

# Exhibition Presents Great Variety to Those Attending

**Livestock is Good With Swine and Sheep Away Above Average—Industrial and Commercial Section in Main Building Very Attractive—Midway will be Running Full Blast Fruit Exhibit.**

The Fredericton Exhibition of 1919 had its first day yesterday and drew a large attendance in spite of the handicap of absence of several of the outside and Midway attractions because of non-arrival by rail. The other parts of the Exhibition more than made up for the absence of the outside attractions and what concessions which had been taken and were in operation did good business.

With the arrival of other "Pike" shows today the Midway will take on its accustomed appearance.

In the Main Building, the various exhibitors made a great change in the appearance of the interior over the week-end and showed that the industrial and commercial exhibitors were ready and able to back up the exhibition in every way. The decorations of all the booths are striking and effective, all blending to make a harmonious whole.

## The Layout of the Grounds.

In general the layout of the grounds is the same as it has been for previous fairs. Midway attractions are located on both sides of the main building. The site of the old Transportation building, which was partially destroyed by fire while being used for military purposes during the war, has been entirely cleared and will be used for "pike" concessions. The new Transportation Building occupies ground formerly used for stock pens the latter being placed farther to the rear of the grounds. Cattle sheds as usual are located all around the grounds.

## Among the Livestock

The exhibit of sheep and swine is considered to be the best ever shown in Fredericton and the cattle and horses also are good. A new feature in the cattle exhibit is the herd of Brown Swiss shown by W. A. Jolley of West Shefford Dairy Farm, Waterloo, Que. Fowler Bros. of Welsford are heavy exhibitors of swine with Yorkshires predominating. Among the exhibitors of sheep are Boswell Bros. of Prince Edward Island showing Dorsets, Shropshires, Cheviots and Lincolns. The herd of John King & Sons of Sussex consisting of Cheviots and Shropshires also is here. This was a very heavy prize winner at St. Stephen. Shropshires and Dorsets from the well known stock farm of R. A. Snowball of Chatham also are being shown and the same farm is showing horses and cattle. Ontario, Quebec and all the Maritime Provinces are represented.

## Some of the Exhibits

The main building is being used for the Industrial and Commercial exhibits. The Apiary and Horticultural Departments as well as the Dominion Experimental Farm exhibit and the exhibit of the Dominion Department of Agriculture are situated at the southern end of the main building. The splendid exhibit of apples in the adjoining part of the building representing the service badge of the returned soldier is causing favorable comment from all who have viewed it.

The various booths devoted to industrial and commercial enterprise are well arranged and tastefully decorated. As all booths represent different lines of business it would be hard to select the best ones. R. Chestnut & Son's central booth is a good one with its lines of sporting, hunting and athletic supplies including canoes, guns, tent, traps etc. Other booths along the main floor offer much to the public and a succession of new lines of business are represented as one passes from one booth to another.

## Soldiers' Work

The Women's Institute exhibit and that of the Department of Soldiers' Re-establishment which consists of exhibits in gardening, Orthopedic work, vocational, cabinet-making, commercial and civil service.

Lumber scaling and shoe repairing are considered two of the finest exhibits in the building. The products of the work of the soldiers is rapidly being sold and yesterday during the day some \$40 was obtained by the Ward Aids in charge, Misses Poole and Taylor. Other branches of the work under the Occupational Therapy are bead-work, basket-making, embroidery, book-binding, carving, raffia work and wood-work. There is also a children's exhibit of towelling, embroidery, crocheting and boys' work in manual training.

As one ascends the stairs he will observe the water colors, enlarged photos, pencil drawings, carbon drawings both original and copied and oil paintings which are in a very prominent place.

## Other Departments

The livestock and poultry exhibits are looming large and drawing enthusiastic remarks over the splendid animals and birds on exhibition. The old poultry house is being used for the agricultural exhibits and some splendid articles of produce are being

shown. Cars, motor trucks and engines of various kinds are occupying the lower floor of the new concrete Transportation Building while the poultry have the main space on the second floor. All birds exhibited are in fine condition and speak well for the poultry raising industry which is coming forward more and more every year. One of the best exhibits on the grounds is that of the Department of Lands and Mines on the second floor of the new building. This is the first of its kind and can easily boast of being among the best exhibits on the grounds. The Livestock Division, Federal Department of Agriculture, has an interesting wool exhibit on the same floor and both the Dominion and New Brunswick Poultry Departments are showing exhibits in the same part of the building.

## RANDOM REMINDERS.

Old flannel of all kinds should be kept for the scrubbing and cleaning of paint. Next to flannel comes coarse soft linen, old kitchen towels, crash, etc.

Two teaspoons of ammonia to one gallon of soft water will clean hard, oil-polished floors. Wipe dry and polish with a mixture of two parts of linseed oil and three parts of gasoline or vinegar.

Large lumps of unslacked lime placed in dark or damp corners in the cellar will absorb the moisture and purify the air.

Paint can easily be removed from glass by wetting a copper or silver coin with turpentine and rubbing the paint spots with it.

Lamp chimneys need not be washed. Hold them over the steam of a boiling kettle, then polish them with a wad of newspaper, finally rubbing them perfectly dry with a soft rag.

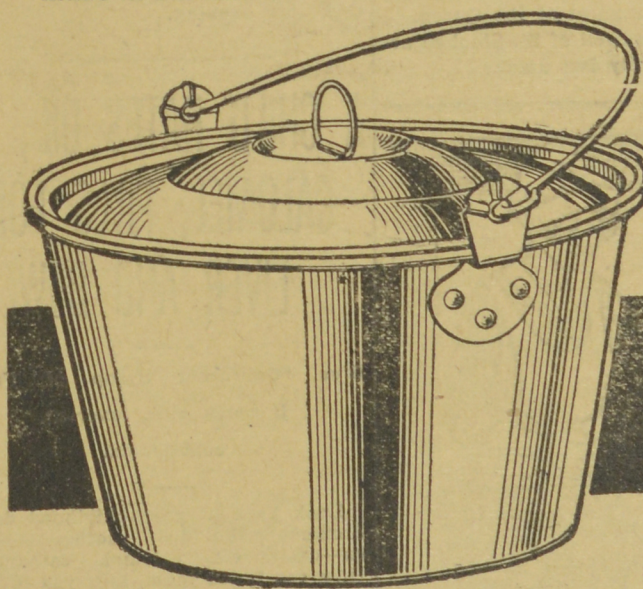
