THE ITALIANS INVITED TO RETURN TO CONFERENCE

An Invitation Sent to the Government by Lloyd George, Wilson and Clemenceau — Believed That Italy will Accept—Personal Element of the Controversy will be Removed and an Initiative of a Friendly Nature Determined Upon.

Paris, May 4—Premiers Clemenceau and Lloyd George and President Wilson, composing the Council of three today sent a communication to the Italian government inviting it to resume its place at the peace-conference.

The Council's invitation of such a nature is that it is believed that Italy will accept and that the relations temporarily broken by the recent departure from Paris of Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino will be restored by the presence of Italian delegates at the conference before the treaty is delivered to the German delegates.

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Confident of Settlement

Major Fiorello H. La Guardia, a member of the United States House of Representatives from New York, who is an Italian by birth, after seeing Colonel House today, said he believed the entire Italian question could be settled within forty-eight hours. He added he was urging that pride should not stand in the way of Italy accepting the first overture made from Paris.

Delay of Week

London, May 3—It is probable that the peace treaty will not be ready for presentation to the Germans before the end of next week, says Reuters Paris correspondent, owing to the fact that several questions remain unsettled and also because the actual working document is taking more time than had been expected.

Favorable Development

Paris, May 2—The Italian situation took a more favorable turn today. The indications were that some arrangement would be made for Italy to be represented when the peace treaty is presented to the Germans next week.

The Belgian Protest

Brussels, May 3—A petition has been presented to King Albert by the national political committee that they refuse to sign the peace treaty. This committee represented 100,000 members and 300 communes.

The cabinet after a meeting with King Albert today lasting three hours deferred decision on the peace treaty until its meeting Sunday with the Belgian delegates to the peace conference. The premier told the newspaper correspondents that the position was grave.

Austrians Invited

Paris, May 3—The council of three has invited the Austrian and Hungarian peace delegates to come to Versailles the week after next to receive the peace terms relating to their respective countries. Reuter's correspondent is informed.

Conference at Rome

London, May 4—Telegrams from the Italian capital reporting the efforts being made by allied diplomats to heal the breach caused by the absence of Italy's delegation at the peace conference.

ence, says that Camille Barre, the French ambassador at Home conferred with Premier Orlando yesterday from 11.35 a. m. until noon.

A conflict of opinion is apparent among the Italian newspapers regarding a possible settlement of the Adriatic question. One Rome message, the Epoca says, the Epoca understands a resolution of the Fiume dispute will be proposed with France acting as intermediary.

Another telegram quotes the Giornale de Italia as stating there is no foundation for this report.

Sees British Official

Rome, Saturday, May 3—Premier Orlando conferred at length today with Ellis Jones Griffith, former parliamentary under-secretary to the British home office. The interview is considered in political circles to have been connected with the departure of the Italian delegates from the peace conference. Mr. Griffith is understood to be communicating on the subject with the British delegation at Paris.

It was announced in Paris last week that Premier Lloyd George had sent a representative of his government to Rome to open informal negotiations for the return to Paris of an Italian peace delegation.

Cables Spoils of War

London, May 3—The council of three of the peace conference has settled the question of the disposition of the German cables, according to a Reuter despatch from Paris filed last night. It adopted the view that the cables are spoils of war and belong to the captors by right, the message states.

GIVEN \$25 FOR HER WOUNDED AFFECTIONS

Montreal, May 5.—Twenty-five dollars will be sufficient to indemnify Miss Loretta Gravel for the breach of Captain Joseph Faubert's promise to marry her, according to the opinion of Mr. Justice Weir, as expressed in the judgment he delivered in the Superior Court on Saturday on the merits of Miss Gravel's claim to \$5,000 damages.

The plaintiff is twenty-nine years of age. The defendant, a ship's captain, of Sorel, is seventy-six years old. He fell in love with the young lady, proposed marriage and was accepted.

"After I promised the young lady marriage, her conduct was such that I consider I was quite justified in refusing to marry her," said Faubert.

"Quite right," said Mr. Justice Weir, in effect, in his judgment.

ROUMANIANS ADVANCING

Geneva, May 4—Rumanian forces are advancing along the whole Hungarian front and have recaptured two thousand prisoners, including many Austrian and German soldiers, according to advices received here from Bucharest. One hundred and fifty carloads of war material have also been taken. Col. Kratochwil, is commanding the forces fighting the Hungarian Bolshevik and Magyars it is reported.

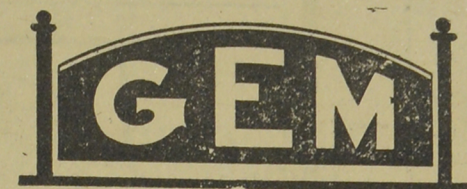
