Selick claimed to have been the first man in the world to have bred moose in captivity. Some twenty-five or thirty years ago he was a prominent figure at exhibitions and similar events where his manageries similar events where his menagerie consisting of moose, bear and other wild animals caught in New Brunswick forests, was shown. He was a daring and resourceful hunter, many times going into the woods remaining several weeks subsisting on game always, returning to civilization safely, despite many thrilling experiences. On one occasion he brought a bull moose out of the woods alive. Mr. Selick was 90 years of age at the time of his death.
