HOW TO BREW TEA.

From an old tea merchant in London comes instructions for making a perfect cup of tea. First rinse out the teapot with cold water and then fill it with boiling water and let stand while you bring the water intended for the tea to a boil. Just before the water boils, turn out the water from the teapot and wipe dry. Then add the tea leaves and pour on the freshly boiling water. Cover the pot with a tea cosy or wrap in a towel and let stand exactly for seven minutes. This will give you a delicious drink of ambrosia that will delight the heart of true lovers of a good cup of tea.

The use of a cosy for the teapot is to hold the heat in the pot and thus prevent quick cooling. Use one level teaspoon of tea to each one-half pint cup of water. Measure the water before boiling. The water must be poured on the tea immediately upon reaching the boiling point. After boiling for two minutes or longer the water quickly loses its natural gases.

THE SANDWICH SEASON.

Cheese Sandwiches.

Place in a bowl one-half cup of grated store cheese and then add one tablespoon of grated onion, two tablespoons of finely minced green pepper, one teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon of paprika, one-half teaspoon of mustard, six tablespoons of mayonnaise dressing. Mix thoroughly and then spread between the bread as prepared for bread-and-butter sandwiches.

Country Cheese Sandwiches.

Place one cup of country or butter-milk cheese in a bowl and add one-half cup of thick mayonnaise dressing, one onion, chopped very fine, one green pepper, chopped very fine, two teaspoons of paprika, one half teaspoon of mustard.

Mix thoroughly and then spread the rye bread with English butter, and then spread the filling between the slices of bread and cut into finger-width strips.

Deviled Egg Sandwiches.

Chop three hard-boiled eggs fine and then place in a bowl and add one tablespoonful of grated onion, three tablespoons of finely minced parsley, three tablespoons of finely minced green pepper, six tablespoons of mayonnaise dressing, two teaspoons of salt, one teaspoon of paprika, one teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce, one-half teaspoon of mustard.

Mix thoroughly and then spread between the bread. Spread with English butter.

A GOOD GINGERBREAD.

Place in bowl one-half cup molasses, one-half cup brown sugar, four tablespoons shortening, one egg, two cups of sifted flour, one-half cup sour milk, one level teaspoon ginger, one-half teaspoon allspice, two teaspoons cinnamon.

Beat to mix, pour in well greased and floured loaf-shape pan and bake thirty minutes in moderate oven.

BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Aunts.—A little quick lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply.

Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again.)
