THE USE OF BRUSHES.

Much Easier on the Hands When
Used for Cleaning Utensils—
Make Glassware Glitter.

The housekeeper who has not learned the utility of brushes and acquired the habit of using them wherever possible, has something to learn in the economy of time and labor.

A short fibred broom brush, or one partly worn down, is indispensable in cleaning out the corners and about the register in the pipe, and like places, and for this reason is far superior to the stove brush.

The same kind of broom brush is invaluable in cleaning sinks, especially those abominations of the kitchen, iron sinks. But even in the case of black iron sinks if one will employ a broom and a little concentrated lye daily it will be easily kept immaculate.

Cleaning Dishes.

In the dishpan a broad long-handled brush such as used for cleaning silver, will be found invaluable in cleaning glassware, especially cut glass. Many dishes which have held sticky food, such as oatmeal or other cereals, are very difficult to wash, and yield readily to the persuasions of a brush than a cloth. Wire brushes are invaluable for cleaning pots and frying pans.

In the preparing of vegetables there is constant need of a stiff bristled brush. Any vegetable which is cooked without peeling should be thoroughly scrubbed with a brush.

One of the most welcome uses for a brush is found in greasing pans and utensils which require this precaution against sticking. For this use a paint brush is best. It is equally useful in buttering rolls, in brushing milk or egg over cakes or turnovers, in fact for any greasing operations.

Cleaning Woodwork.

In cleaning woodwork a short, stubby paint brush is invaluable in getting into the angles of moulding and if dipped into some reliable cleanser will work wonders.

In the Laundry.

Another use for the whisk broom is found in the laundry when lace curtains are to be done up. Anyone who has not tried this easy way of laundering curtains will be astonished at the ease with which it is accomplished.

The curtains are washed in usual way and then hung on the line, either up and down or crosswise, pinning the front edge of the curtain to the line and as many curtains as the line will accommodate. Then pin the ends of the curtains together with hairpins, which hold better than pins, and with a whisk broom brush the curtains downwards until dry. They will dry beautifully smooth and straight and will have more the appearance of new unlaundered curtains than by any other method, and the work is light.

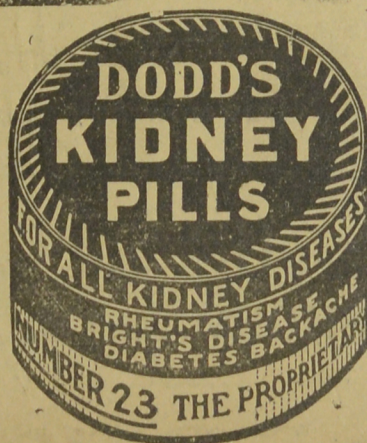

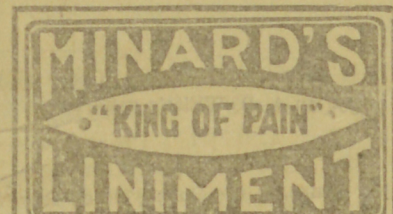

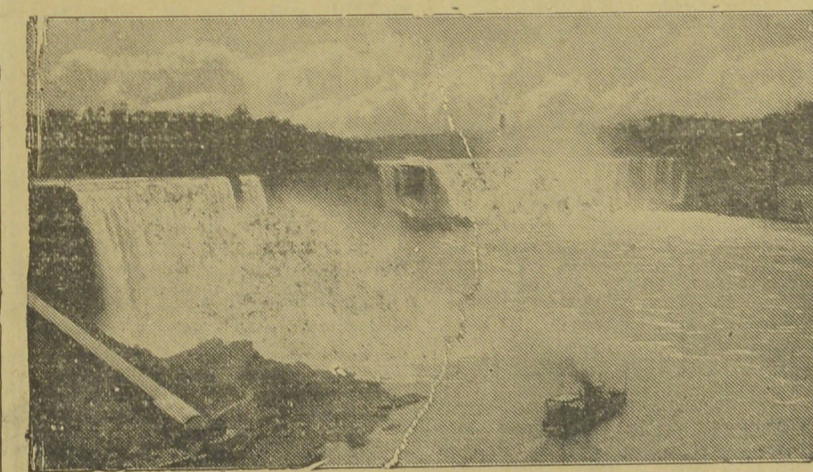

ment is the waste of water, not being
utilized for national purposes.

These falls, below the drop are sur-
rounded on either side by walls of
perpendicular rock, reaching heaven-
ward in an enormous height. A short

distance below may be found rocks
near the shore, which are celebrated
far and wide, as "The Well-Rocks."
In these rocks are to be found large
holes of a circular shape, worn out
by the action of the water for many
and innumerable years. One of these
holes or wells is twenty-seven feet
deep, and about ten feet in diameter.
