

ROBBERY OF SAFE AT C.N.R. STATION HERE

For some time past members of the detective force of the Canadian National Railways, have been investigating the robbery of the safe at the C. N. R. station which took place several weeks ago. No developments in the case have been announced so far.

The robbery evidently was the work of some person or persons well acquainted with the layout of the office and possessed of the combination on which the safe was locked. A sum of money in the vicinity of one hundred dollars was stolen at the time.

It is understood that the safe was opened at night or while the thief or thieves were sure that they would not be molested.

He had entered the hospital yesterday morning and passed away very suddenly at noon yesterday. The funeral took place this afternoon, interment being made at Pleasant Valley.

A meeting of the majority of the aldermen was held last evening and decided that it was very unfair to collect money from some citizens and allow other citizens to go free from giving any contribution. It was thought that the fairest procedure would be to return the money already collected and to vote the necessary funds from the City Treasury. This was decided on by those present and will be voted upon at the next City Council meeting.

Children's Parade

The Ladies' Committee reported that they had seen Mr. W. W. O. Fenety, Manager of the Gaiety Theatre and that he had agreed with the arrangements. The children of the city are to assemble at Parliament Square at 1.45 o'clock on Saturday afternoon where a short address will be given by Maj. (Rev.) E. B. Hooper. Following this they will attend a free show at the Gaiety Theatre where ice-cream will be served. All who have flags are asked to carry them and wave them. It has been suggested that Fredericton return to Houlton the courtesy received there by carrying American flags and decorating with them in the same manner as the people of Houlton did with Canadian flags.

The parade will meet and form up at the western end of Smythe Street and from there the route will be Charlotte to Church, to Queen, to Westmoreland, to Brunswick and Smythe Streets. A further meeting will be held at 11.30 o'clock tomorrow morning to complete arrangements and to appoint the marshalls and judges.

STUMPAGE INCREASE IS GAZETTED

**INCREASE IS \$1 PER M ON
CHIEF LUMBER VARIETIES**

**Act Establishing Game Refuge
in Effect Dec. 1st—Area in
Northumberland Co.
Set Aside.**

The Royal Gazette of this week contains notice that the rate of stumpage has been increased for the logging season which is coming, the increase to go into effect August 1st next. The notice is contained in the regulations and Stumpage Tariff which is published in the Gazette.

The increase amounts to \$1.00 per thousand feet on all classes of logs. The increase for each class is as follows:

Spruce, pine and hactamac saw logs per M superficial feet, from \$2.50 to \$3.50.

Cedar Logs per M, from \$2.50 to \$3.50.

Hemlock logs per M, including bark from \$2.00 to \$3.00.

Fir logs, per M, \$2.00 to \$3.00.

Poplar logs, per M, from \$2.00 to \$3.00.

Game Refuge Proclaimed

The Royal Gazette also contains notice that a proclamation has been issued by His Honor the Lieut. Governor to the effect that the Act to Establish the New Brunswick Game Refuge shall come into effect on, from and after December 1st, 1919.

Includes Nepisiguit Headwaters

An area of four hundred square miles of Crown Lands has been set aside as a Game Refuge. This area is located entirely in the County of Northumberland and is roughly an oblong which includes the headwaters of the Nepisiguit River in the north and the Little Southwest Miramichi River in the south.
