## DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS CONTINUED AT OTTAWA

Mr. O. Turgeon Brings Up the Kent County Shooting Case—Says That the County Sent Over 1300 Men to the Front—Acadians of Maritime Provinces Did Their Bit in the Great War.

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—The debate on the address continued to be a most dreary performance due perhaps to the fact that there was little or nothing in the address to debate over. The government seems inclined to leave the speaking largely to the opposition, only one member from the government side having taken part in the debate today and he one who is not under very good party discipline, namely, Dr. Edwards, of Frontenac. Incidentally what brought the peppery doctor into the arena was a chance to say something offensive about the maritime provinces, a chance he never misses.

Joseph Memers, of St. John's-Iberville, opened the debate. He took the line for which Mr. Fielding gave the cue to the opposition when the treaty was introduced by the premier, that nothing would really happen one way or the other whether Canada signed the treaty or not. He maintained that it was futile for us to enter the league of nations as we were not a nation in the international sense of the word. He had several solutions for the high cost of living including the commanding of food storage, the control of exports and the establishment of government stores which would tend to regulate prices. He urged leniency to defaulters under the military service act because the government was at fault in having prejudiced the success of the measure by having left public opinion confused and misinformed. Certain other countries were now preparing to declare amnesties on this matter and Canada should do the same.

### Advocate of Amnesty

Mr. Baldwin, a Protestant, who cannot speak French but who gets elected by the "bigoted" people of Stanstead county, Quebec, urged that the prince's visit should be celebrated by letting loose all the military defaulters Quebec, he said, had saved Canada several times by sticking to its industries and producing and therefore the capitalists of Canada and the United States had their eye on it as a place for investment. It looked to him as though Parliament had been called as the purpose of springing another trap for the opposition. They had been called traitors and rebels before. He suspected that the premier wanted to bring on a vote and spring an election, Canada, he said, was facing financial ruin.

Frank Cahill, Renfrew, brought up an important matter under the wide privilege of the debate on the address viz. the necessity of some sort of international transportation arrangement to govern the returning of freight cars sent across the border. He said industries in his constituency along the line of the Transcontinental were paralyzed for the lack of cars which were being held unduly in the United States. Canada should make some arrangement or convention to rectify this.

Sir George Foster, in reply, admitted the injuriousness of the practise but said it was hard to rectify. There were times when thousands of our cars were across the line and very few of theirs here.

Mr. Turgeon, of Gloucester, N. B. spoke at length. He urged the government to have the board of commerce

to look into the price of clothing and shoes used by the masses of the people. He pointed out that New Brunswick was in the unusual position of being without a representative in the cabinet. If there had been such he would have conferred with him over a recent incident which had happened in that province. He then referred to the death of an officer of the law seeking defaulters under the military service act. He pointed out the seriousness of the situation when men were going around with firearms searching for human beings.

In Kent county thirteen hundred volunteers, eleven hundred and fifty of whom were French-Acadians, had gone to war before conscription was put into effect; all who could be spared from a county whose industries were chiefly agriculture and fisheries. No blemish he said rests on the Acadians of the maritime provinces, yet today the country was scoured by officers because a few young men probably in ignorance of the law, had not come forward. Now these men were being hunted eight or nine months after the war was over and houses were opesed and entered in the middle of the night with disastrous results to delicate women among the occupants.

He called on the prime minister to make a thorough investigation into the matter and in the meantime stop chasing about for more defaulters in Kent county.

Dr. Edwards who has lived much too late and would have been in his glory when thumb screws were a la mode urged no mercy for defaulters. He then switched to his favorite amusement, viz. baiting the maritime provinces. He attacked J. H. Sinclair who had been talking about the profiteers. He said he was interested in Carmichael & Company, a shipping concern which before the war was receiving rates on lumber of thirty shillings per standard and, during the war had received 380 shillings. There were evidently pirates in this country as well as profiteers. Who would deny that water freights have not an important effect on the high cost of living? He had been in the house eleven years and never yet heard any member from Nova Scotia object to money being spent there although they were always ready to criticize expenditures in other parts of Canada.

Mr. Proulx was speaking when the house adjourned until Monday. There are still a number of opposition members to speak on the address.

## THE NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

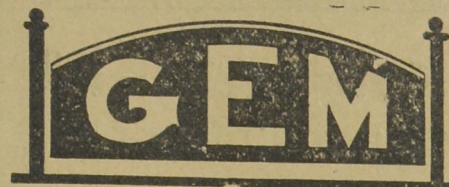

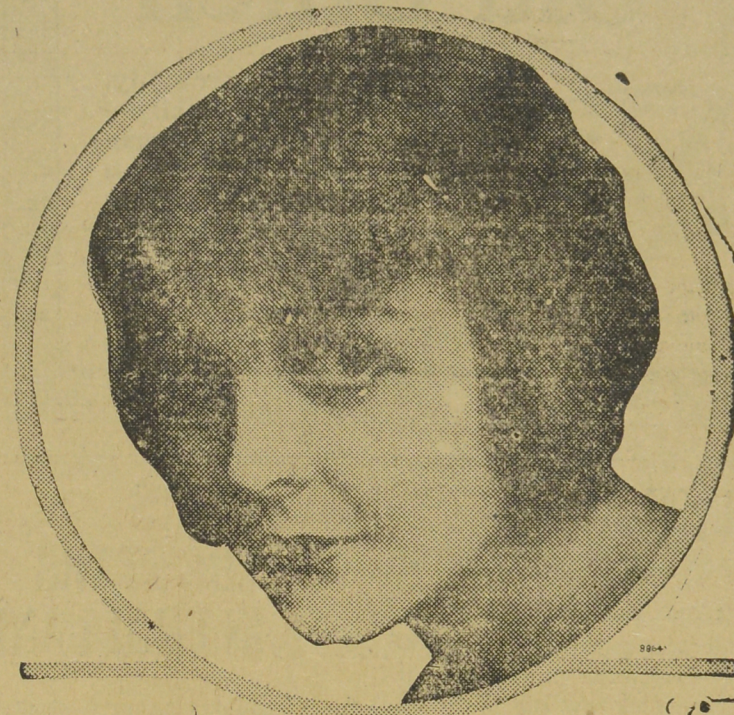
