

## NOTICE

NOTICE is hereby given that application will be made the applicants hereinafter named, pursuant to "New Brunswick Companies Act, 1916," and the Acts in amendment thereto, incorporating the applicants and such other persons as may become shareholders in the proposed Company, a body corporate under the name of "The Capital Hydro-Electric Company, Limited," for the purposes hereinafter mentioned:

1. The objects for which incorporation is sought and the proposed powers of the Company, are as follows:

(a) To carry on the business of an electric light, heat and power Company in all its branches.

(b) To provide, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire and to construct, lay down, erect, establish, operate maintain and carry out all necessary works, stations, engines, machinery, plant, cables, wires, lines, generators, accumulators, lamps meters transformers, apparatus, appurtenances and appliances connected with the generation, accumulation, distribution, transmission, supply, sale, use and employment of electricity, for the purposes of electric lighting, heating, traction and motive power, and for industrial and other purposes, and to undertake and to enter into contracts and agreements for the lighting of cities, towns, streets, buildings, and other places, and for the supply of electric light, heat and motive power and hydro-electric power for any or all public or private purposes.

(c) To make, build, construct, maintain and operate reservoirs, water-works, cisterns, dams, canals, culverts, conduits and other pipes and appliances, and to execute and do all things necessary for obtaining, storing, selling, delivering, measuring and distributing water for the creation, maintenance and development of hydraulic, electrical or other mechanical power, for any other purpose of the company.

(d) To construct, improve, work, maintain, carry out or control and to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, and to hold, use, sell, lease or otherwise dispose of any lands, works, mains, machinery, or any roads, ways, bridges, reservoirs, watercourses, electrical works, shops and other enterprises and work which may seem capable of being used in connection with the Company's undertakings for the time being, or calculated to benefit the Company, and to equip, maintain and operate by electric, hydraulic or other mechanical power, all works belonging to the Company, or in which the Company may be interested, and to contribute towards or otherwise assist in the construction, improvement, maintenance, management, carrying out or control thereof.

(e) To apply for and receive by enactment, transfer, grant, lease or otherwise, and to exercise and carry out any statute or concession, license, power, franchise, right or privilege relating to the generation, accumulation, development, distribution, supply, sale and employment of electric energy, water powers or water which any Government or authority, or any corporation or public body may be empowered to enact, make or grant, and to pay for, aid in and contribute towards carrying the same into effect, using any of the Company's shares, bonds and assets to defray the necessary cost, charges and expenses thereof.

(f) To carry on any other business capable of being carried on in connection with the business or objects of the Company, or calculated to render profitable directly or indirectly the Company's properties or rights.

(g) To purchase or otherwise acquire the shares, bonds or securities of any Company or Corporation notwithstanding the provisions of Section 49 of the "New Brunswick Companies Act, 1916," and pay for the same in shares or other securities of this Company, and to hold, sell, hypothecate, vote upon or otherwise deal in the said shares or securities so purchased, and to guarantee payment of or dividends and interest on the said shares or securities, and to promote any Company having objects altogether or in part similar to this Company.

(h) To sell or otherwise dispose of the property, rights, franchises and undertakings of the Company, or any part thereof, in any way the Company may think fit, and in particular for shares or other securities of any company having objects in part or altogether similar to those of this Company.

(i) To consolidate with any other Company having objects similar in whole or in part with this Company.

(j) To purchase or otherwise acquire all or any of the property, franchises, good-will, rights and privileges held or enjoyed by any person, firm, or Company carrying on any business similar to that which this Company is authorized to carry on, and to pay for the same wholly or partly in cash, or wholly or partly in shares of this Company or otherwise, and to assume the liabilities of such person, firm, or Company, and to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire any rights, assets and effects, including lands and tenements, and to pay for the same with shares, bonds or other securities of the said Company, or part cash and part shares and securities.

(k) Any power granted in any paragraph hereof shall not be limited or restricted by reference to or inference from the terms of any other paragraph.

Monument to Cartier  
Erected in Montreal

Great Canadian Patriot and Statesman Fittingly Honored—

Monument Erected Near the Entrance to Mount Royal Park—Is Nearly One Hundred Feet High—Without Cartier Confederation of the Provinces Would Not Have Been Possible.

The Cartier Memorial to be unveiled in Montreal today is a monument in granite and bronze to perpetuate the memory of Sir George-Etienne Cartier, patriot, statesman, Premier of Canada before Confederation, leader of the Province of Quebec in Confederation and first Minister of Militia in the Canadian Confederation, born in 1814, at St. Antoine-sur-Richelieu died in London, England, in 1873. The Monument is nearly 100 feet high from base to top of crowning figure. It consists of a base and column of grey Canadian granite and a large bronze figure of Renown on top of column. Around the base and column are the following seventeen bronze figures: In front at the base are four large female figures in bronze 9 ft. high representing the four Provinces of Quebec, Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, which first entered into Confederation in 1867; a bronze ribbon connects the figures bearing the inscription "O Canada, Mon Pays, Mes Amours" or "O Canada, my country, my love." These words are the refrain of a song which was sung by Cartier at the first celebration in Canada of St. Jean Baptiste Day in 1835, and was specially written by him for that occasion. Cartier was the first Secretary of the St. Jean Baptiste Society. It was also sung by Cartier, then Prime Minister of United Canada, on the trip up the St. Lawrence with His Majesty the late King Edward, then Prince of Wales, in 1860. The Prince expressed keen delight at Cartier's rendition of the songs of his country, particularly "O Canada, Mon Pays, Mes Amours."

One of the central figures of this group the Province of Quebec is gazing upward towards the granite column, whose statue 11 ft. high, in bronze, is placed in the centre of the column, bearing in one hand a scroll on which is inscribed "Avant Tout Soyons Canadiens" (Before all let us be Canadians), the title of a song written by Cartier and sung on the streets of Montreal in 1837 by the Sons of Liberty, of which Cartier was the Secretary.

At the base of the monument below the four statues of the Provinces is inscribed the following quotation from a speech delivered by Cartier in 1865 "We are of different races not for strife, but to work together for the common welfare." Below the statue of Cartier is his coat-of-arms in bronze, which bears his motto, "Franc et sans dol" (Frank without deceit). Above the statue of Cartier, near the top of the column, carved in the granite, is the coat-of-arms of the City of Montreal.

At the base of the monument, to the rear, are five bronze figures, of the same proportions as the front figures, representing the Provinces which have subsequently entered Confederation, viz: Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Alberta, linked together by a ribbon bearing the inscription in English "The defence of the flag is one of the bases of Confederation", an extract from a speech delivered by Cartier at the Provincial Conference held in Halifax in 1864. Above these figures on the back of the column, level with the statue of Cartier is a bronze figure also 11 ft. high of a soldier defending the flag, to carry out the thought of the above quoted saying, also a reminder that Cartier was the first Canadian Minister of Militia and that it was he who established the Militia of Canada. On the breast of each of the nine statues is a shield bearing the coat-of-arms of the respective province it represents. To the right and left of the base are groups in bronze, the one to the left representing "Education", to the right "Legislation."

"Education" is represented by three figures typical of the imparting of instruction to the young, and is to perpetuate Cartier's great work in the development of our educational systems.

The group of "Legislation" is also comprised of three figures. The central figure is Law, stern and unchangeable. In her left hand she holds the sword, symbol of the execution of the law. Her right hand rests on a book in which the figure Genius is inscribing the laws compiled by the genius of Cartier. To the left of the central figure is the little prisoner in the act of pleading, this is symbolic of cor-

rection. Surmounting the column is a large bronze ball, 4 ft. in diameter, supporting the winged figure of "Renown" bearing a wreath in one hand, with which she appears to crown Cartier's statue below. This figure of "Renown" is 18 ft. high, and the spread of its wings is 20 ft. across, it weighs 8,000 lbs. In the middle of the four front figures at the base is this inscription "A Cartier, La Reconnaissance et L'admiration D'un Peuple (To Cartier, the gratitude and admiration of a people). At the rear below the group of the five provinces is inscribed the following quotation from a speech delivered by Cartier in 1867: "Le Canada Doit Etre Un Pays Non De Licence, Mais De Liberte. Et Toutes Les Libertes Doivent Etre Protegees Par La Loi" (Canada must be a country not of license, but of liberty, and all liberties must be protected by the law.)

On the four approaches to the monument are eight large pedestals in granite, which will be surmounted by large bronze lions, 9 ft. long by 3 ft. 8 inches broad. At the rear of the monument will be two large lighting standards in bronze. Sixty carloads of granite were used in the construction of the monument, the stone having quarried in Stanstead Co., Province of Quebec.

The bronze figures were cast in Brussels, Belgium, where Mr. G. W. Hill, the sculptor, has a studio, and the total weight of the 18 figures (exclusive of the lions) is 27 tons.

The site of the monument is at the entrance to Mount Royal Park, on the slopes of the mountain, overlooking the City of Montreal, the scene of Cartier's labors and triumphs.

What Cartier Did for Canada

Cartier's political career covered the period ranging from 1844 to 1872, a period which according to Lord Dufferin, was the most eventful and most glorious epoch of the country's history.

The name of Cartier is intimately linked with all the greatest political acts of that important period, amongst others:

The Construction of the Montreal and Portland Railway.

The Decentralisation of the Judiciary.

The Abolition of the Seigneurial Tenure.

The Choice of Ottawa as capital.

The Construction of the Grand Trunk Ry. and of the Victoria Bridge

The Modification of the Criminal Law.

The Municipality Act of Lower Canada.

The Act relating to the Registration Offices.

The organization of the Public Instruction System.

The Establishment of Normal Schools.

The Creation of an Ocean Line of Steamers.

The Improvement and Deepening of the St. Lawrence.

The Building of Canals.

The Confederation of the Provinces of British North America.

The Acquisition of The North West Territories.

The Construction of the Intercolonial Railway on the present outlines.

The Establishment of the Province of Manitoba.

The Admission of British Columbia into the Confederation.

The Establishment of our Military System.

It was also Cartier who on the 26th April, 1872, proposed the great Canadian Pacific Railway project and conducted the debate upon it, and when the enthusiastic applause of the House greeted his triumph, the last one of his well filled career, he prophetically exclaimed: "All aboard for the West." It was his last triumph, for he died in London in the following year on the 20th May, 1873. His first and last speech was in favour of railways, for he saw in this means of transportation the only way to rapidly populate Canada and consolidate its institutions.

Without Cartier Confederation would not have been possible, and without Confederation what would Canada be today?

SETTLEMENT BOARD WANTS GOOD  
FARMS FOR VETERANS AT LOW COST

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—Mr. W. J. Black, Chairman Soldier Settlement Board, announces a campaign to enlist the co-operation of municipalities and local committees in the work of locating suitable farms for returned soldiers and assisting them to settle thereon. On the need for this co-operation he said today:

"In locating lands best suited to the needs of returned soldiers, the Soldier Settlement Board has been giving in the past every assistance of which its organization was capable.

"In some localities citizens desirous of maintaining the fine patriotic spirit which characterized this country during the war and of rendering some tangible assistance to the men settling on land who did so much for this country in France and Flanders, have formed themselves into committees to aid the Board in carrying out its programme. It is now the purpose to extend this plan, in order that soldier settlers may have such help in finding suitable locations and in getting settled as local communities alone can contribute.

"The Board considers the time has come when soldier settlers should not have the cost of their lands increased by any amounts charged as commissions, under the assumption that service is being rendered through locating said lands or otherwise. The men who are eligible as settlers have made such a contribution to the welfare of this country that the least that can be done for them is, to assist them systematically in finding the best places for their future homes."
