CO-OPERATIVE GARAGE

Premises to be Secured in Westmorland Street—Capital About \$25,000.

A new company to be known as Co-operative Sale and Garage Limited, is being promoted in Fredericton and vicinity. The new company is to be capitalized in the vicinity of \$25,000 and the co-operative principle will be applied to it.

The promoters of the new organization have been negotiating for the wooden building in Westmorland street formerly used by The John Palmer Company as a factory and it is understood will alter it and use it as a garage. The incorporation of the new company is expected at an early date, probably next week.

POST DISCHARGE RELIEF PLAN NOT ACCEPTABLE

THE PATRIOTIC FUND
COM. HELD A MEETING

Special Committee Drew Up a
Resolution Stating Objec-
tions—Will be Sent
to Ottawa.

At the meeting of the General Committee of the Fredericton Branch of the Patriotic Fund last evening several communications were read by the Secretary. The resignation of Ex-Mayor Moses Mitchell as chairman of the committee was accepted and Dr. T. Carleton Allen was appointed as chairman. After discussion it was moved by Col. Loggie and seconded by J. S. Neill, that a committee be appointed to prepare a resolution to be sent to Ottawa, setting forth the objections to the scheme proposed to deal with the Post Discharge Relief.

Scheme Not Practicable

Messrs R. F. Randolph, J. S. Neill and Col. T. G. Loggie were appointed on the committee which met at the conclusion of the meeting and prepared the following:

At a meeting of the General Patriotic Committee of the Fredericton Branch, called for the purpose of dealing with the scheme of Post Discharge Relief, as set forth in a communication from the Provincial Committee at St. John. It Was Resolved As Follows:

Whereas it is the unanimous opinion of the Committee that the scheme proposed and adopted at the meeting in St. John is not practicable, for the following reasons: The investigation of the various claims that may be made will involve more time than a voluntary committee, without the assistance of a paid secretary, can give to it.

The Relief Committee, as at present composed, who have been carrying on the work for five years, have unanimously declined to act under the proposed plan, and this Committee is further of the opinion that it will be impossible to get a voluntary committee who will act, and efficiently perform the duties.

The additional labor of preparing reports of individual cases to be sent to the Central Committee at St. John will involve considerable labor, without producing any beneficial results.

It is also the opinion of the committee, that any saving that might be effected by dispensing with a reasonable salary to the secretary, will be more than offset by improper grants made for want of sufficient investigation.

Therefore resolved that this Committee feel constrained to decline to undertake the organization of a new
