WASHING WOOLENS.

Definite rules may be formed which, if followed, will make silk and wool washing more successful. Here are a

Use water about the temperature of the hand-98 to 100 degrees Fahrenheit.

Use a fine, white soap, by making it into suds with the wash water.

Use no alkalies other than a few drops of ammonia or a little borax

Wash by not rubbing, but by pressing and squeezing in the soap suds. Do not boil.

Dry in the same temperature in which it was washed, and preferably out of the direct rays of the sun.

Having made these rules, the next step is how to follow them. Prepare white soap that would be used for two quarts of water. This soap solution had better not be boiled, as boiling it would cause it to darken, making it more or less unfit for white wools and silks.
