## ANNUAL REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE PRESENTED

Recommends Appliances for Restraint of Insane—Will Continue to Assist in Enforcement of Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, Within the City Limits—Twenty-nine Convictions in Forty-nine Prohibition Cases.

The annual report of W. H. Finley, Chief of Police of the City of Fredericton, was presented to the City Council last night. The report in full is as follows:

To the members of the Police Commission for the City of Fredericton, Gentlemen:—

I have the honor to submit this, my annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1918.

The strength of the force at the present time is four men, consisting of Chief, one sergeant, and two patrolmen, which is a very small number when you consider the area to be patrolled.

Sergt. William J. Hughes, handed in his resignation on the 6th day of November, 1918, asking to be relieved at once in order that he be enabled to take up the work of City Tax Collector. His resignation was accepted, and went into effect on the 16th day of November 1918, and Officed Nathaniel Jones, was promoted to Sergt. in his place.

William Dell Hartt, of the City of Fredericton was appointed, and sworn in on the 8th day of November 1918, as a Police Officer, and went on duty at once to serve for a period of six months, when his services would terminate if not satisfactory, or if he was dissatisfied with the work he would be relieved.

### Constable's Convention

Having obtained permission from your Commission I visited Hamilton, Ontario, and attended the Convention of the Chief Constables Association, held there on the 16th, 17th and 18th of July, 1918, and spent a busy three days in the discussion of the various questions that were brought up, and I am of the opinion that this Association is one of the most important in Canada today, and that no Town, or City, regardless of the size can afford to have its Chief of Police absent from them, as it brings him in touch with the heads of Police Departments all over Canada, but one requires to attend these Conventions before he can fully realize their importance. I regret to think that our Common Council did not realize the importance of these meetings to that degree where they could feel justified in paying my expenses in this connection.

### Ninety-Nine Arrests

There were ninety-nine arrests made during the year on the following charges, which is seventy six less than last year.

Aliens attempting to leave registered District, without permission 1, Assault 11, Abusive language 1, Assault on Constable 1, Indecent Assault 2, Breaking and entering 6, Carrying concealed weapons 1, Drunk 15, Drunk and profane language 4, Drunk and having liquor in possession 5, Deserter under the Military Service Act 1, Deserter 1, Drunk and operating a motor car 1, Forgery 1, Inmates of Disorderly House 2, Illegal Fishing for salmon 1, Interfering with the Police 2, Insane persons arrested 2, Having stolen goods in possession 2, Stealing 11, Receiving stolen goods 1, Keeping disorderly house 2, Not giving a satisfactory account of themselves 2, Conducting lottery 2, Obscene photos in possession 2, Warrant witness 2, Warrant non-support 3, Warrant Bastardy 5, Common Vagrancy 1, Purchasing liquor 1, Came to the Police Station for protection 7.

Total ninety-nine.

Of this number seventy-four were New Brunswick born; five were Nova Scotia born; four were United States of America born; three were Austrian born; three Scottish born; two English born; two Russian born; two Ontario born; one was Serbian born; one Quebec born; one Irish born and one Italian born.

### Other Cases

Men of Alien enemy nationality registered here 38; County prisoners lodged for safe keeping 15; Deserters under Military Service Act for safe keeping, 77; Deserters from overseas forces for safe keeping, 10; Doors found opened, and secured, 109; Telephone calls responded to 53; Alarms of fire responded to 54; Bicycles found on street, 26; Articles found on street 12; Ice removed from buildings on order of police, 16; Livery Stable license taken out on notice of police 5; Number of dogs registered by police, 235; Number of dogs destroyed, 2; Number of dead dogs found on street, and removed, 4; Undesirable persons sent out of city, 4; Break in water pipe reported, 2; Electric wires reported dangerous, 3; Accidents on street reported, 7; Furious unmuzzled dog at large, 1; Horses ran away, caught by police, 4; Cows placed in pound, 2; Doing business in City no license, 3; Horses found running at large, placed in pound, 2; Horse dropped dead in street, 1; Horses shot by police at request of owner, 3; Working in city, no license, 2; Junk license taken out on notice of police, 7; Street light broken, reported to court, 1; Riding bicycles on sidewalks reported, 27; Meat license taken out on request of police, 12; Drowning accidents reported, 1; Accidents crossing C. P. R. Track in city, 1; Motor vehicle law violations reported 5; Lost children found and returned to parents, 2; Bicycle taken on order of Police Magistrate, 1; Girl ran away from home, returned to parents, 1; Traffic Law violations reported, 20.

Violations of New Brunswick Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916 reported 47, of which there were 29 convictions 10 dismissed, 7 not finished and one was withdrawn.

There were also nine seizures made. Money and property reported stolen to the value of \$975.05. Money and property stolen, recovered \$670.70.

### Street Traffic Signs

Our street traffic signs have been of great assistance to us in enforcing the Traffic Law, and while they have been damaged on three occasions and quite a number of lantern globes broken in various ways, still the results obtained have warranted the cost of maintenance, and I would recommend that these signs be repaired during the Winter, in order that they may be ready to be placed in position in the early spring.

### Prohibition

The agreement between your commission, and the Chief Inspector, under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916 whereby I was appointed Sub-Inspector for the City of Fredericton, Town of Devon, Parish of Kingsclear, and Douglas, in the County of York, and the Village of Oromocto, and Fredericton Junction, in the County of Sunbury, expired on the 31st day of December 1918, and there is no Sub-Inspector for these districts at the present time, so far as known to me, and while this work did not require my undivided attention much of the time, still the work in the outlying districts was embarrassing at times, and required long hours of work to keep up with the requirements.

I found that the City work did not conflict with my duties as Chief of Police, to any extent, as the two jobs are along the same lines, and it being the duty of all police officers to enforce the provisions of this Act, in common with all other acts, we will still be responsible for the enforcement of it, even though we are not Inspectors.

### Care of Insane

During the past six weeks we have had three insane persons under arrest in the police cells who were finally taken to the New Brunswick Provincial Hospital at Lancaster, St. John County, and as we have no appliances here to restrain persons from doing violence to themselves, I would recommend that restraint appliances be secured at once in order that unfortunate human beings may be protected against injury or self destruction.

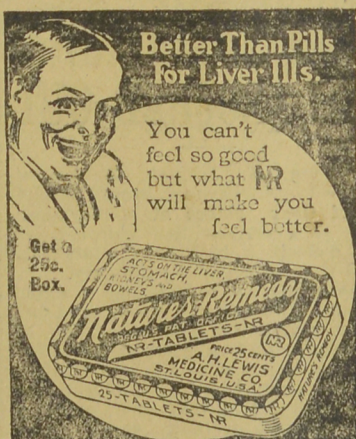
the number of returned soldiers, who are coming and going all the time, this can be accounted for to a large extent by the fact that intoxicating liquor is not easily procured for beverage purposes.

### Food Regulations

The regulations, and laws, respecting the conservation of food, and food products passed by order in Council at Ottawa from time to time during the past year has entailed a large amount of work on the police, through Canada, but I am pleased to say that these laws have been well observed and respected by our citizens in Fredericton, so that we were not obliged to prosecute in one instance, notwithstanding

standing this I have received a letter of commendation from a representative of the Canada Food Board who came to our city for the purpose of investigation, as to the observance of these food regulations.
