## BOSTON STRIKE LIKELY TO GROW IN MAGNITUDE

Strong Sympathy for the Striking Policemen is Being Shown by the Labor Unions — Efforts Being Made to Avert a General Strike—A Call Made for Federal Troops.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 11—Bayonets rule Boston tonight and tomorrow it is likely to be the American Federation through the Boston Central Labor Union. That body held a protracted meeting lasting until after midnight and attended by delegates of all the four score local unions, to support the police in their strike. The temper of the unions is for such action and there seemed hardly a dissentient voice before the session got to work. This action was presaged by the Firemen's Protective Union, telephone operators and electric linemen who avowed they stood ready for a walkout.

The storm centres, Scollay Square, South Boston, Washington street, the Common and Charlestown, were quiet as a graveyard tonight, but lawlessness broke out in a new quarter, Jamaica Plain, where one of a mob was killed by a guardsman. This brings the total of slain up to six, and more than a score injured, including five women. One girl died in the hospital at noon.

Labor leaders conferred this afternoon with Mayor Peters, and no one would give assurance that a general strike can be averted. The unionists harped on the same old string—that if the police are allowed affiliation with the A. F. of L. they will go back and never be called on to strike in the future.

#### Ask for Federal Troops

Governor Coolidge asked Secretary of the Navy Daniels and Secretary of War Baker to be ready to dispatch Federal forces here to aid the 5,000 state troops on duty. Cavalry and infantry are in control and those on foot patrol in pairs with fixed bayonets, while the banks and large plants have their own guards running into thousands.

The commandant of the navy yard was instructed by Assistant Secretary Roosevelt to establish a naval watch among men of that service. As the result of the riots in stores the property loss exceeds \$300,000 which the city will have to foot.

A dispatch from New York says a group of crooks has left that city for Boston and detectives are on the trail to help the local police. The police courts were crowded today as the result of rioters and looters and many of the more serious offenders were held for the grand jury.

lowing the calling of Boston's police strike Tuesday reached six, when Henry Groat, twenty years old, was shot and killed during a raid by State Guardsmen on a dice game in the Jamaica Plain section, and Richard D. Reumis, special policeman, died of his wounds. Two other men were wounded in the raid in the Jamaica Plain section.

#### Machine Guns in Streets

With Governor Coolidge as commander-in-chief of the state forces, incomplete charge of the situation, the city tonight took on a warlike appearance. Six machine guns were mounted at police headquarters and troopers wearing "tin hats" by order of Adjutant General Stevens patrolled the streets. The order followed injury to several soldiers by flying missiles.

Meanwhile shopkeepers help police and military protection by means of their own, barricaded the windows of their places of business as if to withstand a siege. Boards were nailed in front of the buildings to protect them from the assault of bands of hoodlums who have been roaming the streets.

While Governor Coolidge was exercising his authority as commander-in-chief of the state forces to take complete command of the measures for protection of the city, Mayor Peters was making it plain to labor leaders who visited the city hall that the policeman's union would not be recognized.

The labor men were firm in their insistence that the police be permitted to affiliate with the American Federation of Labor and offered to guarantee that the police never would be called out on a sympathetic strike. Although the mayor said they had told him that they wished to avert a general strike, they proceeded after their conference with him to a meeting of the executive commission and past presidents of the Central Labor Union called to make arrangements for a meeting of the central body tonight, which action on the matter of a general sympathetic strike was to be taken.

The meeting tonight was fraught with momentous possibilities for the city of Boston.

Three weeks ago when it was seen that a policeman's strike was probable the Central Labor Union instructed the local unions to vote on the question of a sympathetic strike. Many of the unions have taken this vote and in a number of cases the ballot was favorable to a walkout. The Central body should it decide to endorse the movement, is empowered to set a date for a strike of these unions. In the event of such action the only remaining formality would be to obtaining of sanction from the international unions.

The possibility of a strike of carmen, telephone and electrical workers and industrial employees was serious. What gave the authorities the greatest cause for anxiety, however, was the danger that the firemen might join in the movement. It was recognized that this would place the city on the gravest peril.

### THIS SHOW A GREAT HIT

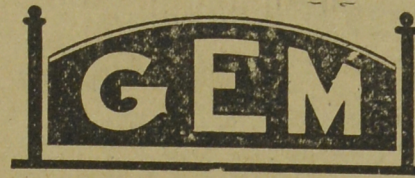
