BOURGEOIS PROPOSITION WAS GIVEN SHORT SHRIFT

Wanted an Inter-Allied Military Force to Enforce Peace—The French and Czecho-Slovaks the Only Delegates to Support It—Japs Opposed to Racial Discrimination in Immigration Laws and Their Enforcement.

Paris, Feb. 13.—The Bourgeois proposition for an inter-allied military force to enforce peace was defeated by an overwhelming vote at the meeting of the Society of Nations Commission today. The French and Czecho-Slovaks were the only representatives voting in the affirmative.

The draft of the Society of Nations plan was then unanimously adopted as a whole. The final draft consists of twenty-six articles.

President Wilson will personally read the draft to a meeting of the peace conference tomorrow. The conference will not be asked to finally adopt it this time.

The Japanese delegation presented an amendment providing that racial discrimination should not be tolerated in immigration laws.

Several delegates urged that this would open such a large question that great delay must ensue and the matter was dropped without a vote.

U. S. Army of 500,000

Paris, Feb. 13.—The United States under the Society of Nations' plan as it now has been amended will maintain an army of not less than 500,000 men which after authorization of such action by the United States senate could be used wherever necessary, according to a Havas agency announcement today regarding newly adopted features of the plan.

This provision was agreed upon by the Society of Nations commission, the agency says, as a solution of the difficulties in the way of the plan arising from the American constitution.

The League of Nations commission according to the official communication this evening received the report of the drafting committee this morning with the result that several new articles were added to the original text and phrases changed with a view to clarification.

ALLEGED TROUBLE IN ROUMANIA RESULT OF GERMAN ACTIVITIES

London, Feb. 14.—Reports of a rebellion in Roumania have been current for nearly a month, with varying details, but all have emanated from German or Austrian sources and have not been confirmed by advices from disinterested points. The Roumanian legation here knows nothing of any outbreak and does not attach any importance to reports received yesterday from Berlin. The legation, however, says that it has known for many months that German and Russian Bolsheviks, amply supplied with money, have been working in Roumania trying to bring about anarchy and the destruction of the dynasty.

Concerning a Will

Margaret S. Lemon vs. William Charlton and Elizabeth N. Charlton. Judgement of Judge White varied and appeal dismissed with costs. This concerned a will in which two thousand dollars was bequeathed by a secret clause to an unknown person. The plaintiff claimed to be the person and her claim was supported in the court below and also on appeal.

F. Woodford Fulton vs. Pegles Belkows Co. Chief Justice Hazen read judgement. Motion dismissed with costs.

The Fleming Case

After judgements were delivered the court heard argument in the special case referred by Chief Justice McKeown of the King's Bench Division. The King vs. J. K. Flemming. This action is brought to recover for the province moneys alleged to be secured by the defendant when premier of the province, from A. R. Gould who had the contract for building the St. John & Quebec Railway. The amount was \$100,000. A. B. Connell, K. C., and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., were heard on a motion to dismiss the case on points of law. The hearing was continued this afternoon.

Wilson Not There

The first subject considered on the resumption of the sitting of the commission of the Society of Nations this afternoon concerned an international military force. President Wilson was not present at the session this afternoon having to attend the supreme war council. Lord Robert Cecil acted as chairman during his absence.

Use of Troops Permitted

Greece has been authorized by the peace conference to send additional troops to Thrace, the Smyrna district and adjacent territory along the coast. It is understood that these troops and those which Italy is about to send to the Asia Minor districts of Adalia and Konieh will be considered as allied troops, subject to withdrawal by the conference.

This move is construed by observers here as the first step towards making Italy and Greece the mandatory powers for the territory thus occupied.

The Change Made

The text of the plan for the Society of Nations as first drawn up by the peace conference commission for the organization of the society, was afterwards amended, it developed today, after representations by Leon Bourgeois, the French authority in question whose ideas are stated to have been well received by the Allies.

In one case the plan was amended so as to provide that the nations having membership in the league should pledge themselves to take up arms if necessary for the maintenance of the integrity of their respective territories. In addition to this it has developed, the commission discarded the idea of virtually making the Society of Nations as a super-state.

PROHIBITION CONVICTIONS WERE QUASHED

Before the Appeal Division, Supreme Court, yesterday afternoon five convictions under the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 were quashed. The cases all were against Messers Johnston, partners, who had been convicted by Magistrate Vroom.

A case of interest in this section of the province was that concerning the assessment appeal of the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company in the Town of Marysville. The town won the appeal.

Argument in The King vs. the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities ex parte Town of Milltown was completed before the appeal division of the supreme court Thursday. Court considers.

In the King vs. C. N. Vroom, justice of the peace for Charlotte county, ex parte Aubrey Johnston and Hampton E. Johnston, P. J. Hughes showed cause against rule nisi to quash conviction under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916. Four other cases under the same act had common ground and were figured together. D. Mullin, K. C., supported the rule.

Chief Justice Hazen, after hearing argument in these cases, in which the accused were partners, stated that he knew of no reason for changing the decision in the Howard & Crangle case which was on similar grounds, and believed the rule nisi should be made absolute. Chief Justice McKeown, of the King's Bench, and Judge Grimmer concurred. Rule absolute to quash.
