Buenos Ayres, July 15 .- Government reports show that one million sheep and one hundred thousand cattle have been drowned in floods in the southern part of Buenos Ayres Province. The railways and telegraph communication have been interrupted and several sections in that region have been completely isolated for more than a week from this cause. The floods were due to a month of the heaviest rainfall ever recorded here. Over on the Chilean side of Argentina there have been further heavy snowfalls along the Trans-Andine Railway, causing new demage to the line. At one point the debris on the track has accumulated for a distance of fifty yards.
