

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

FALL AND WINTER FASHIONS.

They Are Based Largely on Famous
Eighteenth Century Designs—
Materials are Sumptuous.

The main lines of the coming fashions for autumn and winter, writes the Paris correspondent of the London Times, are gradually becoming clear, although they have not yet been shown publicly, and surprises are sure to come. They are based largely on 18th century designs and the sumptuous materials used in those days are again in favor. But there is one great difference between the fashions of the Court at Versailles and those of modern France. The stiffness has gone out of them. Then everything was boned and stiffened to stand alone; now there are few whalebones or wires and no stiffness in silks.

The tight waist has gone, never, we hope, to come back; but its lines will be used. Straight bodices with pointed fronts will be worn, with paniers of every form and shape to accentuate them. The short sleeve of summer is to be the short sleeve of winter, and for those who like it there will be a choice of some sort of sleeve gimp in lingerie, crepe georgette or linen.

As to Skirts.

Skirts will be neither long nor absurdly short. The barrel-shaped skirt will come first, next the lamp-shade design with a tunic over it, then the pleated skirt, which in one form or another is constant. The prevalence of checked materials in woollens makes pockets a popular trimming on tailor-mades. They break the monotony of squares and stripes and give the impression of width without additional volume of material. Then there is the sack-coat, with various forms of adjustments in front. The impression of some of these loose-fitting models is that of a cape-coat; when well worn they are charming, but they need wearing.

The Round Shoulder Cape.

Again the round shoulder cape in fur imitation fur or in cloth trimmed with fur bands, can be worn with any sort of coat, or none. It suits the average "little dress" well and is in many ways useful. It can be kept on when the coat is thrown off; it serves as the first warm wrap in autumn, and it can be made in almost any material, although the richest are in fur, and the next in favor is cloth trimmed with fur. Imitation furs, in which this season now abounds, are used for the same purpose.

USEFUL KNOWLEDGE.

To Restore Suede Shoes.

After getting suede shoes wet so that all the pile has gone, leaving them shiny, they will be as good as new and the pile quite restored by getting an ordinary piece of emery paper and rubbing the shiny parts—not too strenuously. It will be found that the pile comes up again like new after rubbing them with dry cloth the same color as the shoes.

Washing Tapestry Carpets.

If your carpet is tapestry, wash it in this way, while it's on the floor: To one quart of warm water add two tablespoons of ammonia. Take clean scrubbing brush, dip freely in the water and then with soap scrub it. Do not be afraid of using ammonia. It will brighten the colors, especially red and green. Home-made soap may be used with success.

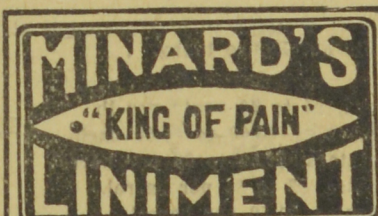

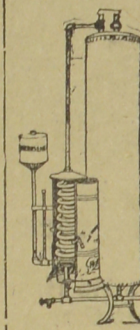
