

PRINCE TO SPEND BUT ONE DAY IN THIS PROVINCE

PROGRAM FOR ST. JOHN RECEPTION COMPLETED

To be Confirmed from Ottawa—Arrangements Made Yesterday—Coming on the Warship Renown.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on his official visit to Canada will first set his foot on Canadian soil at St. John and his visit to New Brunswick will be confined to his entertainment at St. John. He is to arrive at that city August 15th, and the program of his entertainment covers the period from 10 a. m. until 7 p. m. His Royal Highness will leave late at night for another province.

Program Arranged Yesterday
Mr. R. S. Barker, Official Secretary to His Honor the Lieut. Governor, was in St. John yesterday. A tentative program was arranged and Mr. Barker telegraphed Col. Henderson at Ottawa asking that it be confirmed in order that announcement might be made to the public. Col. Henderson is military secretary to His Excellency the Governor General and was in Fredericton with the Vice Regal party last December. An effort was made to have His Royal Highness devote two days to New Brunswick visiting Fredericton as well as St. John but a change could not be made in the arrangements.

Prince's Staff
It is announced that the Prince of Wales probably will come to Canada aboard the warship Renown escorted by two cruisers. His staff is announced as follows: private secretary, Sir Godfrey Thomas; equerries, Captains Lord Claude Hamilton and Hon. P. W. Leigh, who are members of the Prince's household. Special appointments to the staff are, Chief of Staff, Rear Admiral Sir Lionel Halsey; naval aide, Commander Dudley North; military secretary, Col. E. W. Grigg.

BOLSHEVIK SCARE PETERS OUT RAPIDLY

NOTHING ON WHICH TO BASE LEGAL ACTION

Attorney General Has Letter Written by a Resident of Burton—Opinions Not Basis of Action.

The Bolshevik scare which arose out of the distribution of copies of "The Red Flag" at the close of the Robinson circus performance last Tuesday night has petered out. Copies of the forbidden publication have quite generally been destroyed and the same has been done with small dodgers distributed at the same time, which made attacks upon the peace conference and the terms of the peace treaty.

Nothing on Which to Act
Inquiry at the Department of the Attorney General's office today elicited the fact that nothing had been reported to that department upon which action can be based. A letter written by a resident of Burton who is known to have pronounced Socialistic opinions is now in the hands of the Attorney General. The letter was directed to the proprietor of the Gaiety Theatre in this city after an exhibition of pictures at that theatre in which present conditions in Russia were portrayed to their distinct disadvantage. The writer advised that makers and exhibitors of pictures obtain direct information concerning conditions in Russia before showing pictures of the kind of which he complained. The writer showed plainly that he was an admirer of the governmental attempt in Russia.

Man's Opinions His Own
The possession of opinions on certain subjects and even the expression of them is not necessarily an offence under the law and before any prosecutions can take place there must be sufficient grounds. Several residents of Fredericton are known to have opinions which border on Bolshevism.

The distribution of the banned publication "The Red Flag" was an offence but information concerning the men and boys who were the distributors still is lacking.

Taking Pictures of Scenery
Messrs J. M. Alexander of Ottawa, Tracey Mathewson and George Doran of New York are in the city today registered at the Queen Hotel. They are leaving this evening for the Upsalquitch with Mr. Harry Allen as guide and will later go to Cain's River and other streams where they will take pictures of New Brunswick scenery.

U. K. MARKET IS ASKING FOR N. B. APPLES

PROSPECT OF GOOD MARKET FOR ALL CROP

Canadian Demand Also Brisk—Strawberry Season Drawing to a Close—Prices Remain High.

Produce shippers in New Brunswick have received numerous inquiries from importers in the United Kingdom concerning prospects for apple shipments in the autumn. The suspension of the embargo has been extended until March 20th, 1920, and there is every prospect of ready marketing of the New Brunswick apple crop. The market in Canada also is expected to be ready to absorb all the fruit which this province can offer.

The prospects for a fairly good apple crop in New Brunswick are bright.

Strawberry Situation
The strawberry season in this province is drawing to its close but will last for some days longer. Montreal is offering thirty cents per box for New Brunswick berries which is equivalent to twenty four cents per box locally. That price is exceeded in all New Brunswick markets except St. John.

St. John Has Advantage
The St. John consumer has an advantage over all others in the fact that the strawberry producing areas on the lower St. John River depending on transportation by steamer cannot obtain close connection with railways to ship their fruit in first class condition to Montreal while other sections of the province can. The result is that St. John is the only sure market and is oversupplied with resulting low prices. In 1917 prices for strawberries were remarkably low in St. John, four, five and six cents per box being paid.

It is expected that the opening of the St. John & Quebec Railway from St. John to Fredericton will make a complete change in the situation and will place the producers of the lower St. John River in a position where they can ship to any market reached from any other part of the province.

A wedding of interest took place Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. E. N. Rowley, 67 Stanley street, St. John, when her sister Miss Margaret J. MacLaggan was united in marriage to Peter Y. MacLaggan. The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. D. MacLeod of Devon. The bride was costumed in a very pretty dress of fawn broadcloth with hat to match and carried a bouquet of cream roses. Following the ceremony a dainty supper was served after which the bride and groom left on a honeymoon trip to St. Stephen. Returning they will reside at Nashwaak Bridge.

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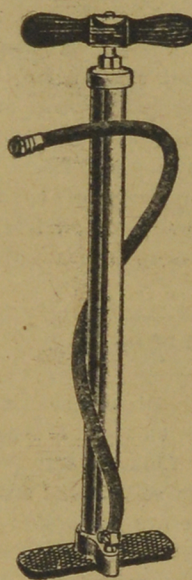
