## FITZRANDOLPH DIVORCE CASE AGAIN BEFORE COURT; MOTIONS FOR ALIMONY AND PAYMENT OF BILLS

Further Argument on Thursday—Judge Crocket Decides the  
Accounts Must be Submitted Before Payment Can be Ordered—Court Refuses to Dismiss Libel—Grounds for New  
Trial Must be Stated Before October 10th—Divorce Ordered in Holmes Case, but Guilt on Part of Rev. S. W. Stackhouse Not Found.

Before His Honor Judge Crocket this morning the motions in the case of Charles FitzRandolph vs. Elizabeth FitzRandolph, were heard. Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C. for Dr. J. B. M. Baxter K. C. made two motions on behalf of the defendant. His first motion was that libel be dismissed with costs. This was opposed by Mr. M. G. Teed K. C. on behalf of the plaintiff who read his own affidavit setting forth that he had not yet had an opportunity to fully consider the question of a new trial of this case which a jury decided in favor of the defence. Mr. Teed stated further that Gregory & Winslow of Fredericton which firm had appeared on behalf of the plaintiff heretofore had withdrawn entirely from the action and he would act alone. This was a further reason why he felt he must oppose the motion. If the libel were dismissed, it would be impossible for him to move for a new trial.

The court refused to dismiss the libel and made an order that Mr. Teed file by October 10th, the grounds on which a motion for a new trial would be based.

### Second Motion

The second motion of Mr. Hanson was that alimony be granted the defendant and also for an order that the plaintiff pay to the defendant some \$900 for debts contracted by the defendant since February 1918, the defendant not having received any money from him since that time. The grounds for alimony advanced were that the defendant possesses a dwelling valued at least at \$5,000 and himself stated on the witness stand that his annual income was \$4,000. An affidavit of the defendant accompanied the motion.

Mr. Teed opposed the motion for an order to pay \$900 on the ground that no bills or statements of the accounts had been submitted, and he would require time to look into the matter.

As far as the annual income of the plaintiff was concerned it had been stated on the stand that it was about \$4,000 per year but he had reason to believe that it was not as great as that at the present time. It would be necessary for him to get in touch with his client with regard to that matter.

The court decided that the contentions of counsel were reasonable and stated that an order for payment

certainly would not issue without accounts being submitted to the court. Further hearing on these points was set for chambers at Fredericton, Thursday August 14th.

### Divorce in Holmes Case

In the case of Ralph Sherman Holmes vs. May Jacobina Holmes, a Doaktown action in which Rev. Sterling W. Stackhouse, a Baptist clergyman formerly stationed at Doaktown, was named as co-respondent, a decree of divorce was ordered to issue. Court stated that the ground for issue of decree was that the defendant had given birth to an illegitimate child during the absence of her husband overseas. Court, however, would not find that she had been guilty of adultery with Rev. Sterling W. Stackhouse although one witness Margaret Brown had given positive evidence, Court did not wish to reflect upon the witness but considered the occurrence highly improbable.

### Divorce in Mason Case

In the case of Frank Hilyard Mason vs. Margaret Otty Mason, a decree of divorce was ordered to issue. Court held that adultery had been proven.

### No Divorce in Purdy Case

In the case of Matilda Jane Purdy vs. John Jones Purdy, an action for divorce "a mensa et thoro" on grounds of cruelty, court refused to grant divorce.

### Wilson Case Stands

The case of Lena Wilson vs. Thomas Wilson, an action for divorce on statutory grounds, was allowed to stand to permit the plaintiff to produce additional evidence. Court adjourned sine die.
