

## QUARTERS FOR EMPLOYEES BEING PREPARED

### HOUSING PROBLEM BEING SOLVED TEMPORARILY

John Palmer Company Bringing Larrigan-Sewers from Madawaska for the Autumn Rush

The excess of the demand for houses over the supply in Fredericton is well exemplified by the step which is being taken by the John Palmer Co. in preparing quarters for some larrigan sewers expected to arrive here shortly. This year the lack of houses in the city has compelled the company to prepare quarters for them in the building in Westmorland Street formerly used by the Company as offices when its factory was located there. Quarters and a sewing-room will be fitted up for the temporary employees.

Ten men are expected to be in the party. Some are married and their wives with thirteen children also will be included. Larrigan-sewing as a home industry is followed quite extensively in Madawaska and for some years the John Palmer Company has shipped work there to be made up and returned to the factory here as well as having workmen come here from that section.

This company also is having a portion of the building in King Street formerly used by D. W. Hoegg as a canning factory and before that the site of a tannery, fitted as a dwelling. This will be occupied by employees of the company.

## EXHIBITION PREPARATIONS WELL ADVANCED

### NEW CONCRETE BUILDING FINISHED BY WEDNESDAY

Midway Attractions from Ottawa Direct by Special Train—New Features in Stock Entries.

Secretary W. S. Hooper of the Fredericton Exhibition announced today that the new Transportation Building would be completed by the coming Wednesday. Pending the completion of this concrete building an extra gang of carpenters has been put at work on the roof of the Administration Building. The carpenters are being supplied by James S. Neill & Sons. The new building itself will be ready for exhibits on Thursday the 11th. The Poultry Department on the second story of the new building is one of the largest in Canada, Toronto not excepted and is so large that it is proposed to put some of the Government exhibits there. The ground floor will be used for articles connected with transportation, such as automobiles and carriages, and already some forty different makes of motors have been entered. The upper side of this floor will be occupied by Farm Machinery, etc. The old poultry house will be given over to agricultural products. The centre of the concrete floor will be occupied by the fruit department and by flowers and plants, while the Experimental Farm exhibit will occupy the whole side along Smythe Street. All the buildings will communicate with one another for the benefit of the public.

#### Booths Being Constructed

Many of the principal exhibitors are already putting up their booths and by next Wednesday the electric lights will be put in so that the work can be carried on at night. By telegram today it was learned that the midway attractions would leave Ottawa on Saturday morning by a special train of some twenty-two cars, arriving in this city on Sunday evening, and being in full working order at noon on Monday. All available space on the midway which is considerably larger than the last exhibition's was sold out over two weeks ago and applications are still coming in today for space.

#### Four Bands To Play

In all four bands will play at the exhibition and parades will be held every day starting from the corner of St. John and Queen Streets to the Exhibition building. Band concerts will be given every afternoon and evening. The Queen City Band of Bangor will probably be on hand for several days.

## PHYSICIAN GIVES DIRECT CONTRADICTION

### DEATH AT NEWCASTLE NOT DUE TO VACCINATION

Margaret Harris Died from Infection of Sore on Face—Vaccination was Incidental.

The statement of the attending physician denying the published statement that Margaret Harris of Newcastle died from the effect of vaccination is as follows:

Re Alleged Death from Vaccination of Miss Margaret Harris of Newcastle.  
Dear Doctor:

According to reports, in the newspapers of the Province, the death of Miss Margaret Harris has been attributed to Vaccination. Now this is incorrect, as the death of Miss Harris was due to Acute Sepsis the result of a slight wound of the face. Miss Harris showed at the same time an active vaccination which was typical, and there was not the least evidence of extraneous infection at this point while the infection of the face failed to show the least evidence of vaccine inoculation. In fact the infection on the face apparently overshadowed and held in abeyance the vaccination.

The vaccination was an unfortunate coincidence and in no way responsible for the death.
