TRYING TO CREATE SPLIT IN RANKS OF THE G.W.V.A.

Meeting at Winnipeg Called to Hear Report of the
Vancouver Delegates was Suddenly Termin-
ated—The President Left the Chair and the
Secretary Followed Him Out—An Unruly
Element was Present.

Winnipeg, Man., July 25—Believing
that an attempt was being made by
the radical element to create a split
in the ranks of the Winnipeg Great
War Veterans' Association, President
R. B. Maxwell, adjourned the special
meeting called for last night to hear
the report of the delegates who at-
tended the Dominion Convention at
Vancouver, twenty minutes after the
proceedings had been in progress.

It soon became evident that there
was a complete absence on the part
of a considerable section of any de-
sire to conduct business in the in-
terests of the Association as a whole. As
it was plain that the ex-soldiers and
sailors political labor league was
strongly represented and anxious to
make use of the opportunity to create
a split in the ranks of the Great War
Veterans' Association the chairman
after trying in vain to continue the
special business for which the meet-
ing was called, first threatened to ad-
journ, and this threat not proving ef-
fective, he finally did so. Then, accom-
panied by various members of the ex-
ecutive, he left the hall. The secretary
with his minutes, etc., left shortly af-
terwards.

Is Unconstitutional

On being interviewed as to why he
took the course he did at the meeting
President Maxwell said that when he
saw in the minutes of the meeting
which had been subsequently repudi-
ated by means of a referendum, a re-
solution practically placing the As-
sociation in the hands of one section
only, namely, those on strike, he
would not allow them to be voted on,
as, in his opinion, it was entirely un-
constitutional, and a deliberate at-
tempt to split the association by men
whom he believed to be members of
the ex-soldiers' and sailors' political
labor league.

Immediately after this it became ev-
ident that an unruly element was bent
on enforcing its own views quite re-
gardless of the good of the Associa-
tion. Consequently he believed the only
course was to adjourn.

Anything that may have taken place
subsequently to his vacating the chair
Mr. Maxwell later declared to be en-
tirely unofficial and not binding on
the Association in any shape or form.

The matter is to be reported to the
Dominion Executive for a ruling.

til Then.

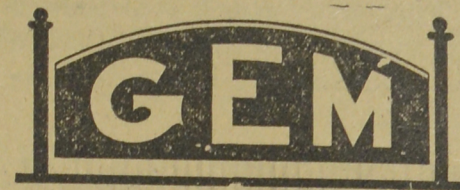
The N. B. Military Hospital base-

ior League by a score of 6 to 3. The
game lasted nine innings and was well
played on both sides. The Hospital
boys showed great improvement since
their last game, with the Saint John
"Beavers" having several additions to
their lineup. The Pets also showed
signs of improvement.

Up to the end of eight innings the
game was a tight one and at that
point should have been called by the
umpires on account of darkness; the
score then stood 2 to 2. During the
first part of the ninth inning the Mil-
itary Hospital got four runs by hard
hitting coupled with darkness. The
Pets in their half of the inning secured
only one run on a three-base hit
by Wheeler which was stretched into
a home run by an overthrow to third
base. The batteries were Hospital,
Paynter and Donovan; Pets Wheeler
and Hall. Wheeler had twelve "strike
outs" to his credit and allowed the
only base on balls to Hall of the Pets
in the last half of the eighth inning.
Paynter for the Hospital had ten
"strike outs" to his credit. There were
in all for the Military Hospital some
seven hits while the Pets also had sev-
en. Wheeler and Lifford for the Pets
both had three-base hits to their
credit. There was much indignation
expressed by spectators that such a
good baseball game was spoiled by
being continued after it had become
too dark to see the ball.
