WOODSTOCK PULLED OFF SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITION

Directors of the Agricultural Society Tackled a Big Proposition and Carried it Through—Many Difficulties Had to be Overcome—The Buildings and Grounds the Finest in Eastern Canada—More Co-operation Needed.

Woodstock, Spt. 12—"Well done, Woodstock, the people of the old town have at last woken up." "What an ideal spot for an exhibition." These and similar expressions have been constantly heard by the thousands of visitors who attended the St. John Valley Exhibition at Connell Park this week. The people of Woodstock have certainly got a move on and have demonstrated to all the world that the picturesque old town and the fine agricultural county of which it is the seat are in future going to occupy their proper place on the map. The people of Woodstock and of Carleton County take their politics seriously—too seriously perhaps for their own good—but when it comes to taking hold of a business proposition such as an exhibition they seem to know how to work and pull together for the common good. Successful exhibitions have been held in Woodstock in days gone by but the St. John Valley show of this week was the first real attempt at something provincial in character and it has been successful beyond the most sanguine expectations. They have certainly done well, but with the experience gained and the fine community spirit in evidence everywhere in Woodstock they will do better in the future, and Fredericton will then have to look to its laurels as the banner exhibition town of Eastern Canada.

Almost a Miracle

The exhibition was held in Connell Park, a beautiful natural park situated on the St. John River opposite the lower end of the town and formerly known as Bull's Island. It used to be noted for its bountiful hay crops, but a few years ago it was purchased for the Connell estate and donated to the town as a public park. It was nothing but a public park on May 15th of the present year; it is still a public park but it is also the site of the most modern and complete exhibition plant in Eastern Canada. To bring about the transformation involved an enormous amount of labor on the part of the active spirits who compose the directorate of the agricultural society. In these days of high prices and labor shortage it was a huge task, but determined men took hold of it and

put it through. The fine plant which the society owns represents an outlay of \$53,000 and those who have had any thing to do with public enterprises of this kind will scarcely need to be told that some financing had to be done. The Provincial Government was approached for a grant and being duly impressed with the earnestness of the promoters, came across with the sum of \$10,000. The County Council of Carleton gave \$5,000, and last but not least twenty public spirited citizens of Woodstock dug down into their jeans to the tune of \$1000 each. This ensured the financial success of the undertaking and the building operations have gone on with a rush. A beautiful oval shaped race track was constructed on the lower end of the island with a grand stand near by which has accommodation for 2000 people. The space beneath the grandstand has been utilized for a dining hall. The space along the fence adjoining the exhibition grounds has been reserved for spectators and there is room for several thousands of them. Near by a large space has been reserved for autos and there is ample accommodation for a thousand or more of them.

Substantial Buildings

The main building which occupies a site near the centre of the grounds is of superb design and reflects great credit upon the architect and builders. It is 280 feet long and 80 feet wide and makes a very imposing appearance. This huge building as well as the buildings erected for horses, cattle, sheep, swine and poultry, rest on concrete foundations which ensure their permanency.

Like London Bobbies

Entrance to the grounds is made by way of the highway bridge. A large wooden approach connects the bridge with the island and although it is a little steep for horse drawn vehicles autos make the ascent without the slightest difficulty. At times during the week the traffic on the bridge was enormous, but a corps of special policemen handled it in a manner which would have done credit to a London "bobby."

Got Many Bouquets

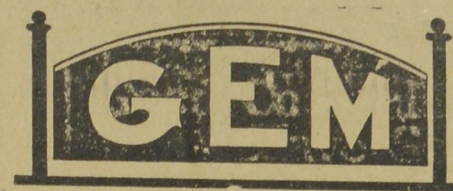
The directors of the agricultural society were much in evidence about the exhibition grounds during the week and were no ways slow in extending the glad hand to strangers. They were showered with compliments on their success as builders, and all they would say in reply was: "We have only made a start, wait until you see us next year." Such a fine spirit of optimism on the part of the directorate augurs well for the future.

Farmers Must Cooperate

While the exhibition has been a success in every way a more energetic cooperation on the part of the farmers of Carleton County would have made it even more successful. One could scarcely fail to notice this lack of cooperation on going over the various exhibits. It is a pretty well known fact that the farmers of Carleton as producers of live stock and agricultural products can give cards and spades to those of any other county in the maritime provinces and then some. They should wake up to the fact that they have not much to fear from competition and should not hesitate to display their products. In other words they have the goods and should make the fact known to all comers. The business men of Woodstock have done their part nobly and it is now up to the farmers to do their bit. A live manager for the exhibition and a well directed campaign of education will bring the farmers into line.

While the directors of the agricultural society have worked like trojans to make the exhibition a success they were rather unfortunate in not being able in the short time at their disposal to procure the services of an experienced and capable manager. To manage a successful exhibition is no child's play. A live man of tact and ability, one who has some knowledge of the art of publicity is needed for this kind of work. The directors have in the brief time at their disposal not been able to pick up such a man but they are living in hopes that better luck will attend their efforts in another year.
