P. E. I. TORY GOVERNMENT BOOTED OUT OF OFFICE

Liberals Won a Sweeping Victory in Yesterday's
Provincial Elections — Captured Twenty-Six
Seats Out of a Total of Thirty — One of the
Most One-sided Contests the Tight Little Is-
land Has Seen Since Confederation.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 24—The
Liberals swept the province in the
general elections today, capturing twenty-
six seats out of thirty. The only
Conservative survivors of the debacle
were Hon. A. E. Arsenault, premier,
Hon. James A. McNeill, commissioner
of public works, and Hon. Murdock
Kennedy, without portfolio, and J. D.
Stewart. Hon. Mr. McKinnon, minister
of agriculture was one of the slain.

This was the most one-sided elec-
tion since Confederation with the ex-
ception of 1911 when the Liberals won
only two seats. When the house dis-
solved the parties stood: Conservatives
eighteen; Liberals eleven, and one
seat vacant.

Such a sweeping victory was unex-
pected by both sides, although the
result of the federal elections when
four Liberals got a majority of the
home vote afterwards changed by the
soldiers vote foreshadowed a Conser-
vative defeat today.

Returned soldiers did not take an
active part in the contest, but it is
evident that the majority voted Liber-
al. Fine weather brought out a very
large vote. There was a big turnover
in Charlottetown, Liberals capturing
both seats by large majorities, the
labor men going with the opposition.

Dissatisfaction with administration
of the public works department es-
pecially neglect of roads, with admin-
istration of agricultural department
and with the proposal of the govern-
ment to levy additional taxation told
against the Conservatives.

The people also looked with dis-
favor upon the highway bill, fearing
that payment of the sixty per cent
asked for by the federal government
to secure part of the federal loan would
be too heavy a burden.

The Conservatives came into power
in P. E. Island in December, 1911,
under the leadership of Hon. J. A.
Metheson. When the latter became

chief justice in June, 1917, he was suc-
ceeded by Hon. Mr. Arsenault.

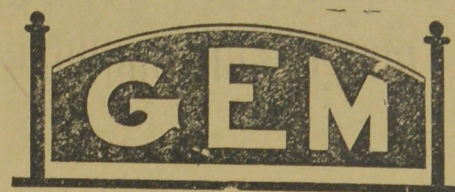
