CANADA AND PEACE.

Hon. W. S. Fielding very easily and adroitly "got the Premier's goat," to use the colloquial phrase, when he asked him what difference it made whether Canada signed the treaty with Germany or not. Sir Robert Borden, indeed, seemed to be non-plussed for an answer, and it remained for General Sam Hughes to reply that it was to give moral encouragement to the British government and as a sign to the world that the Mother Country and the overseas dominions are hanging together, first, last and always.

The Premier seemed to jump with delight at Sir Sam's plausible explanation, but it won't do.

The Halifax Recorder, in discussing the incident, offers this timely comment: "Did Canada have to call a special session for the purpose of formally declaring war on Germany in consonance with the action of Britain? Rather did not Canada accept the fact that she was at war when war had been declared by the Imperial authorities? As a matter of fact, we waited for no preliminaries, but immediately started to raise an expeditionary force swiftly as possible, and none knew this better than General Sam. In fact, if we remember correctly, both Sir Robert and Sir Sam fell violently afoul of Sir Wilfrid Laurier for merely suggesting that it might be wise to call Parliament together before despatching an expedition to South Africa. Then as far as the Imperial consolidation is concerned, has not the war itself and the part therein taken by Canada, given to the world the greatest possible proof that the Empire is one in heart and soul and in arms? Surely, then, it is a work of supererogation in this regard to go to the trouble and expense of calling Parliament together to pass the peace treaty. When Britain formally ratified the agreement, what more was there to do, unless Canada intended—foolish thought—to carry on the contest alone for a time?"

THE EXHIBITION

Unless all signs fail, the Fredericton Exhibition, which will open its doors to the public this evening, is going to be the most successful from every viewpoint ever held in this province. Indications point to a splendid show and an attendance which is easily going to smash all records. Mr. W. S. Hooper, the energetic manager and the directors of the Agricultural Society, have been working hard to make the exhibition "the biggest and best" this old city of successful fairs has ever known, and they look forward with every confidence to the result. Of course, while they have made every preparation for a great show, they cannot control the elements, but if the weather man is at all considerate next week will be the greatest that Fredericton has ever known.

They will come from all points of the compass, by train, by automobile, by horse and carriage and on foot, and it is up to the citizens, and in the interests of future exhibitions to see to it that they are well treated. All should do their part to see that the visitors get a square deal, and that they return home thoroughly imbued with the idea that Fredericton is all she pretends to be, and more too.

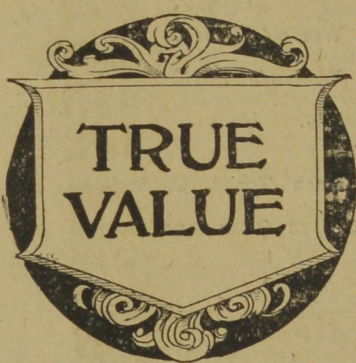
