## AROUND THE TOWN

Fredericton is the proud possessor of a city market which is practically unused, that is for what is intended. As a matter of fact it is used as the depository for all the junk belonging to the city which is temporarily or permanently on the shelf. An old fire-engine is there and various apparatus belonging to different civic departments. Other cities have gone to the expense of building and fitting markets while Fredericton will not make use even of what it has. The argument has been advanced that the purchasing public is opposed to ascending and descending the steps at the sides of the market but those who use that argument forget that the rear door is practically level with the market-floor, the difference being made up slightly sloped incline. Less than thirty years ago that market was in full swing with a permanent clerk and tolls. The market clerk in those days prepared an official report on the prices of country produce and the country people did not have the opportunity they have now, of making reporters believe prices are higher than they really are. The evident intention when the City Hall was constructed was to use the entire basement as a market but when the police station and cells were located there much of the space was taken. When the market was in use stalls were occupied by a number of butchers and other business men.

The only group photograph ever taken of the Fredericton police force was made upwards of twenty years ago and still graces the wall of the police guard-room having been given a position of honor over the door of the extra cell in which specially favored prisoners are incarcerated. The picture was taken at a time when the police force was slightly smaller than it is now for there are only four in the group—the late Sergeant Paul Phillips, and Policemen Z. Wright, John O'Neill and George Rideout. With the exception of the late Sgt. Phillips, who died in Fredericton about two years ago, the members of the force of that day are all alive. Mr. Wright resides in the U.S. Mr. O'Neill is farming at Petersville, Queens county, and Mr. Rideout is chief of the Moncton police force a post which he has occupied with distinction for a number of years going direct to that office from the Fredericton force. Mr. Rideout's first appointment to the Fredericton force was as special Scott Act officer, Fredericton then being under the Canada Temperance Act, usually called the Scott Act from its creator, and more or less "dry" on account of that act.

Although the population of this city has increased to some extent since

those days—possibly fifty percent—the increase in the police force has not kept pace. Several years ago there were six "cops" of all ranks but now there are but five. This is evidence that Fredericton is a noticeably law-abiding community.

While Chief Rideout was a patrolman on the Fredericton force he was one of the chief actors in a number of incidents to which he probably can look back with a certain degree of amusement although at the time they happened the humorous features were not always apparent. One of the most interesting from the viewpoint of the public was his arrest of an ex-Alderman in front of a drug-store still in existence although under a different management. The ex-aldorman objected to arrest and as a party of friends was about the incident became widely known. The prisoner in due time appeared in the police court and was convicted by the late Police Magistrate Marsh then presiding over the court. Everything looked like a vindication of the guardian of the law until the ex-aldorman appealed the case. The higher court took a different view of the matter and decided in favor of the appellant with the result that he considered himself the winner and the city had to foot a bill of costs.

One noticeable feature of currency in this section of the province is the absence of United States silver dollars which a few years ago were referred to as "bung downs" or "cart wheels". About twenty years ago silver of this class was discounted with some stores refusing to accept it and others accepting it for advertising purposes. In Halifax and other sections of Nova Scotia merchants then refused to take American silver at all. Where United States silver goes is a question. The fact that the exchange situation now favors the United States does not concern this matter for coins are not affected.

Travel between Canada and the United States is not as easy as it was a few years ago with immigration regulations made more strict as result of the war and head-tax being imposed. During the past few weeks a number of young men who have attempted to reach Boston via McAdam have been turned down. Attempts to get into the Aroostook country to aid in the harvest have been more successful. The exaction of a head-tax at the border by American authorities has worked considerable hardship on travellers. Canadian citizens on their return to Canada can get a refund but there have been instances of American citizens unable to prove their citizenship, being forced to pay the tax. Possibly after much red-tape they also could secure a refund.

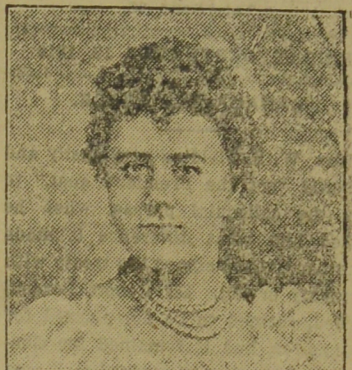

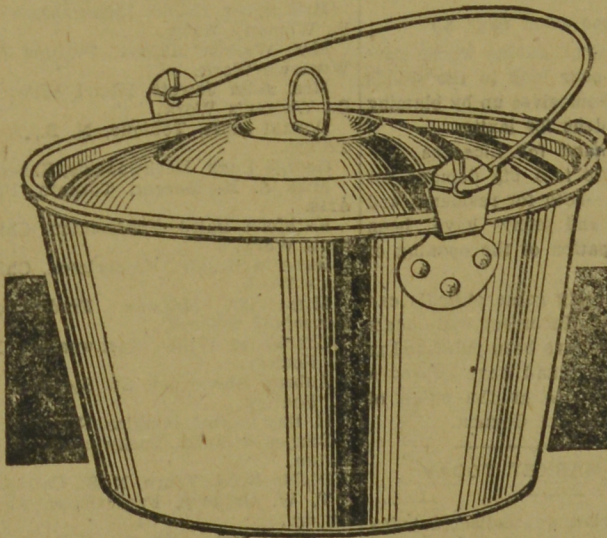
