New York, Oct. 2.—The George Washington, with King Albert of Belgium on board, arrived off the Fire Island lightship at 5 o'clock yesterday. She anchored at sunset three miles east of the Ambrose lightship. A flotilla of twelve destroyers escorted the George Washington through the Narrows and up the bay to the pier at Hoboken. Several other munition boats and yachts proceeded to quarantine to greet the vessel, but did not form part of the official fleet.
