BOLSHEVISM IN CANADA

The Toronto Saturday Night hits the nail on the head when it says, "what better insurance against Bolshevism and other destructive propaganda than to give it full publicity." The one sure way to defeat extremist and revolutionary doctrines in this country is to let the words of their advocates be known. The danger lies in the possibility that, through lack of publicity the mass of the people will not know exactly what the extremists are preaching. Let the people know what is urged by these men and there will be danger that misguided or vicious agitators will attract and hold any powerful following. The light of publicity is the last thing that "direct action" doctrines and advocacy in Canada can stand. As Saturday Night puts it, "By all means allow the people to talk. The more they talk the better. But be sure that the public prints give full accounts of their 'doings.' By such means the situation will not be aggravated, but, on the contrary will be neutralized. If given full publicity, the agitator will easily make three enemies among the population to one friend, and that is quite sufficient for the needs at hand." Newspapers and other publications which suppress the raucous of the extremist agitators only help them by keeping from the people generally a knowledge of what these men propose. The percentage of hot-heads and of rogues and fools among the Canadian people is very small, comparatively, and it is only in those classes that the "Reds" can gain a following if the truth about "Red" doctrines is made known to the people as a whole."

THE LAURIER MONUMENT.

A despatch from Ottawa on Friday stated that the organization work which has for its object the raising of \$100,000 for a monument to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier is proceeding well in all the provinces, according to letters which are reaching headquarters in the capital.

Premier Foster states that meetings will be called in a few days in the various counties in New Brunswick to elect chairmen and proceed with the collection of this fund. The effort, he says, is to be purely voluntary, the amount of each contribution not to exceed five dollars. As soon as the organization meetings have been held, committees will be appointed to receive subscriptions, which in turn will be forwarded to the headquarters in Ottawa.

Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, barrister, of Fredericton, has been named as treasurer for New Brunswick and will receive and promptly acknowledge all subscriptions.

An Ottawa despatch says it is expected that the executive committee which was formed at last week's meeting of the Liberal organization committee will hold further meetings within the next week or two, when the appointment of a general secretary of the Liberal party will be among the first items of business. Immediately after the meetings of the whole executive, the members left for their homes in various parts of the Dominion, but it is anticipated that the members of the executive committee will be in Ottawa again within a few days to arrange for carrying out the plans of organization which were laid down at last week's meetings.

The latest report from Ottawa intimates that General H. H. McLean, M. P., may join the cabinet as Minister of Militia. Mr. J. B. M. Baxter was in Ottawa yesterday, but stated in an interview that his business was in connection with the proposed harbor commission. General McLean is an old time Liberal, but has been a firm supporter of Union Government. Certain graft newspapers which have the notion that he can be easily bled have been quietly pulling wires in his behalf for some time. The General is hot-foot after the appointment, and it looks as if he might win out.

Mr. Lloyd Harris, former Canadian Trade Commissioner to Great Britain, was recently asked as to the truth of

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a report that he was to enter the Federal cabinet and lead a "ginger group." Mr. Harris declared he had no political ambitions, had not been invited to join the government and did not seek an invitation for that or any other position. He will be content to get back to his own affairs; but is hopeful of seeing some unfavorable aspects of the present commercial situation cleared up as soon as possible.

An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Chronicle says: "J. B. M. Baxter arrives here tomorrow and there has been a rumor afloat that he comes as a prospective cabinet appointment from New Brunswick. This is not given much credence here, and it is still considered that Sir Douglas Hazen is the most probable appointment."

Agent's Report

The report of Miss Jean Cooper, agent of the Children's Aid Society showed that in all forty-three children ranging in age from three months to fourteen years of age had been taken care of by the society during the past year. Of these, 9 were in the home at the beginning of the year, three were sent in for theft, one for wandering out late at night, 7 because they had not been given proper treatment, 7 who had no one to look after them, 9 because of sickness of their mothers, 1 sent back from the foster home, two whose fathers were sent to Dorchester, 1 whose mother could not support her, 1 whose sister did not treat her kindly, 1 whose guardian did not care for him, and one who was preparing for entrance into a hospital at Montreal.

The report showed that gifts had been received from various societies and that the society were indebted to the City of Fredericton the Women's Institutes of Devon, Nashwaaksis, and Springhill and to the patriotic society for kindnesses. The need of more room at the home was commented upon and Miss Cooper stated that this was very necessary for the work of the Society which was ever becoming greater.

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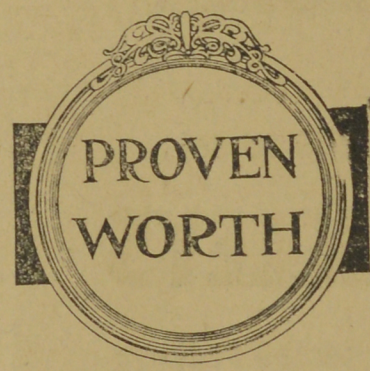
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
