SIR ROBERT L. BORDEN WELCOMED AT OTTAWA

An Address of Welcome Extended to the Premier—Says the
Hopeful Spirit Which Sustained Canada During the War
Will Not be Found Wanting in Time of Peace—General
Morrison Tells of Good Work of Canadian Troops.

Ottawa, May 26.—Frankly recogniz-
ing that he has returned to Canada
in disturbing times, Sir Robert Borden
replying to the welcome extended to
the Prime Minister and Major General
Morrison, declared himself to be an
optimist and asserted his belief that
Canadians would deal with their prob-
lems of reconstruction as well and
faithfully as they fought the war. The
prime Minister's assertion was receiv-
ed with much applause which was only
equalled in volume when General Mor-
rison in closing his remarks by way of
a final message to the Canadian peo-
ple stated that "during four years of
war the Canadian corps had never re-
treated a step and never lost a single
gun."

No Cause for Alarm

"The hopeful spirit that sustained
Canada during more than four years
of war" Sir Robert said "will not be
found wanting in the even more diffi-
cult days of peace. If that spirit con-
tinues to inspire the people there will
be no cause for the slightest alarm.
Canada stands in a splendid and hope-
ful position to face the world. We hope
great energy and great resources and
ours is a great future if we do not
waste our efforts. I believe that
among people so highly endowed will
be found some better method of solv-
ing our problems than some of these
methods which have occasionally been
in evidence in the past. I am strongly
determined as anyone to do whatever
part I may have in remedying any ex-
isting evils. Let us set an example to
the nations of the world in our meth-
ods. I for one am an optimist. I believe
that the men who during the war so
splendidly did their work will be a
steady and dominating influence for
law and order and that we shall have
in Canada such full co-operation with
out regard to distinctions of class,
race or creed, as will enable Canada
to accomplish that high destiny which
is hers by right of heritage.
