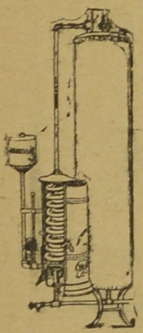

DOING GOOD WORK FOR THE SOLDIERS

When Pte. E. A. Reardon, a patient under the care of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, died in hospital at Toronto he was far from his home and relatives, but he was among friends. All that could be done was done to save his life, but pneumonia proved too much for a constitution previously weakened by the strain of war service in Belgium and France.

At the time of his death Pte. Reardon's wife was in Walthamstow, Essex, England, and no other kin resided in Canada.

As Pte. Reardon had served with the Royal Canadian Dragoons, the Officer Commanding that unit asked the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment to allow the funeral to be conducted by that corps, and this was done. The body was conveyed from Stanley Barracks, Toronto, to Prospect Cemetery and there buried with all military honors.

Following cable announcement of Pte. Reardon's death, from the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, in accordance with its usual procedure, a letter was forwarded by its officers to Mrs. Reardon in Walthamstow, giving complete particulars of the illness and death of her husband. With the letter was enclosed snapshots of the final ceremony at the graveside and a photograph of the grave. There was also forwarded to the widow a deed to the grave and a copy of the instructions providing for the perpetual care of the little plot.

Sir James Loughheed, Minister of the Department also sent a personal letter of condolence to the widow. A reply has been received by the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment from Mrs. Reardon expressing deep appreciation of the services rendered in life and after death to her husband, and offering warm thanks to those who paid the tribute due a worthy soldier.

In every instance of the death of a patient of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment where interment takes place at a distance from the home of the next of kin, photographs of the grave are prepared and forwarded to the relatives, together with fullest particulars of the death and burial of the former soldier.

U. S. TO RESUME TRADE WITH THE GERMANS

Washington, July 11.—Trade between the United States and Germany will be resumed immediately, Acting Secretary Polk, of the State Department, announced today.

Mr. Polk said blanket licenses would be issued, but that dyes, chemicals and potash would be excepted. Control over trade in these commodities will be exercised by the reparation commission under the terms of the peace treaty. A formal announcement regarding the resumption of trade relations was promised within forty-eight hours.

Secretary Polk further declared that resumption of the trade relations with Germany did not abrogate the trading with the enemy act, nor was it to be taken as meaning that the state of war was at an end.
