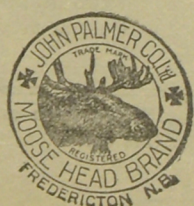
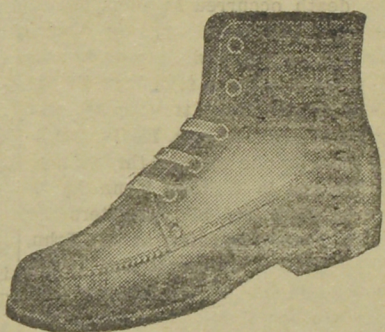

GERMAN GOLD WILL HAVE TO BE GIVEN UP

(New York Herald)

During the war Germany for many good and sufficient reasons, was unable to send large quantities of gold out of the country. On the other hand great stocks of the precious metal were flowing into it through raids made on the government and municipal funds of Belgium, fines and levies imposed in France and Roumania and the enormous indemnities, largely in cash, paid over by Russia after Brest-Litovsk. Then there were the carefully treasured hoards put by against the contingencies of the contemplated war, including the French indemnity of 1871, and, above all, the bank reserves. Some gold certainly went out of Germany to adjacent countries like Switzerland and Holland, but only in comparatively small quantities, for the purchase of articles otherwise unprocurable and for bribes and propaganda. Nevertheless, today Germany has declared through her financial experts, that it will be impossible to continue payments of gold even for fresh consignments of food, and in order to increase her gold reserves it is proposed to issue loans in neutral countries.

It is true that Germany has already been compelled to return to Belgium a large part of the funds filched from the government and municipal treasuries, as well as from the bank vaults in that country, and that some stolen money has also been returned to France. But these restitutions form but a small proportion of the bullion which has gone into Germany since she started the war and of the enormous cash reserves which the banks and other institutions had accumulated. If Germany now professes her inability to pay in cash even for the food which she is begging and threatening, what will she say when called upon to pay the initial instalments of the indemnities demanded of her? It looks as if she were already preparing for repudiation of her liabilities.

In that event there will be nothing for it but to withhold further supplies, occupy Berlin and other cities and parts of the country, and, if necessary, starve Germany into submission. At the same time it will be necessary to

THE WOMAN'S FRANCHISE BILL BEFORE THE HOUSE

Provision for the Preparation of a Special List of Female Voters Has Been Eliminated From the Bill—Lumbermen to be Brought Within the Scope of the Workmen's Compensation Act—The Prohibition Act is Sharply Criticized.

The Legislature met last night at 8.30 o'clock, daylight saving time, and continued in session until after one o'clock this morning. A number of government bills were introduced and on the ground of urgency were read a second time, which means that they will be in shape to be taken up by committee of the whole this afternoon.

A bill to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act was taken up in committee of the whole and discussed at considerable length. Mr. Smith, of Carleton, moved an amendment to the effect that men engaged in logging and steam driving operations should be brought within the scope of the act, but withdrew it on the Premier announcing that an agreement had been reached with the lumbermen and that they would be brought under the act by order-in-council. This announcement, while it satisfied Mr. Smith, failed to satisfy Mr. Tilley, who objected to the withdrawal of the amendment. Finally a motion that the committee rise and report the bill was adopted.

The bill to amend the Prohibition Act precipitated quite a lively discussion. The bill empowers the government to take over the business of the wholesale vendors and to appoint a board to assist in administering the act. Mr. Young thought that the government should go further and take over the retail vendership. He thought that there were too many retail vendors in Fredericton.

The Prohibition Act was rather roughly handled by Dr. Campbell, Mr. Potts and Mr. Sweeney, who denounced it as an un-British measure which attacked the privacy of the home. Progress was reported on the bill.

Assembly Chamber,

The House met at 8.30 o'clock p. m. HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a bill to provide for the funding of certain expenditures in connection with the Jordan Sanatorium and the O'Connor property, Fredericton. On the ground of urgency it was read a second time.

HON. MR. VENIOT introduced a bill to amend an act to provide a fund for the building of permanent highways. He explained that it was proposed to fund the sum of \$450,000 during the present year. On the ground of urgency the bill was read a second time.

HON. MR. ROBERTS introduced a bill to amend the act respecting witnesses and evidence, which on the ground of urgency was read a second time.

HON. MR. ROBERTS introduced a bill to confirm certain measures taken during the influenza epidemic, which on the ground of urgency was read a second time.

HON. MR. ROBERTS introduced a bill to amend the Public Health Act, 1918. He explained that the bill was to deal with several important matters one of which was to reduce and possibly eliminate the epidemic of small-pox. The present law provided that district Boards of Health should be composed of not less than three members and more than five with the district Health Officer chairman ex-officio. Under the amendment it was proposed that the Boards should consist of not more than four nor less than six members. On the ground of urgency the bill was read a second time.

HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a bill to provide for Provincial debentures falling due in 1919. He explained that debentures to the amount of \$2,282,000 would fall due during the present year and authority was asked for power to make a new issue of bonds.

HON. MR. TWEEDDALE introduced a bill to provide for the transfer of certain parts of the Crown Lands to the municipalities to be used for a Municipal Home. He explained that authority was being asked to dispose of from 100 to 500 acres to Municipal-

demand from the government and the financial institutions of the country that they hand over their funds to the representatives of the Entente and to take over and administer the railways, mines and forests of the country.

Germany has taught other countries a few lessons in such matters, and though the Allies would never descend to the abominations and extortions which characterized German rule in invaded territories they could make it extremely unpleasant for recalcitrant institutions and individuals.

Committee before, when it had been proposed that the lists of women voters be not prepared until August. That would practically bring the preparation of the lists under the present Act. If it were the sense of the Committee that such should be done, all Sections dealing with the preparation of lists might be stricken out and by waiting until the regular time for the preparation of voters list much money might be saved.

MR. BAXTER said that he was expressing his personal views on this matter. He could understand the view expressed that the time for such extensive work as the preparation of lists of Female Voters was very short. However, there were two important matters directly concerned by the preparation of these special lists, and they were matters which could not be decided by hon. members on his side of the House. One was dissolution. It hardly could be expected that the government would extend the franchise to women and by bringing on a general election before the next regular voters list was prepared, prevent them from exercising that franchise. By the amendment of the Intoxicating Liquor Act it evidently was intended that a plebiscite was to be held on the question of prohibition. The latter was a subject in which all women were deeply interested. He could take no other ground than the list of female voters must be prepared before one or the other of these matters would come before the people. The government certainly could give a promise concerning the plebiscite matter although it could not be expected to give one concerning the dissolution of the House. If the government could give a promise that an election would not take place before January 1st, he would be willing to consent to a saving by the postponement of the preparation of the lists. If either important matter was to be considered by the electorate, the expense of preparation of these lists would be justified. Until given some assurance he could not state definitely his attitude toward this proposal. He also would call the attention of the Hon. the Attorney General to the fact that at least there should be some correction in form B, by which the Christian names of married women would be required to be placed on the list.

HON. MR. FOSTER said he would give the same assurance to the Hon. member which he had given when the Bill had been introduced, that he was responsible for this provision being placed in the bill on account of possibilities which might arise during the present year. However, when it was pointed out that the preparation of the lists would occupy such a length of time that it would be carried well into the autumn, when the preparation of the ordinary voters list would take place, he rather regarded with favor the proposal to have no special list. The hon. member had made reference to the possibility of a general elec-
