## INQUEST HELD IN KENT COUNTY SHOOTING CASE

Sister of Nowlan, Who Did the Shooting, was Called Upon to Testify—Evidence of Dr. Delaney, Who Conducted a Post Mortem Examination of Richards' Body.

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 27.—The inquest into the death of Joseph Richard Dominion Military Policeman, who was killed on Friday morning last while endeavoring to arrest Albert Nowlan about seven miles from Buctouche, was resumed this morning in the St. Jean Baptist Hall, Buctouche. The first witness was Mrs. Phileas Beliveau who lives at Roy post office. She swore that she heard no shots on the day in question.

Miss Evangeline Nowlan, sister of Albert Nowlan, was called. She stated that she saw on the day of the tragedy a third man in her father's field. He was dressed in a sweater or shirt and a whitish cap. Two officers were in the house on the ground floor. She said she heard the noise of the fire arms used by the man in the field. He

was running, and the other man was walking. It was in broad daylight but she did not know who he was, nor could she describe him.

Dr. Marc Delaney was next called. He held the autopsy and gave a list of the articles found on the person of Joseph Richard. He stated that on viewing the body he found two large wounds as big as twenty-five cent pieces about one inch apart, on the right leg. There were none below the knee. He examined the two wounds with his fingers and located a piece of lead about the size of the head of a pin. He found the main femoral vein and main artery punctured.

One of the pieces of lead appeared to be of light thin copper, something in the appearance of part of a cartridge, and a number of smaller leaden pieces. None had gone through the body. They were only skin deep outside the two large wounds. In some of the holes of little wounds nothing could be found. He made an incision from the chest, examined the intestines and stomach and found them intact but no blood in them. The two large wounds went as far as the bone. Some of the small pieces which he found in the fifty-two wounds were in the surface above described, the most in the small wounds, though some in the large ones. The apparent copper ones were in the large wounds. The larger ones were the deeper. Death was due to loss of blood, occasioned by the puncture of the femoral artery or vein. The wounds appeared to go into the body at almost right angles.

Here Jurymen Jalliet interrogated the witness as to whether or not he had attended the wife of Albert Nowlan; and whether she had not been made hysterical and to suffer in other ways by the action of the military police in handling the premises. The doctor said he had been called in consultation and found her in a nervous state and afterwards the child of about five months had been born. All this was strenuously objected to by I. W. Hewson, K. C., on the ground of its being entirely irrelevant to the inquiry and beyond the scope of the coroner. The questions were allowed and answered as above.

The doctor gave evidence that he had asked one of the police (Richard) to desist along in the winter as a favor to him. The deceased answered he had to do his duty, that he was called and he had to go. This occurred last winter.

When the inquest was resumed this afternoon, William Nowlan, father of Albert Nowlan, gave evidence. He said there had been no rifle in the house since March. He told about the officers coming to his place in the morning, and about his finding them in the barn and he thought he heard shots.

Octave Joseph Richard also gave evidence.

At the Tuesday evening session, Mrs. Nowlan mother of Albert Nowlan, testified and an interpreter was sworn in, and Mrs. Nowlan stated that she did not know where her son was the day of the tragedy and did not know where he was for two days prior to that.

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It was declared that Quen had asked a Madame Van Damme to aid two young persons to escape, and that these two were directed to the Frontier by Madame Van Damme who sent another lady with them as a guide. The three were arrested and Madame Van Damme was also thrown into jail by the Germans. At their trials all four were condemned.

## SOUTH AFRICA'S PREMIER DEAD

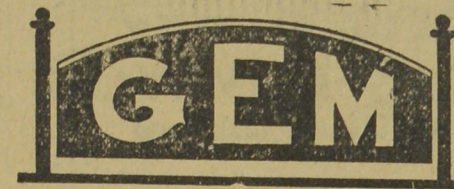

## TORONTO JEWELLER SUICIDES.

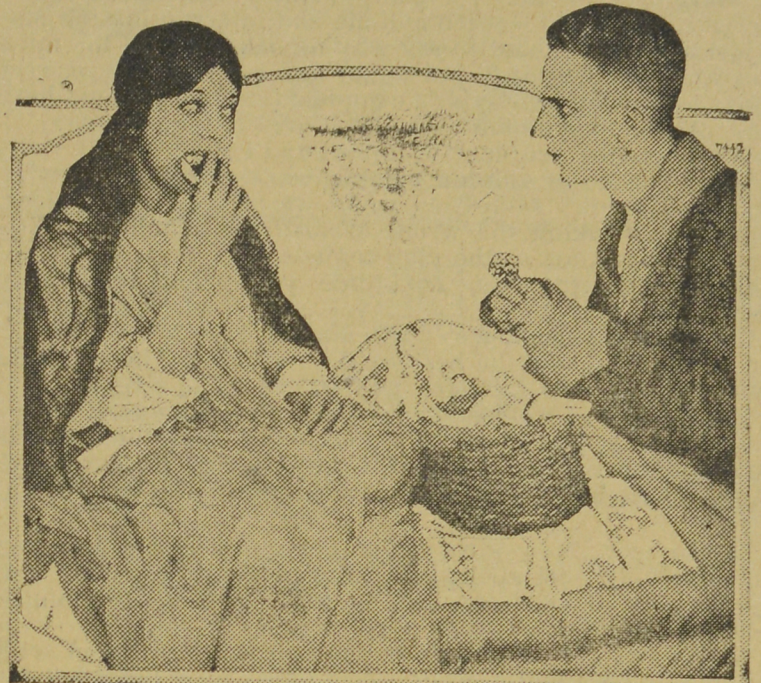
Toronto, Aug. 28.—George S. Conover, a jeweler, shot and killed himself in the basement of his store last night. He had been ill for some time.
