

## SMALLPOX REPORTED FROM MAPLE GROVE

### TWO CASES AMONG WORKMEN ON N. T. R.

Dr. D. R. Moore of Stanley in Charge—Dr. J. A. Wade, D. M. H. O., Taking Precautions.

Dr. G. C. Melvin, Chief Health Officer for the Province of New Brunswick, announced this morning that two cases of small-pox had been reported from Maple Grove York County on the National Transcontinental Railway, about ten or twelve miles from Stanley.

#### In Charge of Treatment

The Department of Health has placed the treatment of the disease in the hands of Dr. D. R. Moore of Stanley while Dr. J. A. Wade, District Medical Officer has been placed in charge of the quarantine, vaccination and other matters pertaining to the isolation, subjection and abatement of the disease. Every effort possible is being made to see that the disease will be stamped out and not allowed to spread. The various protective measures such as the isolation of the cases, the quarantining of those in contact, and the vaccination of all those liable to catch the disease will be carried out as soon as possible.

#### Broke Out Among Workmen

The cases broke out among a party of workmen engaged on the Moncton Edmundston Branch of the C.N.R. but as the District Medical Health Officer, Dr. J. A. Wade has not yet returned from the locality of the disease no definite particulars have yet been learned.

#### Drunk Paid Fine

One drunk was arrested over night and locked up in a cell. He came before the Police Magistrate this morning and was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail. He paid the fine and was let out.

#### Bigamy Case in Court

The Bigamy charge placed against a returned soldier named William G. Simmons by Mrs. Agnes M. Armstrong whose daughter the soldier had married is being heard in the local police court this afternoon before Police Magistrate Limerick.

#### Held Corn Roast

A party of about thirty or forty young people gathered at the Flats last evening for a corn roast. After they had eaten their fill of corn and other offerings they passed the rest of the evening in games and other amusements, returning to their homes about eleven o'clock.

#### No Marriage Licenses

St. John Times: It was not an easy job to arrange to get married in St. John Monday as is ordinarily the case no matter the willingness of those concerned. The reason was that the supply of marriage license forms had given out and none were obtainable in the city until today when a supply arrived from Fredericton.

The Dominion Convention will meet early in November.

#### Funeral This Afternoon

Moses W. Pond of Marysville passed away yesterday morning at the Victoria Hospital as a result of serious injuries which he received by falling from a load of wood on Friday last. For the past seven years he has been employed at the Marysville Cottons Ltd and resided in Marysville. He was 71 years of age and is survived by his widow, two sons, Willard of Patten, Me., and Bernard of Marysville, and three daughters, Mrs. Bert Manzer of North Devon and the Misses Mattie and Stella at home. The funeral took place at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon, service being held at the late home by Rev. C. G. Pincombe. Interment was made at Durham.

#### Allowed to Go.

Ira Morehouse, charged with forgery by the Bank of Montreal, appeared before Judge Wilson of the York Co. Court this morning. At a previous sitting of the court a plea for leniency had been made on behalf of the prisoner and a week's postponement made. Those who appeared were R. W. McLellan, counsel for the defendant; J. J. F. Winslow, for the bank, and H. G. Fenety for the crown. In view of the plea for leniency His Honor allowed the prisoner to go on recognizance, himself for \$200 and Oscar E. Morehouse and Alex. Brewer for \$100 each. The condition is that the accused must appear before the court at any time when summoned within a period of three years.

## PROFESSOR POPPLESTONE MAY NOT RETURN

### NOW IN TORONTO AT WORK ON FRENCH BOOK

Chancellor Jones Says He Has Not Yet Heard That the Professor is Not to Return.

It is reported that Professor Charles E. Popplestone of the U. N. B. faculty will not return this year as Instructor in the French and German languages. This morning Dr. C. C. Jones Chancellor of the University refused to discuss the probability of the non-return of Professor Popplestone stating that he had not heard yet any word that he would not return.

#### Working on French Book

Professor Popplestone who has for some time been working on a French Book of his own now has it ready for publication and it has been reported that he intends publishing it either in Halifax or Toronto having refused to sell the copyright of it several times. While at the University Professor Popplestone has been one of the most popular members of the faculty with the male students. Being an active member of the faculty he did much to further the work of the College Y. M. C. A. movement among the students. He came to the University in 1916 succeeding Professor Axel J. Uppvall as Professor of modern languages. Educated in England, France and Germany he has travelled extensively and has become well known as a writer and author of numerous articles and stories in magazines in England, the United States and Canada.

As it is rapidly drawing near to the time of the College opening it will be a difficult matter to secure a successor to Professor Popplestone and this will mean instead of three new members of the faculty a total of four new members.

#### Nothing Re Conference

Premier Foster stated at noon today that he had nothing to announce concerning the result of the conference in Montreal yesterday between representatives of the C. N. R. and C. P. R. relative to running rights over the C. P. R. between Westfield and St. John. That matter is entirely in the hands of representatives of the two railways.
