

## FOREST FIRE REPORTED AT BIG MAGAGUADAVIC

OFFICIALS WENT TO THE  
SCENE THIS MORNING

Offender in the Kedgwick Fire  
Made Voluntary Acknowledgement—Illegal  
Hunting.

Another forest fire was reported to the Department of Lands and Mines late last night its location being near Big Magaguadavic Lake, York County. It is supposed that the fire is on the lands of the Fraser Companies Limited as there is very little Crown Land in that district and that firm holds large areas near that lake.

Assistant Chief Scaler George W. Burden and Ranger C. V. Pickard left early this morning for the scene of the fire. Up to nearly hour this afternoon there had been no report from the fire.

Voluntarily Acknowledged Offense.

Fruits of the prosecutions of settlers at Kedgwick for setting fires illegally which resulted in the destruction of part of the village, already have been secured, for one of them who had not been charged with the offense voluntarily appeared before Magistrate Somers and made acknowledgement. The settler was William Michaud. He was convicted by the Magistrate and was fined sixteen dollars.

Game Violations in Restigouche

A prosecution for violation of the Game Act is expected to take place in Restigouche in the near future. Recently Game Warden Harry Russell came upon a poacher in the very act of killing a moose out of season. Game violations in other sections of the province have not been reported recently.

PEACE DAY CELEBRATION

Application re Establishment  
of New Laundry on Limerick Lot Possible—  
Other Matters.

The City Council is to meet in special session tonight for the purpose of considering and passing the accounts for the Peace Day Celebration on Saturday last. The arrangement now is that the city will foot the bills. They are expected to amount to upwards of one thousand dollars.

Wants to Establish Laundry

It is reported that a gentleman named Dykeman is desirous of establishing a wet-wash laundry in the city. It being considered that the field here will easily support another laundry. The so-called Limerick lot in King Street near Regent, bought by the city some years ago as a site for a hose station but never put to that use, is considered suitable for the proposed laundry. It is reported, however, that residents of the locality have offered objection to the city giving a lease of the property for the purpose named, considering a laundry unsuited to a residential locality.

Another Matter

Another matter which is likely will be mentioned at tonight's meeting is the rights of citizens to enclose a portion of any street in front of a building in process of erection or repair. The matter recently came up in connection with the construction of the new Camp building in York Street. Early in the week the sidewalk in front of the building was entirely enclosed to protect the public. A number of citizens objected that the entire sidewalk should not be enclosed but a passageway left. The objection resulted in a change being made. The bylaw governing the matter probably will be referred to tonight.

Housing Grant Received

The provincial government has received on July 22 the sum of \$600,000 on account from the Dominion government for housing loans. This money is now available for all municipalities which comply with the terms of the act passed at the last session, copies of which have been sent out, together with full particulars as to the necessary procedure. It is now for the municipalities to act. The loans to which they are entitled, or any portion of them, can be had as soon as the conditions of the act are complied with by the applicants.
