; shake until the grease is
removed; then rinse in cold water and
put in the air to dry.
Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a
teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a
quart of water, strain it twice, then
dip the mildewed places in this weak
solution and lay in the sun. If not ef-
fective the first time repeat.
How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—
Apply a red hot iron to the head for
applied immediately while the screw
is hot.
Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops
of refined carbolic acid into an ounce
of rose water; shake well and apply.
(If you hold your breath while a mos-
quito has its bill in you it cannot
withdraw it until you breathe again).

BIG HOLIDAY CROWD SAW GOOD
RACING AT FREDERICTON TRACK;
LOCAL HORSES WON BOTH CLASSES

Border Prince Upset Calculations by Winning 2.19 Trot Mon-
day—Made New Mark for Stallion on Fredericton Track—
Roy Volo Won 2.14 Mixed Class Tuesday—Harvest Hope
Took 2.24 Trot in Straight Heats Though The Manor was
the Favorite.

The opening harness meet of the
Fredericton track was a big success on
its first two days, the attendance on
Dominion Day being particularly large
and there also being ample evidence
that the management was not ready to
cope with a big crowd coming in a
rush. The holiday racing attracted
many people from outside points and
motors were quite generally used to
bring them here. The weather on both
days was favorable.

Monday's Racing

The feature of Monday's racing was
the upset given the talent by Border
Prince in the 2.19 Trot which he won
in straight heats, the favorite Evelyn
B. being second in each. Incidentally
Border Prince set a new mark for a
stallion over a Fredericton track when
he stepped the mile in 2.18½ in the
second heat. In this race the Reed
stable from Fort Fairfield substituted
Bintaxia for Boldo but after being
third in the first heat she was drawn
on account of lameness.

Touz the Bathurst horse which had
been favored in the 2.24 Trot and
Pace, lived up to advanced notices
taking the race in straight heats. The
two St. John horses Marincobell and
Rudy K. fighting it out for third mon-
ey furnished great interest Rudy K.
proving the better.

Dominion Day Races

Dominion Day saw the largest
crowd which has attended a summer's
day's racing in a long while. The
crowd is variously estimated from
fifteen hundred to twenty-five hun-
dred, and the motorists were much in
evidence. Accommodations for a big
crowd however were missing and
much inconvenience resulted. Again
the calculations were upset for in the
2.24 Trot Harvest Hope carried off
the honors in straight heats although
The Manor had been the favorite. The
latter was only third Sam McKinney
taking second money and David Todd
putting up a fight for third money.

The 2.14 Trot and Pace went four
heats, Roy Volo which was heavily
favored dropping the first heat but
winning the remaining three. The first
heat was a great finish. The Volo
horse was in the lead almost to the
wire but within a few yards was pas-
sed by both the others and finished
only third, the heat going to Bob Mac
with Little Anna S. second. This win
gave Bob Mac second money. In the
second heat Bob Mac broke badly on
the back stretch in the first half-mile
and Roy Volo took a lead which he
kept. His time 2.16½ was the fastest
of the day. In the third heat Roy Volo
was pressed by Bob Mac almost until
the last quarter but another bad break
put the Amherst horse back.

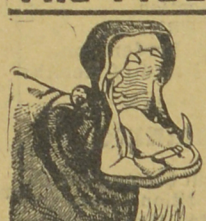
