AN EXODUS OF CABINET MINISTERS FROM OTTAWA

Premier Borden Likely to Go to the Adirondacks for a Rest — Hon. Mr. Carvell Will Spend a Week in N. B. — Sir Thomas White May be Persuaded to Remain in Office for a Time— Liberal Convention will be a Great Success.

Ottawa, July 10—With the premier and five cabinet ministers leaving Ottawa for holidays or on departmental business the political atmosphere will be anything but exhilarating for the next few weeks. The premier will probably seek an asylum in the Adirondacks or some quiet spot south of the international boundary to think out the problems of state and form his plan of campaign as his wont is.

Hon. A. K. McLean, acting minister of trade and commerce, is leaving for England on departmental business his absence settling definitely all speculation as to whether he will attend the Liberal convention or not. He will not. Hon. Frank Carvell is going to St. John and he is expected to take a trip afterwards on departmental business to Winnipeg and later to British Columbia. His presence at the convention may be determined later on from the time when his western trip begins, and the amount of departmental business he decides to transact.

Hon. J. A. Calder will go to Muskoka far from immigration and colonizations. Hon. W. N. Rowell who went to Toronto when the session closed returned a day later and will pursue his indefatigable way to British Columbia on public business bent. Hon. C. C. Ballantyne has already left for St. Andrews N. B. for a needed rest.

There remain Sir James Loughheed who is expected to be acting premier, Dr. J. D. Reid, Senator Robertson, Hon. Arthur Meighen, Brigadier-General Mewburn, Sir George Foster, who is kept constantly at his home through his wife's illness, and Hon. Martin Burrell.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie is expected to be away part of the time. Senator Blondin is also away. Judge Doherty is expected to arrive here over the week-end and after his stay at Murray Bay Sir Thomas White will return to Ottawa Monday with his resignation still unaccepted.

"When we've got a good man, we'll try to hang on to him," said a fellow minister, who was asked about a possible successor to Sir Thomas as minister of finance. It is now stated that every effort will be made to induce him to stay until after the next great public loan is subscribed.

Unqualified Success

Sydney, July 10—"There is every indication that the national Liberal convention in Ottawa next month will be attended by unqualified success," said D. D. McKenzie, M. P. house leader of the Liberal party, on his return to North Sydney from Ottawa.

"The information which comes to me and other members of the national committee," Mr. McKenzie continued "indicates that there will be a complete representation of delegates from all parts of the dominion. In addition there will be a very large number of adherents of the party who wish by their presence at the convention to show their loyalty to Liberalism and their confidence in its future. The largest auditorium in Ottawa—Howick Hall at Lansdowne Park, has been engaged for the occasion and the con-

vention which it will accommodate promises to be the greatest political gathering Canada has known."

Will Likely Attend

Ottawa, July 10—Credentials have been extended to the Hon. W. S. Fielding to attend the National Liberal Convention in August. It is expected that he will be in attendance with other Liberals who left Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the conscription issue. Preparations for the convention share with the prospective cabinet reorganization in keeping the political pot boiling. Reports received by the convention organizers here indicate that throughout the various ridings there seems to be a free mind on the question of a successor to Sir Wilfrid Laurier as permanent chief of the Liberal party. There is indications also it is stated of a general desire for the laying down of a "thoroughly progressive" policy.

When the call to the convention was issued invitations were sent to a number of organizations outside the party limits. While generally speaking they will not send delegates to the convention a number will present their views. The Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees has advised that it will have representatives present on the opening day of the convention to present its views. The Proportional Representation Society has asked permission to present the case for proportional representation.

In Quebec and Ontario most of the riding conventions have been held and the delegates chosen. In Nova Scotia nearly all the delegates have been chosen but in New Brunswick a number still remain to be appointed. Arrangements are said to be well forward in the western provinces, although the Saskatchewan convention will not be held until the middle of the month.

"It is enough to be thankful for that he came back when so many others did not. What does loss of limbs mean to us when we love?"

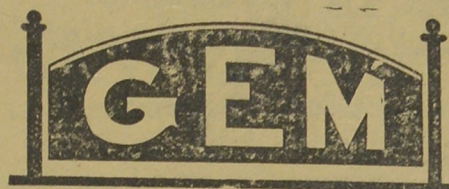
Saw Much Service

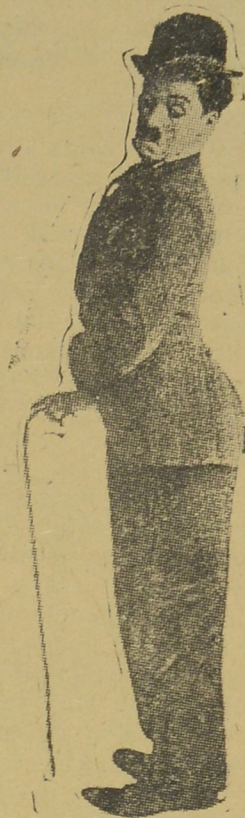
