ALLIANCE WANTS REFERENDUM AT AN EARLY DATE, ALSO PROVINCIAL REGULATION OF SALE OF EXTRACTS

Meeting Closed Yesterday Afternoon—Same Officers Re-elected — Sub-Committee Thanked for Its Efficient Labors — Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, and Chief Inspector Wilson Both Endorsed—Police in Rural Sections Suggested.

The final session of the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance was held Tuesday afternoon. It opened with the reading of the report of the resolutions committee by Rev. H. C. Archer. The majority of the resolutions brought out much intensified discussion by the members. The same officers as held office this year were reappointed as follows:

President, Donald Fraser, Plaster Rock.
Vice President, Rev. Thomas Marshall, Fairville.
Secretary, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, St. John.
Treasurer, W. G. Clark, Fredericton.

The following additional members of the Executive were appointed, Rev. Mr. McLean, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, Rev. A. D. McLeod, Rev. Archie McLeod, Rev. G. C. Warren, Rev. Z. L. Fash and Rev. L. E. Ackland.

The following resolutions were then introduced:

On Secretary's Absence

We wish to express our regret at the enforced absence of the Secretary, Rev. C. Flemmington, and under the sorrowful circumstances of his wife's serious illness, we send him our united and sincere sympathy, with the prayer that Our Father God may graciously bless the sick and support the anxious members of the home.

We desire also to express to Rev. Mr. Flemmington the appreciation of the Alliance for his long term as Secretary and for the splendid work done by him, while attending to his duties as secretary.

Provincial Referendum

Whereas the Dominion Government having made it possible for the Provinces of Canada to decide by referendum whether the manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquors shall cease in such Provinces.

Therefore resolved that this Convention take steps to ask the Provincial Legislature at its next session to request the Dominion Government to hold such referendum.

Dominion Prohibition

Resolved that we record our sense of deepest gratitude to Almighty God, the Giver of all good, for the progress made in this Province and in the Dominion against the traffic in strong drink and that we hereby call upon the good citizens of New Brunswick to support this progress to the utmost in the face of insidious propaganda continually carried on by the liquor interests.

Further resolved that in view of the recorded wishes of the people of this Dominion as expressed in the several provinces by direct vote and by the action of their legislatures and in view of the nation-wide prohibition, prevailing in the great republic adjoining us, this Alliance considers the only logical action of the Dominion Parliament to be the immediate enactment of an act prohibiting the manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquors in Canada for beverage purposes.

Sale of Extracts

That we believe it would be in the best interests of the Province if the Government were to put in force stringent regulations against the use of extracts, essences and tinctures, as beverages and we request the executive to place this fact before the government.

Use of Church

"Resolved that the thanks of the Alliance be extended to the trustees of this church for the use of this room for the meetings of the convention.

Treasurer's Report

After the discussion on the resolutions ceased and they had been passed the Treasurer's report was called for and delivered by Mr. W. G. Clark. This showed the standing of the Alliance to be very good with a balance on hand of \$463.52. The accounts were audited by Mr. J. M. Lemont. This report was unanimously accepted.

The Sub-Committee

Rev. G. M. Young next too the floor and stated the indebtedness of the Alliance to the sub-committee of the same, viz, Rev. W. D. Wilson, Rev. Thomas Marshall, W. G. Clark and Donald Fraser, further moving that a motion be put to the meeting for its approval of the splendid work done by these gentlemen. The motion was placed before the meeting, seconded by H. A. Goodwin, St. John and carried unanimously.

These gentlemen gave their deep thanks for the appreciation of their work and stated that more time would be put on it in the future as a hard year was before the Association.

County Organization

Organization in the various counties was referred to by several of those present and the state of affairs in their various counties. All had splendid reports to make concerning the work and appeared very enthusiastic over it.

Police in Rural Sections

Conditions in the various counties were referred to by the President, the Chief Inspector and others. The necessity of sufficient police protection to protect the people from horrible crimes was dwelt on and instances of such crimes were given where the criminals were never apprehended or prosecuted.

Provincial Act Endorsed

The following resolution was then introduced by Dr. W. C. Kierstead:

Resolved that after more than two and one half years under the New Brunswick Prohibition Law this alliance expresses unanimous judgment that Prohibition is the only effective and satisfactory method of dealing with the liquor traffic.

That the results achieved under this law have been far more satisfactory than the most sanguine among us expected.

That the successful operation has been due in large measure to the ability and integrity of the Chief Inspector and to the able support and advice he has received from the officers of this organization;

That we hereby express to him and to our executive officers that in the representations to and dealings with the government they carry with them the full confidence and support of the Alliance.

This resolution was seconded and after some discussion passed.

The meeting then closed.

Death in Maugerville

The death of Mrs. W. H. Webber occurred last night at the home of her niece Mrs. John Kileen, Maugerville, after a lingering illness. The deceased was aged sixty-two years. She is survived by her husband Mr. W. H. Webber, four brothers Neill and Michael Sharkey of Montana and George and Nicholas Sharkey of Woodstock, also one sister Mrs. O'Brien of Oldtown, Me. The funeral will take place Friday morning with service at ten o'clock at St. Anthony's Church, Devon, and interment at the Hermitage.



Notice To Returned Soldiers

By Order-in-Council dated October 16, 1919, no ex-members of the Canadian Naval or Military Forces shall be entitled to the benefits of re-training under the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, unless application for courses of re-training is made within three months from the first day of November, 1919, provided that where the date of retirement or discharge of any ex-member of the Canadian Naval or Military Forces is subsequent to the 1st of November, 1919, provided also that where an ex-member of the Forces has been transferred or passed directly from the Department of Militia and Defence or the Department of the Naval Service to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment for a continuation of treatment, such ex-members of the Forces shall be allowed three months from the date of retirement or discharge or from the completion of such treatment in which to make application for the benefits of such re-training.

Applications for re-training of soldiers eligible in New Brunswick should be addressed to "District Vocational Officer, D. S. C. R.," at one of the following addresses, whichever is nearest to home of applicant: Fredericton Hospital, Fredericton, N.
